Douglas Head Track Coach Quits To Take Eugene Job

Bob McCollum, physical education director, head track and cross country coach at Douglas High School for the past year, resigned his position Thursday to take over a similar position at Wilson Junior High School in Eugene.

McCollum, before coming to Douglas, attended Slippery Rock (Pa.) State Teachers College, spent a year at the American Red Cross Aquatic School in Lutherville, Pa., and last year attended the University of Oregon.

While at Oregon he served as an assistant track coach under Bill Bowerman, piloting the Frosh team to an undefeated track season.

Prior to his enrollment at Oregon he was stationed in Germany with the Army, where he coached the track crew, mainly hurdlers and distance men, along with handling the physical fitness program at the army education center.

In his one-year term at Douglas, his cinder crew copied two dual wins and a triangular win, even though his varsity unit was chopped in half during the middle of the season.

Douglas ended second in the annual Umpqua Valley League track meet, third in the subdistrict 5-A-2 meet and fourth in the district meet.

His two-man track team composed of Brent Strickland and Cliff Thompson placed second in the state A-2 show at Corvallis.

McCollum plans on attending summer school at Oregon to continue his doctoral study and will

spend some time as swimming and recreational director for the Harlow Lodge church camp near Eugene.

McCollum has been an active member of the Oregon Assn. of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. A member of the OAHPER central physical fitness committee he presented a demonstration of the PE fitness index test at the April Northwest District convention in Spokane, Wash. He is a state chairman of the association and a member of its editorial board.

Roseburg High Grid Slate Set

Bob George, head football coach at Roseburg High School, released the Indians 1956 football schedule today.

The coming campaign calls for nine games, six of which will be played on the home field. George has scheduled non-league games with Hillsboro, Ashland, Medford, Tillamook and traditional rival Grants Pass.

The football slate will open Sept. 7 against the visiting Spartans of Hillsboro and conclude on Nov. 9 against the Tillamook-Cheesemakers, also at Roseburg.

George lost 16 members of his 1955 varsity squad either through graduation or various other sources, but will have nine returning lettermen with which to form a winning unit.

State AAU Track Meet Draws 2 Roseburg Boys

Perry Clute and Frank Purdy Jr., members of the Roseburg High School track team, are slated for action Saturday in the high school division of the Oregon AAU track and field meet.

The meet will be held on the Lincoln High School field, adjacent to Multnomah Stadium in Portland.

All three divisions—college, high school and juniors—will be run off at the newly surfaced field. Clute, who has cleared the 12-foot pole vault mark several times the past year will definitely be a threat in his specialty, as will Purdy who is slated for action in the 100, 220 and low hurdles.

The top three winners in each division will receive medals for their achievements.

Cal Accused In Scandal By UCLA Man

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Charges continue in the Pacific Coast Conference football scandal with the University of California the latest target, accused of a "phony job racket."

Making the accusation against Coach Lynn O. Waldorf and his assistants yesterday was J. Miller Leavy, the same UCLA alumnus who leveled proselytizing charges against the University of Southern California last week.

California officials said they learned more than three years ago that some athletes were getting jobs with pay and little work and had taken steps at that time to cut it out.

Waldorf denied he knew of any phony jobs.

Leavy, deputy district attorney, said he had sworn and notarized statements from five athletes only one of whom played last season. He told newsmen he had sent copies to President Robert Gordon Sproul of the University of California, PCC Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt and Dr. Emmett B. Moore of Washington State College, president of the Faculty Representatives Committee.

Already penalized and put on probation by the conference this year for illegal payments to athletes are Washington and UCLA.

Last week Leavy charged that USC supporters paid \$71,235 over a two-year period to 60 athletes. Then came yesterday's accusation against California.

"It is a phony job in which a coach promises and provides the athlete with an outside 'job' that pays a minimum of \$50 per month, with a businessman backer of Berkeley to pick up the tab."

Both Commissioner Schmidt and Chancellor Clark Kerr said investigation will be made when Leavy's information is received.

