Wright he had hidden his gun in a hedge near the accident scene. Wright went to the spot and recovered it. It was near where the car went off the highway, zipped across some lawns and clipped off a concrete post.

The gun fitted exactly the description given by service station owner John L. Williams — an old 45 automatic. It was loaded, with one cartridge in the chamber. Also recovered were three loaded clips and part of a box of ammunition, the deputy said.

Wrightman told Wright the gun is his father's, but his father did not know he had it. The youth was driving a car registered to Walter G. and Grace F. Wrightman of Ma-hel, in Lane County. He said he was headed back to California after visiting his parents.

At arraignment before District Judge Warren A. Woodoff this morning, Wrightman waived his right to preliminary hearing and was bound over to circuit court. Bail is \$2,500.

Red China Says 5-Year Industrial Plan In Jeopardy

HONG KONG (AP)—Red China has admitted that its five-year industrialization plan is in jeopardy. Some members and organizations of the Communist Party itself are sabotaging and obstructing the ambitious program.

The Peiping People's Daily, which speaks for the party, reported a number of cases in which party discipline has been violated and production endangered.

"Some bad men and bad things appeared among a number of party organizations and party members," the paper said.

This candid admission was prefaced by a charge that "counter-revolutionaries are enticing party members in various ways to do bad things or are worming their way into the party, posing as progressive elements."

The paper added: "Some party members in order to obtain honors and bonuses in fraudulent ways do not hesitate to make false reports on production achievements, conceal their errors and cheat the party and the state. Some party members, guilty of serious bureaucracy and delinquency, ignore workers' suffering and safety with the result that industrial accidents continue to occur, causing heavy losses."

Some party members regard the industries they control as "their independent kingdom," the paper declared. It named no names.

Surviving are her husband, Dr. Earl B. Stewart, Roseburg; two sisters: Mrs. Wilbur Calfee, White Pine, Tenn., and Mrs. A. R. Satterfield, Greensboro, N.C.

Health Service Team Here To Study Mosquito

The U.S. Public Health Service team, which hopes to learn more about mosquito control from tests conducted in Douglas County this summer, arrived in Roseburg this week.

Team members surveyed some 15 ponds in the county Monday and Tuesday. They'll select six for tests — the meadows, Ogden, Louis Harmaistrom and Bob McHugh are stationed at the Logan Field Station in Utah. Joining them in the survey was Verne Miller, head of the Oregon State Board of Health's vector control division. Harmaistrom is an entomologist; McHugh an aquatic biologist.

The group will make three two-week visits in the county. They'll stay until June 1, return July 16 and again in the latter part of August. While they are out of the area, the survey ponds will be checked by Art Woody and Irv Reiersen, vector control specialists with the Douglas health office.

Members of the county sanitarian department will assist the team when possible Reiersen said.

Army Uncovers Guided Missiles Before Newsmen

WHITE SANDS PROVING GROUND, N. M. (AP)—Army ordnance experts have revealed the existence in the southern New Mexico desert of a military organization designed to develop atomic warhead to a guided missile.

The disclosure came as the Army demonstrated its operational guided missiles before 115 newsmen here.

A briefing officer said there is a special weapons section of the Army Ordnance Department at White Sands. The mission of this section, he said, is to determine the capability of the various operational rockets to carry atomic warheads.

Whether any of the operational missiles are equipped with atomic warheads. It insisted the tests are solely for engineering and field-test purposes, although involving operational models.

The demonstration of several types of rockets was staged as a nationwide controversy continued over the military arm's guided missile program.

Five of the Army's operational rockets — or as Army spokesmen prefer to call them, weapons — were fired.

Interest in the demonstration, planned long before the current guided missile controversy started making headlines, was centered in the Nike. The Nike has been a focus of controversy between the Army and Air Force in recent days. It is a ground-to-air missile. The range has not been stated publicly.

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Truman Denies Statement About Landing At Anzio

secretary had issued the denial. The former President was asked to comment on "the complete denial."

"I would make no comment like that," said Truman, referring to the quotations attributed to him. "I had been listening to the conversation of several people who had been there. I am sorry about it."

"But it's a very embarrassing situation and I hope you'll clear it up."

In his original account of Truman's remarks, the AP correspondent accompanying the former President quoted him as saying he didn't know who planned the Italian landings but "there were a lot of easier places that could have been picked."

Eugene Bailey, secretary to the former President, told Zussy Wednesday:

"The President makes a complete denial of the quoted statement that he termed the Salerno and Anzio landings 'totally unnecessary and planned by some squirrel-headed general.' That was not the President's statement. He never told you that."

