

Mrs. J. L. Chaney Of Myrtle Creek Passes On At 80

Mrs. J. L. (Sarah Jane) Chaney, descendant of pioneers in the Myrtle Creek area, died at her home in Myrtle Creek Saturday afternoon. She was 80 years old. Mrs. Chaney was born at Myrtle Creek on Nov. 10, 1875, the daughter of George E. and Emily Weaver Traak. Her mother also was born at Myrtle Creek. The family was among the pioneers of the area who settled there in 1846. She was married to Jay L. Chaney at Myrtle Creek on March 10, 1894. She had been a member of the Methodist Church for 63 years, and also was a member of Valentine Chapter of Order of Eastern Star. Survivors include her husband; two daughters, Mrs. Fred Neal of Myrtle Creek and Mrs. William Stevenson of Medford; three sons, Roscoe Chaney of Myrtle Creek, J. L. Chaney Jr. of Astoria and Ernest Chaney of Clayburn, B.C.; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Guy Conley of Myrtle Creek; an aunt, Mrs. Charles Strong of Myrtle Creek; a half-brother, Ralph Weaver of Myrtle Creek; four half-sisters, Mrs. Roy Elmore and Mrs. Etta Schroeder, both of Eugene, and Mrs. Cassie Fetterman of Portland and Mrs. Zella Bromley of Washington, D.C.; 12 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren. Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the Methodist Church at Myrtle Creek with the Rev. Wayne Brown officiating. Interment will follow at the Myrtle Creek IOOF Cemetery. Death Claims Killer Of Oregon Policeman

PORTLAND (AP)—Ralph Pyatt, 38, who shot a state policeman to death at Bandon May 8, died Sunday night in a Portland hospital. Pyatt killed Richard F. O'Connor, 32, when O'Connor tried to serve a warrant on him for driving without an operator's license. O'Connor, mortally wounded, shot Pyatt in the head. Pyatt was brought here, where he had been in a coma since the shooting.

The Kootenai stayed above flood stage here for 13 days after the crest was reached in 1948 when there was serious flooding. It was not again Monday and forecasters said that would mean even more water from heavy mountain snowpacks.

Floods loosed by torrential rains covered some roads and thousands of acres of farm lands in the central sections of Illinois and Indiana Monday. The downpours ranged up to nine inches in Illinois during the weekend and were heaviest in Champaign, DeWitt and Logan counties. Streams went over their banks and water rolled across fertile fields along the Sangamon River and Kickapoo and Salt creeks. Many roads and streets were inundated in Indiana. U.S. Highways 40 and 52 and Indiana Highway 67 were blocked east and north of Indianapolis. Crawfordsville virtually was isolated.

Others had brought trailer houses and many were prepared to sleep in cars. The anglers included many women and children, he said. The supervisor reported snow drifts in some parts of the camp grounds. He said the State Highway Dept. had used its ploughs to open roads into the camp ground to get people off the highway.

Two passengers in one were taken to Douglas Community Hospital with injuries. They are John Lynch, 26, and Fred Strehel, 24, both of Eugene. Their car left the road near the scene of the chase-ending wreck. Lynch was cited for violation of basic rule by a deputy sheriff.
