Tito Pledges Against Splitting With Moscow

latter was in the welcoming party Saturday.

The Yugoslav president, who spent many years in Moscow training as a revolutionary, spoke in Russian with a heavy Yugoslav accent.

"We have come with the best wishes of our people," he said, as the huge throng in the station cheered.

"We were very happy to receive your invitation to see your wonderful country. It is not necessary to repeat that your efforts in constructing socialism have achieved great results. Since the great days of the October revolution and through the years of the great patriotic war the hearts of the Yugoslav people have been with you."

"Our history, old and new, has been full of suffering, and we can understand your suffering. Our ties have been strengthened in blood. Things were very difficult for us at one time, but we had faith the time would come when our friendship would be strengthened again."

This was an obvious reference to the long years when he was not on speaking terms with the Kremlin. He went on to make it clear that he placed the blame for this break squarely on Stalin, when he said he was sure that under the new collective leadership such a "misunderstanding" could never happen again.

It was the biggest welcome Moscow had seen since Prime Minister Nehru of India arrived last year.

"Tito, Tito," the crowd was chanting.

Methodists Ask End To AROTC At Willamette U.

PORTLAND (AP) — Willamette University was asked Friday by the Oregon Methodist Conference to discontinue its Air Reserve Officers' Training program.

The final resolution came after nearly a full day of argument on the question.

The original resolution urged trustees of the Methodist-supported school at Salem to remove "compulsory features" of the military training program.

Then Tony Perrino, Wesley Foundation director at Oregon State College, offered an amendment to the resolution which would have made allocation of a \$10,000 Methodist grant and permission to campaign for \$800,000 contingent upon the university's taking "immediate steps" toward removal of the program entirely.

He said that delegates to the national conference had gone on record against compulsory military training.

This amendment was defeated by a narrow margin.

Roland Arent of Eugene introduced a compromise resolution which was accepted. It said: "We ask the trustees of Willamette University to implement the discontinuance of the AROTC on the Christian university campus. Our conscience is heavy, knowing that we have approved financial support and have urged our churches to give additional support in their budgets if possible when we know full well that this military training program is embraced by the university."

The conference elected these officers: The Rev. H. James Jenkins, Portland, secretary; the Rev. Earl Horsell, Seaside, treasurer; Howard Berger, Lebanon, treasurer.

The invitation from the First Methodist Church of Corvallis to hold the 1957 conference there was accepted by the delegates.

Injuries Stymie Rodeo Cloning Of Karl Doering

Rodeo clown Karl Doering, who makes his work with a Brahma bull appear like child's play, fell onto bad luck Friday.

Doering was helping separate cattle at the Happy Valley Ranch near Roseburg about 11 a.m. During the work, his horse fell. The spill sent the cowboy to Douglas Community Hospital, where he learned his right foot had been broken in five places.

The break complicates Doering's schedule. He'd hoped to ride bulls at the Douglas County rodeo later this month, but that seems unlikely. The last of June he was to appear at a Eureka, Calif., professional rodeo as a rodeo clown, but Doering says it's also a dim possibility.

To make matters worse, he was getting events lined up for the second Happy Valley Stampede July 28 and 29, and the spill may slow him up a little on that. The young cowboy wasn't discouraged Saturday, however.

He said the Stampede would feature a night rodeo and a day rodeo. Doering believes the night affair will be the first held in the area. Both sessions will feature bull riding on stock from Mac Barber's ranch at Williams.

'Dr. Christian' Succumbs After Extended Illness

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Actor Jean Hersholt, famed as a humanitarian, died Saturday at his home after a long illness.

The noted actor, well known for his creation of the lovable Dr. Christian character, was only recently tendered a huge civic testimonial by the motion picture industry.

There he was lauded for his many years of philanthropy to the industry. He was a founder of the Motion Picture Country Home and for many years headed the motion picture relief fund.

French, Algerian Forces In Pitched Mountain Battle

ALGIERS, Algeria. (AP) — Two French divisions backed by jet dive bombers battled furiously Saturday to wipe out a big Algerian rebel force trapped in the "gates of iron" triangle of the desolate Biban Mountains.

The French claimed the rebels already have lost 400 men—290 dead and 110 taken prisoner—in the biggest single encounter of the 18-month-old Algerian uprising.

Military dispatches disclosed that the 19th Infantry Division had been thrown in to support the crack 27th Mechanized Division and to contain rebel units desperately striving to break out of encirclement.

Artillery and fighter-bomber planes blasted away at the rebels clinging to sun-baked crags within the triangle in eastern Algeria.

The 7th Division launched its offensive Wednesday on the Western edge of the triangle.

The rebel triangle is besieged on the east by the 19th Infantry Division.

Dispatches said the rebels at one point concentrated their forces west of Lafayette and threatened to break out of the trap. The French commander summoned fighter-bombers which dove-bombed the rebel positions, forcing the Moslems to fall back, leaving many dead and wounded strewn on the mountainsides.