Cardinals Stop Redlegs By 9-3

Wilmer (Vinegar Bend) Mizell and the St. Louis Cardinals finally are getting together—the Cards are giving the big ploughboy some runs and he's delivering complete games. It could be the whale of a combination in the National League pennant race.

The Cards have produced 25 runs for the drawing, 6-3 left-hander in his last three starts. He's won "em all and all were complete games. He got his fifth victory in seven decisions this season last night against Cincinnati 9-3.

The victory lifted St. Louis back into second place, a game behind the Milwaukee Braves, who kept up their home run hammering in a 15-8 frolic against the Chicago Cubs. The Redlegs tumbled to fourth and the Pittsburgh Pirates moved into third with a 3-0 job on the New York Giants. Brooklyn and Philadelphia were idle.

In the American, the New York Yankees made it three straight over Washington, winning 9-6 on five unearned runs as Mickey Mantle went hitless in four trips. Boston beat Baltimore 4-1 on Bob Porterfield's four-hitter in the only other AL game scheduled.

BOSTON (AP)—The Boston Post team organization of independent schools in the East are organizing a conference for football competition and will begin a league schedule in 1959.

The Post story said Boston College, Boston University, Colgate, Holy Cross, Penn State, Pittsburgh and Syracuse are involved.

For some time it has been known that Eastern independents were feeling the pinch because of the increasing tendency in recent years of schools to join conferences for survival. The squeeze has been felt more sharply now that the Ivy League is beginning a round-robin schedule this fall.

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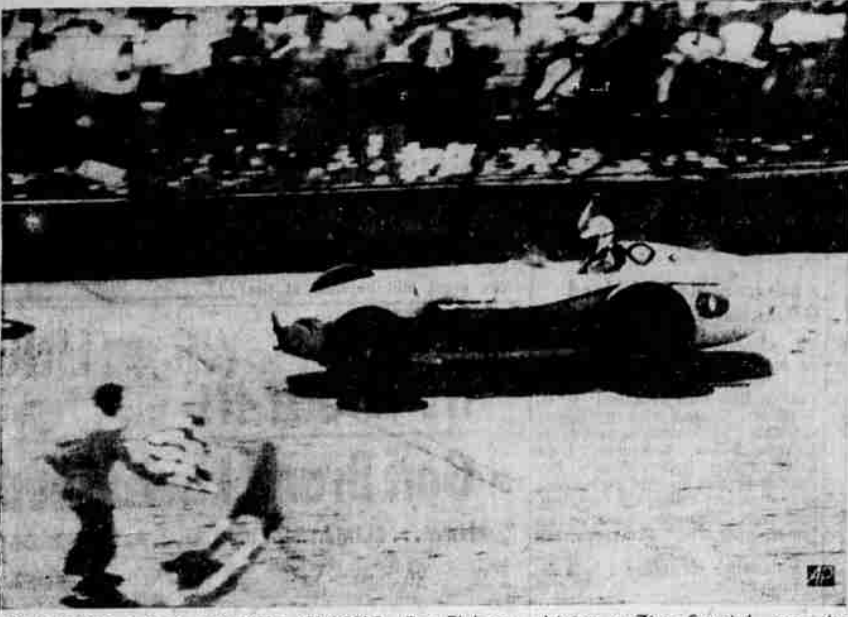

The Drain Black Sox are set to defend their Southwest Oregon League baseball title with a veteran-laden group of baseball talent.

The team is coached by ex-Coast Leaguer Roy Helser, a long-time Portland Beaver pitching mainstay and present head basketball coach at Linfield College in McMinnville.

Helser, who has been at the helm for the past five years, has coached the team to the league championship in their last four seasons.

Trout success has been poor to fair in most of the streams, but good in the accessible lakes. Trout and bass angling has been fair at Loom Lake and trout angling has been fair at Tonnelle. Goose prospects are reported on Smith River.

Marie and Saunders lakes. Trout angling on the south fork of the Coquille has been good to excellent but fair to good on all other forks of the river. West fork of the Millicoma and south fork of the Coos have been good for trout while east fork of the Millicoma has been fair. Striped bass angling on Coos River has been fair to good and shad angling has been excellent.
