

Elkton Students Give Puppet Show

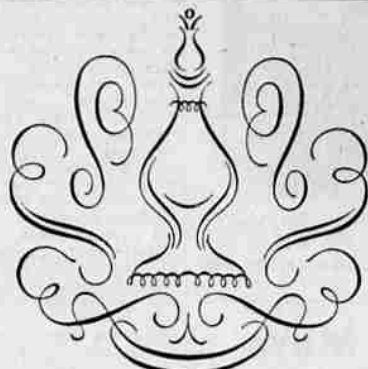

Last year, Oregon recorded a 10 per cent increase in deaths from Memorial Day through Labor Day.

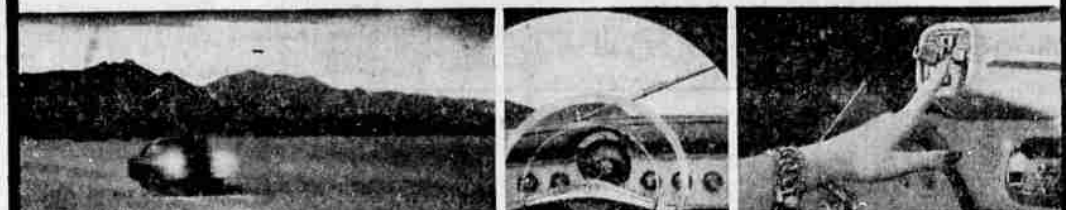
