Doctor Of Divinity Degree Conferred On Harlan Harris

The doctor of divinity degree has been conferred on Harlan L. Harris, former Roseburg resident and graduate of Roseburg High School.

The conferral was made at the annual spring commencement exercises at Wayland College in Plainview, Texas. Russell Harris, a brother from Reedsport, was among commencement guests.

Dr. A. Hope Owen of Wayland College, who was camp pastor last summer for Oregon Baptists' Multinomial Assembly, conferred the degree on Dr. Harris.

Harris is pastor of the First Baptist Church in Plainview. He is now leading a building program which will more than double the church's facilities. Recently, \$200,000 worth of Methodist property which adjoins the Baptist property in Plainview was purchased as part of the expansion program.

Dr. Harris came to Plainview from Shelby, N.C., where he had been pastor of the First Baptist Church since his graduation from Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, Pa. He is currently president of the Plainview Ministerial Alliance.

Ben-Gurion Says Israel Must Refrain From War

JERUSALEM, Israeli Sector (AP)—Premier David Ben-Gurion said Friday Israel must "refrain from initiating war even if provoked by Arab rulers is intensified."

The statement was included in a new political program drawn up by Ben-Gurion and published in Davar, the official trade union organ.

The Premier said peace is necessary not only for general ethical reasons but so Israel may "continue to gather in exiles and to build her homeland."



BYRON EVANS honored for service

Supt. B. Evans Given Honors By Glide People

The community of Glide and faculty members of the Glide school district honored Supt. Byron Evans this week.

The superintendent, who resigned earlier this year to continue work on his doctorate, was given a special certificate at high school commencement exercises Tuesday, reports Correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

Encased in blue leather embossed in gold was a certificate inscribed: "Award for distinguished service, presented to Byron Evans for meritorious contribution to our school, conferred at Glide, state of Oregon, May 29, 1956, by the faculty and the community." The certificate was presented by Joe Walker, chairman of the school board.

Mrs. Selby reports it is the first time in the history of Glide schools that such an award has been made to a faculty member. Evans' resignation was effective at the close of the 1955-56 school year.

22-Month-Old Girl Drowns In Ditch Tuesday

BEND (AP)—A 22-month-old girl drowned in an irrigation ditch near her home here Tuesday evening.

Mr. and Mrs. Halven W. Boldt said their daughter, Rita Rene, had been wading with other children in the ditch in the afternoon. When she failed to return home, a search was started, the body was found more than a quarter-mile away.

Permits To Burn Now Necessary In Winston-Dillard

Fire Chief Don (Barney) Shepherd of the Winston-Dillard Rural Fire Dept. announced that after today, it will be necessary for all residents within the district to obtain fire permits for doing any open burning.

He said it would not be necessary to secure permits to burn trash in home incinerators, provided the incinerators are covered by wire screen with mesh not larger than quarter inch.

He listed the following places where permits may be secured: Don Hatch home in west Winston on Division Street; Shepherd's home in east Winston on South Gregory Street; Don Worthen home in north Winston in Saksford Street; and Dillard Super Service Station in Dillard.

Shepherd said permits will not be issued to burn dry standing grass. He said such permits would be issued if grass is cut and piled a "safe distance from buildings and a garden hose attached to a hydrant. He asked that the department be called at OS 9-8414 just before lighting such a fire after securing the permit.

Shepherd pointed out that June will be clean-up month in the district and asked residents to collect all burnable trash for burning. But he emphasized that a permit should be secured first.

He said the volunteers will also collect burnable trash and haul it to a field in Winston for a big bonfire sometime near the Fourth of July. To have such trash hauled to the bonfire site, he asked residents to call the department at the above number.

Nunn Pleads Innocent To Charges Of Murder

MEDFORD (AP)—Billy Junior Nunn, 28, Klamath Falls, pleaded innocent Thursday to a charge of first-degree murder. Circuit Judge H. K. Hanna set July 17 as the trial date.

Nunn is accused of killing Alvin William Eacret, 14, Klamath Falls, at Tub Springs State Park between Klamath Falls and Ashland on April 19. The boy's body was found a week later. Nunn was arrested at Alturas, Calif., three days later.

Sam Harbison, court-appointed attorney for Nunn, said he would ask a psychiatric examination for Nunn, and might enter a plea of insanity. Nunn is being held in the county jail.
