

Camas Valley High School Plans For Baccalaureate Sunday, Graduation Slated

Baccalaureate commencement and a host of other school-ending activities have been scheduled at Camas Valley High School.

Rev. Elmer Burkley will deliver the baccalaureate address Sunday at 8 p.m. in the Methodist Church. He has entitled his address "Rendezvous with Life." Mrs. Ted Heilman will sing at the services.

Meanwhile, commencement is scheduled May 29 at 8 p.m. in the school gymnasium. Herman Cohen, assistant professor of speech at the University of Oregon will deliver the address entitled "Horatio Alger — 1956 model."

Kenneth Bortles, vice principal will present awards and scholarships. Guy Moore will give the annual Moore award, and Neal C. Brown, school board chairman, will award the diplomas.

Special musical number will be presented by the eighth grade class, and Robert McEllan, high school student body president, will present the citizen's award.

The eighth grade promotion exercises have been scheduled immediately preceding the high school commencement. Mrs. Fred Ashton will make the grange award.

Supt. Clyde Akey announced today that Kay Ellen Wheeler will receive three awards for scholarship at the high school commencement. She will get a scholarship from Oregon State College, a certificate award from the University of Oregon and the Reader's Digest award for being valedictorian.

Another future activity is the school picnic, sponsored by the Camas Valley PTA May 31 on the school grounds. It is the last day of school. Buses will pick up the youngsters an hour later in the morning than usual and school will be dismissed at 3 p.m. Those attending the picnic are asked to bring table service.

Akey said no school will be held Wednesday, May 30, because of Memorial Day. Akey was recently the main speaker at the Drain Elementary School open house.

The junior-senior banquet was held at Bart's Cafe Friday.

High Naval Official Says Mobile Carrier Task Force Counter To Atomic Warfare

AKRON — A high naval official said Saturday that the Navy considers its mobile carrier task forces to be "the essential counter to thermonuclear war."

Asst. Secretary of the Navy James H. Smith added that an enemy "cannot afford to launch a surprise attack on our homeland while a naval striking force of such retaliatory power is roaming the high seas unopposed. He must first attack the naval force."

Smith made his claims for naval power in a speech prepared for naval and Marine air reserve units here. He avoided reference to the accepted United States doctrine that the Air Force's long range strategic bombers constitute the main deterrent to a surprise nuclear assault.

But he argued that the Navy's "mobile nuclear reprisal force" would be "relatively invulnerable," hard to find, and independent of the use of foreign bases.

Smith said such a force of carriers, missile ships and submarines would "present a major problem to an enemy commander which must be solved before he dare initiate an attack."

Smith said that the huge aircraft carriers of the Forrestal class were designed and equipped to "punish an aggressor without provoking or permitting greater aggression." But this "tailored deterrence," he said, is "in addition to their function in our total deterrent to total war."

He claimed for the Navy's striking forces the flexibility to employ all types of weapons, including hydrogen bombs, "which are tailored either for total destruction or limited and precise attack."

In another indirect reference to Air Force emphasis on long range bombers and missiles which will be released from aircraft, the

Navy official declared his opposition to "any long range tendency to consider the air delivery system (of nuclear weapons) the ultimate and only one."

2 Young People Facing Illegal Possession Count

A 17-year-old Dillard boy and a 16-year-old Roseburg girl were jailed by Roseburg police Friday night and charged with being in illegal possession of liquor.

In municipal court this morning, they were sentenced to five days in jail each when they refused to reveal where they got a half-case of beer.

Acting Judge John Horn had offered to suspend three days of the five-day terms if the two told where the beer was purchased. But he ordered each to the full five days when they refused.

In addition, the girl was fined \$10 when she pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct.

Police arrested them in Umpqua Park, where they were in a parked car. Part of the half-case of beer was taken in evidence.

The girl, officers said, fought all the way to jail, and it took an officer and the matron at the jail to put her in a cell.

Myrtle Creek Holding Budget Inside Limitation

Myrtle Creek's city government is fashioning a budget which is almost of the exact variety.

