### Incorrect Cowl Flap Adjustment Blamed For Crash

SEATTLE (AP) — A possible incorrect adjustment of engine cowl flaps could have caused the ditching of a Northwest Orient Airlines Stratocruiser in Puget Sound April 2, a Civil Aeronautics Board investigating panel was told Monday.

The testimony came as the panel opened a hearing on the accident, which claimed the lives of five persons. Thirty-eight were aboard the big four-engine plane when it splashed into the Sound off Maury Island and sank.

The flight engineer, Carl V. Thomsen, said under questioning that the cowl flap switches on Stratocruisers and Lockheed Constellations—both used by Northwest—are operated differently.

Thomsen said that with the exception of a check flight in a Stratocruiser March 15 his recent service had been on Constellations.

Other witnesses called to testify during the first day of the hearing spoke of violent vibrations which shook the plane shortly before it ditched in the sound.

### Runoff Still Needed In Race For Judge

With all but Curry County reporting complete unofficial returns today, incumbent Charles S. Woodruff leads Warren A. Woodruff, Jr. to race for circuit judge in the Second Judicial District by 27,919 to 26,191.

The other candidate, Gerald O. Kabler of Sutherlin, has a 2,290 total to date.

The figures indicate the necessity of a runoff in November between Woodruff and Woodruff, Jr., since neither received a majority.

Total vote in Douglas County was Kabler 1,627, Woodruff 6,716 and Woodruff 6,551.

In Lane County, unofficial totals show Kabler with 5,091, Woodruff with 15,107 and Woodruff with 14,613.

### Algerian Rebels Ambush French Military Convoy

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — Algerian rebels ambushed a French military convoy 50 miles west of Sétif on the road to Constantine Tuesday, killing three and wounding five others.

French dispatches said convoy guards counterattacked soon after the first burst of fire halted the supply trucks and the rebels fled, leaving 17 dead.

### Kootenai Going Up But Fighters Hold Line On Big Dikes

BONNERS FERRY, Idaho (AP) — The Army and civilian volunteers were holding the line Tuesday against the swollen Kootenai River which has broken through two dike systems and flooded some 6,000 acres of farmland.

The river stood at 32.3 feet, dropping from a record peak of 35.4 Monday as water poured over the land and relieved pressure on other dirt dikes.

No new breaks were reported in the levees overnight. Army infantrymen and engineers built up the barriers and patrolled for leaks.

The Kootenai, rolling above the 31-foot flood stage in the wake of a heat wave that melted heavy mountain snowpacks, is expected to crest Wednesday or Thursday at 36 feet.

The river rolled through one breach 100 yards wide into Diking District No. 1 adjacent to town Monday night and flooded five farms. Six farms in District 7 were flooded earlier.

Potter said Democrats "have sought frantically" to find campaign issues but can't "because of the peace, prosperity and progress" of the nation under the Eisenhower administration.

### Missouri Papers See Democrats Win In State

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Missouri claimed new attention today as a battleground in the presidential race with 13 of 17 newspaper editors reporting they believe the Democratic nominee will wrest the state from President Eisenhower in November.

Thirty-eight of 41 Kansas editors predicted Eisenhower will carry their state, two wouldn't guess on the general election outcome and one who listed himself as an "independent Republican" said he thinks a Democrat will win in Kansas.

### W-D Fire Dept. Approves Budget

The district's fire suppression facilities include a tanker and one truck. Some 20 volunteers carry the load of fire suppression under the direction of Chief Barney Shepherd.

(Continued from Page One) as potatoes, as voted by the House. 3. A two-year freeze on the 17,400,000 acres of cotton eligible for price supports for 1957 and 1958 crops.

A directive to the secretary of agriculture to sell up to 5 million bales of government-held cotton on world markets in competition with other cotton producing nations.

A two-price program for rice that had been opposed by the administration when it was mandatory.

The feed grain compromise removed oats, rye, barley, grain sorghums and corn grown outside the commercial corn area from participation in the acreage reserve part of the soil bank. This authorizes payments of up to 750 million dollars to farmers who agree to underplant allotments of the designated surplus crops.

Rep. Poage (D-Tex.) said the bill would be called before the House Wednesday and that he hoped it would be passed "without a fight."
