

Opposition To Federal Seed Certification Urged

PORTLAND — Opposition to any federal seed certification program was urged Monday in a resolution introduced at the Pacific Seedmen's Assn. annual meeting here.

The industry should take care of certification, said Larry Robinson of Modesto, Calif., chairman of the organization's vegetable and flower seed group.

He predicted a shortage of beet, carrot, turnip, onion and radish seeds next year because European crops of these seeds were wiped out by the severe winter. He said European buyers were taking U.S. supplies.

A prosperous year was forecast by Northrup Hamilton, president of the association.

Portland Youths Jailed On Charges Of Assault

PORTLAND — Two youths were jailed Monday night on assault charges and two others were sent to juvenile court for the beat-up of a Little League baseball official last week.

Richard R. Rankin, 40, suffered an ankle fracture when knocked down and kicked as he sought to quiet a group of older boys at a Little League game for boys 8 to 12.

Ronald Vernon Banks, 19, and David Othello Parker Jr., 19, were held under bail of \$2,500 each. Names of the other two, juveniles, were not disclosed.

Police said all four admitted the attack but said they picked up baseball bats only after Rankin menaced them with one.

Monday Mayor Fred Peterson, after learning of the assault, directed that the city's 600 reserve police be called on as needed to preserve order in the city.

California Firm Wins BPA Power Line Work

PORTLAND — A \$135,912 contract for construction of the McNary - Franklin transmission line No. 2 and river crossing at McNary was awarded to Midland Constructors, Inc., Baldwin Park, Calif.

The Bonneville Administration said the line will meet the growing power loads of the Pasco-Richland - Kennewick area. The line is to go into operation at 115,000 volts next fall. It will be stepped up to 230,000 by the fall of 1957.

Philip E. Johnson Dies In Pasadena

Philip E. Johnson, son of Mrs. Julia D. Johnson of Roseburg, and the late Everett E. Johnson, died Wednesday in Pasadena, Calif. He was born March 29, 1901, in Coos County near Coquille and attended public school in Coquille and college at the University of Oregon. He had engaged in the lumber business since 1920, and in 1943 formed the C and D Lumber Co., with operations near Camas Valley. He later moved to Riddle. The family has resided on the South Umpqua River in Winston Section since 1946.

Survivors include his wife, Macbelle R. Johnson; a son, Everett P. Johnson, Winston; three grandchildren, Philip, Ann and David Johnson; his mother, Mrs. Julia D. Johnson; a sister, Mrs. Charles B. Kash, and a nephew, Timothy Kash.

Funeral services are to be held in southern California with interment following there. In lieu of flowers friends are asked to make donations to the Cancer Research Fund, the address of which will be announced later.

Sheriff Reports Nunn Tied Escape From Jail

MEDFORD — The sheriff's office reported Tuesday that Billy Junior Nunn, 27, Klamath Falls, held on a first degree murder indictment tried to saw out of his fifth floor jail cell Friday night.

Word was withheld, the office reported, while investigation was made into the source of the hacksaw blade Nunn was using when a guard came upon him. No report of who provided the blade was made public.

Nunn is scheduled to enter a plea Thursday to the indictment charging him with the April 19 slaying of Alvin William Eacret, 14, of Klamath Falls.

We shall vote Yes in a spirit of cooperation and harmony and because we feel that the long range best interests of our community and students can now be better assured, regardless of whether or not the budget passes or fails and regardless of whether or not the evaluation implement expense item passes or fails.

We feel at no other time, since we have been interested in school affairs during the past several years, have parents or other citizens been given any real undominated administrative opportunity to effectively perform and carry out unofficial work for better education and the wise spending of educational dollars, unless these participating lay citizens endorsed all or most existing school theories and policies.

We feel our recent work on these matters has helped to give all parents and other citizens this opportunity. Now the long range best interests of our individual educational concerns will have opportunity to be properly considered.

Under these circumstances we shall vote Yes, and from the standpoint of community cooperation and harmony, we hope the budget will be passed.
