 SEATTLE — The Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast Baseball League Tuesday night announced that they had purchased infielder Artie Wilson from Portland.
 The Suds declined to specify the terms of the straight cash deal. Wilson will replace utility infielder Jack Lohrke, who injured a finger playing against Vancouver Monday.
 Wilson will be no newcomer to Seattle. He played for the Beavers in 1952, 1953 and 1954, batting .316, .332 and .336, respectively, during those seasons.
 Primarily a second baseman, Wilson has been used only in reserve by the Portland team.

 The Yakima Bears evened their crucial Northwest League stand at Eugene at a game a piece Tuesday night by shutting out the Emeralds, 1-0, on Dick Young's five-hitter.
 The victory boosted the Bears to within one-half a game of the pace-setting Emeralds with two more contests left in the series.
 Young went the distance in striking out six Eugene batters. His mound opponent, Berlyn Hodges fanned 10 and held the Bears to four hits, but two of them came in the eighth inning, when Yakima got its only run.
 Singles by Pete Mikacich and Erv Wilcox and a sacrifice did the damage. The game was a fast one, being played in the short time of an hour and 31 minutes.
 At Spokane, the Indians' Bill Bottler pitched a four-hit shut out at Wenatchee for a 2-0 victory and the Lewiston Brones pasted Salem, 10-5, in a slugfest at the Idaho city. Tri-City was idle.
 Bottler struck out 13 Chief batters and gave up two walks. Chuck Lybeck held the Indians to give hits but three Wenatchee errors cost him the game.
 One of the errors came in the eighth, when the Indians combined the bobbie, a single and a fielder's choice for two runs.
 The Brones teed off on two Salem pitchers for 1 1/2 hits, with Gene Klingler's grand slam homer in the fourth the big blow. The Brones got eight extra base hits. Bob Wadsworth got the win with an eight-hitter.
 Bob Easterbrook clouted a three-run homer for the Senators in the eighth.
