British Impose Curfew On Port Following Riots

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—British authorities imposed a 24-hour curfew on the port of Larnaca Friday to prevent another clash there between Turkish and Greek Cypriots.

Thursday, islanders of Turkish origin rioted through Larnaca's streets smashing windows of every Greek shop they could reach. Police said damage totaled 6,000 pounds (\$16,800) and several persons were injured.

The Turks were vengefully demonstrating their ire at the killing of a Turkish Cypriot policeman Wednesday night. His assassins are believed to be members of EOKA, the underground fighters for enosis Union of Cyprus with Greece.

Friday the Turkish Cypriots of Larnaca gathered in their quarters of the city, clearly preparing for another foray. As they began moving through the streets, the Greeks armed with clubs and knives, assembled to protect their property. Suddenly air raid sirens wailed. The Turks halted and within a short time police were out ordering everyone indoors because of the curfew.

Seven Turks and six Greeks were admitted to Larnaca hospitals, some with stab wounds, after minor skirmishes earlier in the morning.

Meanwhile, a member of the British security forces was reported killed and another wounded Friday when a bomb was thrown at their car in the village of Trikomo.

Fire Strikes Two Mills In Oregon

OREGON CITY (AP)—The Oregon Shingle Mill at New Oregon, south of here, was destroyed by fire Friday morning.

The mill, valued at \$70,000, was apparently a total loss, said Elmer Tagh, manager, who said \$3,000 worth of finished shingles also burned.

The mill, employing 22 men, reopened only a few months ago after having been shut down following a fire four years ago.

HOOD RIVER (AP)—The Neal Creek Lumber Co. 12 miles south of here was damaged by fire Thursday evening.

Cause of the blaze and extent of loss were not determined immediately.

This was the second major mill fire in the Hood River area in the past week. The planer of the Jaymar mill on the Columbia River near here burned Saturday. Loss from that blaze was estimated at \$48,000.

The Jaymar plant is to be rebuilt soon.

Armstrong Winds Up Africa Gold Coast Visit

ACCRA, Gold Coast (AP)—Louis (Satchmo) Armstrong wound up a three-day visit to this African country Friday with a perspiring jam session for the Gold Coast elite.

More than 2,000 people packed a local movie house and hundreds of others jammed the streets outside when the authorities ordered the doors barred.

The temperature outside was 96 degrees—inside it was over 100.

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Fisherman's Body Search Continues In Rogue River

GRANTS PASS (AP)—The 60-mile stretch of the Rogue River between Marial and Gold Beach was being searched Friday for the body of a Salem fisherman, believed to have drowned in a boating accident.

He is Philip Johnson, about 45, who Wednesday was caught in the current and swept down river. At the time he was trying to reach his fishing party's capsize boat which had grounded on a sandbar. Johnson was alone in the boat when it overturned in rough water as his companions, Dr. Charles Mills, 44, and Richard F. Chambers, 35, also Salem, had gotten out to lighten the craft. Johnson swam to shore all right, then when the boat grounded he started back to it. An eddy caught him and swirled him away.

Carol Cornell of Grants Pass, who has a cabin on the river, reported that he had seen something yellow float past his place 30 miles downstream from the accident Thursday afternoon.

Johnson was wearing a yellow life jacket when he was swept away.

Johnson operated a drive-in restaurant at Salem. He moved there about a year and a half ago from Fairbanks, Alaska, where some years ago he was president of the Chamber of Commerce.

Smith Broadens Authority For Portland Probe

PORTLAND (AP)—Developments came fast Thursday in the wire-tapping and vice investigations in Portland.

Gov. Elmo Smith at Salem issued an order directing Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton to take over all such investigations from Dist. Atty. William Langley of Multnomah County (Portland).

At the same time a grand jury, to which Langley has been presenting evidence that has led to two indictments on wire tapping charges, issued a subpoena calling for Thornton to appear as a witness in its investigation.

Other subpoenas called H. G. (Fod) Malson, superintendent of the Oregon state police, and Police Chief James W. Purcell Jr. of Portland to appear. Malson testified Thursday morning. Purcell was to follow.

The Oregon Journal reported that wire recordings seized in a raid by sheriff's deputies last week included a recording of a telephone conversation between Purcell and Malson.

District Judge John R. Mears directed that the evidence seized in the raid be held for use by Thornton. Mears said he had been "misled" in signing a search warrant presented by Langley for the raid.

Langley protested the ending of the hearing. He said the judge had not allowed cross-examination of witnesses, and had not allowed his deputies to introduce the evidence that was a basis for the search warrant.

Presbyterians Consider Merger

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The 168th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. today took under consideration a merger with the United Presbyterian Church, a major move in the church's drive toward unity.

The merger originally was devised as a three-way plan, including the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., a southern states branch.