Zussy, a Milwaukee native who has been a journalist since 1937 and an AP foreign correspondent for seven years, said:

"My quotes were copied while the President was talking to me and are precisely as recorded. Both my memory and in the notes written down word by word as he spoke the quotes are as reported."

The former President's remarks stirred up a storm of criticism in the United States and Britain, since Allied casualties at both battles were heavy.

Bailey told Zussy that Truman had talked earlier Tuesday with Michael Chingino of International News Service and that "those were Chingino's words to the President."

Zussy said: "Mr. Truman made the statement flatly and without attribution. Both my memory and my notes recorded as he spoke attest to that. Another correspondent who came up and overheard part of the remark heard and also quoted the 'squirrel-headed' phrase."

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower said Wednesday he and his staff considered plans for the Anzio Beach landing of World War II and did not favor carrying out the operation exactly as it was done. He added he does not think the controversial operation can be called a failure.

Eisenhower was asked at his news conference about the World War II landing, which took a heavy toll of American and British casualties in the wake of remarks attributed to former President Truman at Salerno, Italy, Tuesday.

Eisenhower was asked Wednesday what he planned the Anzio operation. He replied with a laugh that the answer would be a long story.

He went on to say the Italian coast landing was proposed because he left the Mediterranean to become supreme commander of Allied forces. He said he and his staff considered it from a technical standpoint and did not favor the operation being carried out in the particular way that it was.

As it turned out, however, Eisenhower said, the invasion was a holding action that kept large numbers of German troops occupied in Italy when otherwise they would have been fighting on the Western front.

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Twining Believes Chances Of Air Attack Unlikely

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Nathan F. Twining, underlining the "deterrent effect of our long-range striking power," said today he believes chances are "slight" for an air attack on the United States.

However, Twining, Air Force chief of staff, said the Russian air force's long-range attack fleet is "becoming an increasing menace" and that "regardless of how strong our deterrent force, we can never be sure that a potential enemy will not attack."

In a speech prepared for the Civil Air Patrol's National Board, Twining made no mention of the inter-service rivalry which mushroomed to the surface over the weekend.

Two Senate subcommittees are preparing to investigate the service quarrel which Secretary of Defense Wilson reported yesterday has made President Eisenhower "a bit unhappy."

Wilson, who has been seeking to minimize the importance of the Army-Air Force-Navy squabbling, may have been warning what he has called "eager beaver" officers when he told newsmen yesterday:

"We'll see who sticks their head up next. I think it might be a little dangerous."

In New York yesterday, Adm. Arleigh A. Burke, chief of naval operations, said in a talk with reporters that the Joint Chiefs are basically "pretty much in agreement."

House Approves Farm Measure On Roll Call Vote

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congressional action was completed Wednesday on a farm bill designed to overcome objections which drew a veto for a broader measure April 16.

The House quickly passed the compromise measure which the Senate approved Tuesday. It was written by a conference committee of the two branches had passed separate bills.

Passage came on a 304-59 roll call vote.

The new bill, expected to be approved by President Eisenhower, was described by Rep. Poague (D-Tex.), its floor manager, as "the second best farm bill we have had before us this year" but "the only one which seems to have a chance to become law."

Poague accused the Eisenhower administration of "a lack of understanding" of the farm problems. He used most of the one hour allowed for discussion of the compromise measure.

The new bill jinked almost all of the provisions which the President objected to in last month's measure and gave him the major item he requested—a \$1,200,000,000 soil bank program to pay farmers for taking surplus land out of production.

Supreme Court Now Winding Up Its Busiest Term

WASHINGTON (AP)—Chief Justice Warren said Wednesday the Supreme Court is winding up its busiest term.

Coupling that report with a plea for a general speed-up in federal legal processes, Warren said the high court will dispose of a record number of cases before its summer recess. None of the cases which have been argued will be carried over to the session opening in October, the chief justice said.

Eisenhower, in the federal judiciary, urged Congress to provide more judges and the courts to revise their procedures to cut down a backlog of cases which he described as "the most important problem of the federal courts at the present time."

In a speech prepared for the opening session of the four-day annual meeting of the American Law Institute, Warren said of the Supreme Court:

"We are approaching the conclusion of what will have been the busiest term in the history of the court as regards the number of cases disposed of in any one term."

Saying that in 1946 the court disposed of a record 1,520 cases, Warren said: "The number this year will exceed that figure substantially."

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