By trimming some items this week, the City Council has managed to hold the budget within the 6 per cent limitation. The Myrtle Creek Mail reports the proposed expenditures have been sliced to \$183,680.

The Mail says the largest single reduction from the proposal was for the Myrtle Creek library department. At the recommendation of the library board, the budgeted amount was dropped from \$5,000 to \$2,495. The reduction resulted from the board's decision to make the Myrtle Creek Library part of the county library.

One of the major items in the budget is the city's oil mist surfacing program. It will cost an estimated \$11,500 but it is expected that state gasoline tax money will cover the costs.

The budget also includes four water system improvements.

Anticipated revenue is reported at \$184,185. This includes anticipated taxes to be raised.

The budget committee and City Council will meet at a date still to be decided before calling a public hearing on the budget.

4-H Enrollment Deadline For 1955-56 Is Friday

A reminder that 4-H enrollments for fiscal 1955-56 close June 1 was made Saturday by Douglas County 4-H agents Jane Gates and Frank von Borstel.

Club members and other boys and girls between the ages of 9 and 21 are urged to enter summer projects before the deadline, they said. They include work in livestock, food preservation (canning and/or freezing), child care and vegetable or flower gardening.

Jane Gates said many 4-H'ers are taking advanced projects in clothing or home making. More information may be obtained by contacting her or von Borstel at the county extension office in the court house.

Hydrogen Bomb Jitters Reported From Japan

TOKYO — Japan reported three cases of "hydrogen bomb jitters" Saturday in the wake of the May 21 Bikini test.

Stevadores refused to unload the British freighter Arafura at Kobe until authorities had checked with geiger counters and assured them the vessel was not radioactive. The freighter left Brisbane, Australia, May 6 with a cargo of wool and scrap.

Fishing boat owner Kiyoshi Yoshida reported to the coast guard at Iwakai port, north of Tokyo, that one of his skippers "might have" been affected by radioactivity from the Bikini test. Yoshida said the No. 10 Taiyo Maru radioed that her skipper developed yellowish bumps on his face and limbs while cruising in Indonesian waters.

A coast guard spokesman said "The matter is not even worth investigating because the fishing boat was so far from the test area." He said her location was 940 miles northeast of Surabaya, Java.

Courts Can't Stop Statement Making Of Congress Groups

WASHINGTON — A special three-judge court ruled Friday the courts cannot prevent a congressional committee from publishing any statements, whether they be true, false or defamatory.

The decision was a split one, with Judge Robert N. Wilkin dissenting.

It served to dismiss proceedings brought by the Methodist Federation for Social Action in an attempt to prevent further distribution of a congressional handbook on the ground it contained material which might be slanderous.

The Gresham, Ore., federation, which is not an official agency of the Methodist Church, got a temporary order from Judge Wilkin May 3, restraining further printing of a pamphlet called "A Handbook for Americans" and issued by the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee.

Wilkins was sitting in U.S. District Court at the time.

Complaint was made by the federation that it was listed in the pamphlet as a "religious Communist front." It denied being a Communist front and said it had never been given a hearing by the Internal Security group.

In issuing his temporary restraining order, Judge Wilkin asked that a special three-judge tribunal be convened to handle the case, because of the constitutional questions involved.

Algerian Rebels Slash Throats Of 12 Frenchmen

ALGIERS, Algeria — Algerian rebels slashed the throats of 12 French employees of a highway construction company in eastern Algeria Saturday, official sources said. Among the dead was one woman.

The town was Oumach, about 150 miles south of Constantine. It is on the outskirts of the Aures Mountain region where the Algerian rebellion flared more than 1 1/2 years ago.

The new loss of French civilians came on the heels of widespread trouble in North Africa from Tunis on the east to Morocco on the west.

Mounting tension in Morocco resulted in the recall of the French commanding general there, Gen. Gabriel Burgund, after he issued a communique denouncing critics of the French army.

A slaughter of nearly 20 French farmers in western Algeria was followed last week by the ambushing of a patrol of French recruits freshly put in uniform. Eighteen were killed in the ambush, one was rescued, but two are still missing.