The issue of a precise stand on segregation and other matters intervened, however, and last year, the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. rejected the merger proposal. The other two then decided to go ahead with a two-way plan.

The Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., convening here for seven days ending May 30, has 2,736,000 members. The United Presbyterian Church, Presbyterians primarily in the state of Pennsylvania, has 225,000 members.

31 Believed Dead In Plane Crash

GUATEMALA (AP)—Thirty-one persons were believed dead Friday in the crash of a Guatemalan airplane.

Wreckage of an Aviatca Company plane was sighted on a peak of the Sierra de las Minas range at an altitude of 8,500 feet. There were no signs of life and search helicopters reported that part of the wreckage had burned.

The plane left Puerto Barrios Thursday morning for La Tinta but was unable to land there because of bad weather and tried to make Guatemala City.

Ground patrols are not expected to reach the wreckage until Saturday or Sunday. The plane carried 28 passengers, the pilot, co-pilot and stewardess.

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Communism Big Failure, Eisenhower Says In Talk

On the 12-mile drive in an open car from the air base to the coliseum, the President stood up most of the way to greet enthusiastic crowds along most of the route.

In calling for a European union, Eisenhower said: "A free United States of Europe would be strong in the skills of its people, adequately endowed with material resources, and rich in their common cultural and artistic heritage. It would be a highly prosperous community."

The president hammered at the idea of need for free world cooperation in the struggle against communism—and at the idea of need for the United States to play a leading role in providing help.

In what seemed to be a plea for congressional enactment of the administration's \$4,900,000,000 foreign aid program, the President spoke out against being "penny wise" in that field, saying it could lead "only to greater risk and greater cost."

The House Foreign Affairs Committee voted earlier this week to trim the program by more than one billion dollars, mainly in military assistance.

The President also proposed that America's big private foundations put some of their billions through the free world as a dynamic new weapon against Communism.

He suggested a teamed effort by the foundation and this country's great universities in areas "where great knowledge and the ability to use knowledge are unsatisfied" could make a major contribution to world peace and prosperity.

Eisenhower's proposal that science education centers in needy free nations was set forth in the broadest of general terms. He said nothing about any U.S. government role in such a program and left the impression it would be a private enterprise venture.

Turning to communism, he said: "Today a militant, aggressive, communistic doctrine is dominant over much of the world's surface and over hundreds of millions of the world's people."

He called Communism "cruel, intolerant, atheistic . . . committed to conquest by force, intimidation and force," and added it "poses a threat from which even this mighty nation is not immune."

But even so, Eisenhower said, "communism is, in the deepest sense, a gigantic failure." Even in countries it dominates, he said, "hundreds of millions who dwell there still cling to their religious faith; still are moved by aspirations for justice and freedom that cannot be answered merely by steel and bigger bombers . . . still dream of the day that they will live in the fullness of human freedom."

Sewer District Advised As Answer For Green Area

Two engineers in the limelight at the public meeting called by the Green Sanitary District apparently had no ready solution to the problems plaguing the district, but both agreed the sanitary situation in the district was bad.

The meeting was called to allow discussion by people of the district with Vernon E. Satter, sanitary engineer of the Federal Housing Administration, Seattle, and Sidney Lasswell, consulting engineer from Cornell, Ithaca, N.Y., and Merrifield, Corvallis.

Satter said he had spent a day in the area, canvassing west of Carnes Road. He said he had dug several holes over the area and found clay varying from about 12 to 14 inches below the surface of the ground. He said clay forms a barrier to fluids and is definitely not suitable for septic tanks.

Satter also said that draining in roadside ditches causes a potential health hazard. He cited Seattle where an outbreak of scarlet fever occurred and Eugene which had an outbreak of hepatitis. He said health departments all over the country are concerned with drainage in ditches.

Lasswell added that no cheaper way for elimination of the situation was available than by sewer.

One subject that also came up was how much affect the possibility of Associated Plywood (now U. S. Plywood) moving out of Green would have on millage. Lasswell said it was estimated millage would rise from 6 to 8.3. In answer to another question, he related that no limitations on size of districts in a sanitary district are made, but he advised against breaking them down smaller than presently proposed.

When asked about future mortgage insurance loans in the Green district, Satter emphasized he was not authorized to make statements on policy. He also related he had been employed by the FHA approximately eight months as a consultant.

Schools Have No Right To Oust Wed Students

SALEM (AP)—School Boards have no right to exclude married students from public schools, Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton ruled Thursday.

In an opinion for the state Department of Education, Thornton pointed out that the law, which permits all persons from 6 to 21 years of age to attend schools, doesn't say anything about married students.

Therefore, he ruled, "a rule or regulation of a school board excluding from the public schools married pupils otherwise eligible would be arbitrary and unreasonable and therefore invalid."

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
