Mrs. Winniford was married to Thomas Winniford in Hubbard in 1922. She has one son, Tom Winniford, Medford, and one daughter, Mrs. Henry L. (Emma Leah) Handy, who is a circuit court reporter. She has three grandchildren.

This week Mrs. Winniford said she would like people to know "that the people in Myrtle Creek have been very wonderful to me. I have had very fine cooperation from parents, faculty and the children." Her friends have fond thoughts about Mrs. Winniford. They mention her patience with the students, her friendly smile and cheerful manner.

Aerialist Rescues Wife When High Pole Snaps

WASHINGTON (AP) — A swaying pole snapped with a pistol-like crack Saturday night, plunging aerialist Elizabeth Nocks, 21, toward tanbark 55 feet below in the Ringling Brothers, Barnum & Bailey Circus.

Her husband, Joseph, 24, swinging on the top of another swaying pole snatched at her arms.

He caught her.
Both slid safely down the pole to the ground.

Excessive speed was the principal cause of traffic accidents in 1955.

Mrs. Nocks performed a similar rescue for her husband in New York earlier this season when his pole snapped as they presented their act.

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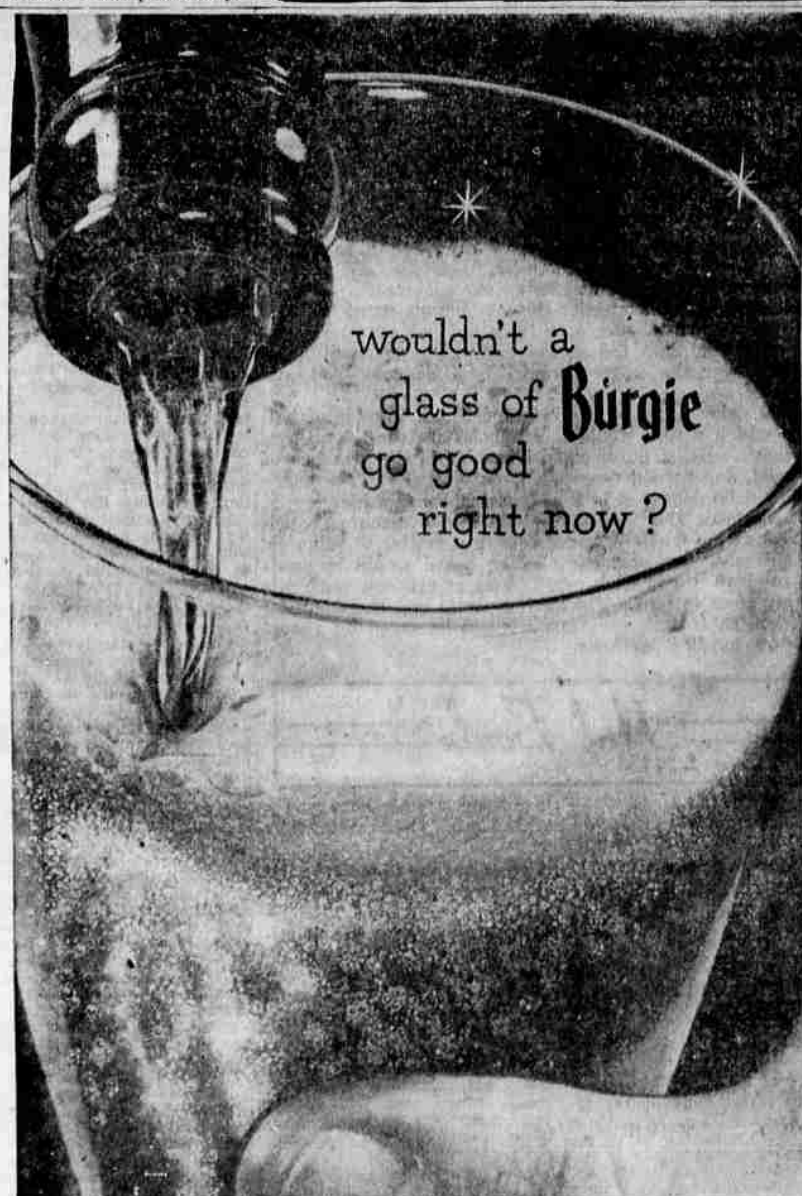
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