Goal Achieved For Resuscitator

The goal for the Laura Jean Memorial Fund resuscitator has been achieved, according to the Sutherland Sun.

Harry Garber, chairman, said the fund had reached \$736. Expenditures for the resuscitator and other needed equipment will cost \$648.48, leaving approximately \$90 for purchase of equipment to house the resuscitator stretchers and other necessary emergency devices. Garber said the fund has an option to purchase a car for the purpose for \$420.

Meanwhile, the Sun reports that firemen have received instruction in operating the resuscitator.

The fund to secure a resuscitator for Sutherland resulted from a tragedy in which Laura Jean Holloper, 2, was drowned. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen Holloper apparently fell head first into a fence post hole which had filled with water. The accident occurred April 15.

The town had no resuscitator, but one at Sutherland was rushed to the child's home.

Edna Campbell, lauded highly the Oaklanders, whom she said worked two hours to try to save the child.

Bridges' Union Signs Contract

SAN FRANCISCO — West Coast employers and Harry Bridges' International Longshoremen's Association have signed a two-year contract extension with elaborate safeguards against strikes or other labor stoppages.

Furthermore, the extension, announced Friday by the Pacific Maritime Assn. and the ILWU, besides providing for wage increases and broadened other benefits, has a built-in provision which fits it to the national drive to secure a common termination or review date for all longshore contracts on all coasts.

The purpose of the common date is to remove the temptation before bargaining groups to use differing dates as a lever in negotiations.

The extended agreement runs to August 1, 1958 if that date becomes the common termination or review date for all longshore pacts. If it doesn't, the agreement would terminate on June 15 that year.

It provides for a 2-cent an hour wage increase, with 3 cents for overtime, and states further negotiations on wages will take place this September. If no agreement is reached, arbitration is agreed upon, and any increase would be effective Oct. 1.

Yoncalla Rodeo Queen Trials Scheduled Sunday

Trials for the Yoncalla Rodeo queen candidates are scheduled Sunday at 1:30 p.m. at the Yoncalla rodeo grounds.

The trials are limited to girls between 14 and 21 years of age and residents of northern Douglas County. Contestants must wear western attire and ride the horse they expect to ride in the rodeo. Judging will be on horsemanship, horse and person.

The rodeo, sponsored by the Yoncalla Saddle Club, is scheduled July 4.

Winston Sewer System Bids Opened Friday

Bids for a new Winston sewer system were opened Friday night, but final figures will not be available until next Thursday, according to City Attorney Carl Felker.

He explained that the figures had to be checked by engineers before they become final.

The project is expected to include a disposal plant for an anticipated population of 3,500 and about 35,000 feet of 6 to 15-inch sewer lines.

The project will be paid for with \$265,000 in sewer bonds approved by voters.

Missing Woman Skier Found On Mt. Hood Slopes

PORTLAND — A 21-year-old woman who became lost high on the snowfields of 11,245-foot Mt. Hood two days ago was found alive Saturday after she had wandered down into a timbered area.

Miss Lynn Wattier, formerly of St. Paul, whose parents live at Briston, S. D., was reported by rescuers to be exhausted, but in good condition.

A radio report from the rescuers said she was being taken to Timberline Lodge at the 6,000-foot level with a group to ski. She became separated from the others in a fog.

Searchers found she had skied down from the snowfields—still more than 12 feet deep at the 6,000-foot level—and had abandoned her skis and ski poles. She reached the lower, snow-free slopes and wandered in heavy timber of Lady Creek Canyon until found, just three-quarters of a mile from a highway.

Friends said she had visited the Timberline Lodge resort last winter, and had applied for a job while there. She took the secretarial job when it opened up a few months later.

CRUSHED BY LOG

MEDFORD — A log rolled off a truck in the Elk Creek area north of here Friday fatally injuring a logger, John Gerald Grove, 37, Grants Pass.

He was standing on top of the load when the logs started rolling. He jumped and tried to run but was hit by a log and killed outright.

The body is being shipped to Red Oak, Iowa, for funeral services.