REARST DENIED

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The Hungarian legation has denied press reports that Josef Cardinal Mindszenty had been rearrested.

A brief legation communique said yesterday the cardinal is "still subject to measures decreed by Hungarian authorities last summer."

Jesse H. Jones' Colorful Career Comes To An End

HOUSTON (AP) — Jesse H. Jones, 82, a Tennessee farm boy who built one of the nation's largest fortunes despite only a fifth grade education, is dead.

The wartime secretary of Commerce and head of the Reconstruction Finance Corp., died last night.

His financial abilities had impressed three presidents under whom he had served, Woodrow Wilson, Herbert Hoover and Franklin D. Roosevelt.

As head of the RFC 13 years, Jones loaned over 50 billion dollars. As the No. 1 citizen of Houston, he built the skyline of the South's largest city, owning 35 buildings ranging up to 37 stories in height. He was publisher of the Houston Chronicle and owned three of the city's largest hotels.

In Washington, Secretary of Commerce Weeks said Jones was an outstanding example of a business statesman.

Sen. Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex.) said Jones caught the early vision of Texas, and that "he was part of it and of us." Former Texas Gov. W. P. Hobby, chairman of the board of the Houston Post, said Jones was "the No. 1 citizen of Houston and one of the greatest of Americans."

Jones had extensive property holdings in New York City, Fort Worth, Dallas and Memphis, Tenn. His Houston Endowment Corp., has given millions to educational, medical and charitable institutions.

He brought the 1928 National convention to Houston by signing a blank check after San Francisco had bid \$200,000.

Naval Academy Commencement Ends Gala Week

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — A fleet of big, gray warships steamed down Chesapeake Bay Saturday with 1,825 midshipmen, putting to an end another gala June week at the Naval Academy.

Another 681 became ex-midshipmen Friday's commencement exercises and the remaining members of the brigade prepared for summer training in this country.

Those aboard the two battleships, two cruisers and 18 destroyers are members of the new first (senior) and third classes. The second class will engage in amphibious and air training during the summer.

Remaining here were many of the guests and some graduates as the round of weddings which began less than an hour after Friday's graduation continued in the academy chapel and local churches.

Parents and friends lined dockside Saturday as the middies moved out to the fleet on small boats or boarded the four destroyers tied up at Santee Pier.

Such military bans as hand holding, kissing and wearing of the middies and their sweethearts as the ships prepared for a three-month cruise in European waters. Some 1,100 midshipmen from ROTC programs at various colleges and universities will board the ships in Norfolk, Va., before they steam to sea under the flag of Rear Adm. Kenneth M. New skipper of the other battleship, the New Jersey, is Capt. Charles B. Brooks Jr., recent secretary of the academy academic board who assumed his new command this week.

Most of those commissioned into the Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps will have about two months leave before reporting to their first duty stations as junior officers.

Brakeman Held After Shooting

MONTESSANO, Wash. (AP) — Bradley Howard, 19, of Klamath Falls, Ore., a trainee for brakeman for the Southern Pacific Railroad, is being held in the county jail here for investigation after the fatal shooting of a hunting companion.

Fatally shot in the head Friday in wooded country six miles south of here while hunting birds with Howard was Donald E. Frackie, an SP brakeman from Klamath Falls.

Frackie had moved to Oregon a year ago from Montessano. He died in a Tacoma hospital Friday night, 10 hours after he was struck by a rifle bullet.

Sheriff R. F. Simmons of Grays Harbor said Howard told him Frackie fired at a bird but missed, and, bending low, told Howard to fire. Frackie stood up just as the gun discharged, and was shot in the back of the head, the sheriff said.

Three hours later the sheriff and a rescue party brought Frackie out on a stretcher and he was taken to Tacoma.

Sutherlin City Blanketed By Spray For Mosquitoes

Sutherlin today was blanketed by spray by an airplane in an experiment for mass extermination of mosquitoes and flies, which plagued the city last year.

The spray was waited down over the city for about 2 1/2 hours. City Manager Hugh McKinley said it is hoped the insects will be controlled until the end of July. If the method of spraying proves effective, the city hopes to arrange another spraying later in the summer.

The plane was flown by a World War II fighter pilot Bud Darling. He undoubtedly found his operation Saturday morning just as thrilling, since he had to fly between 30 and 60 feet off the ground. The insecticide was forced from pipes under the wing.

was \$24,000 feet. It was appraised at \$9,413.35 and sold for \$12,874.45 to South Fork Lumber Co., Drain. Competition came from Yoncalia Lumber Co.

The biggest single tract up for bid went for the appraised price of \$268,611.30 to Woolley Logging Co., Drain, the only bidder. The parcel is located on Smith River west of Drain. It contained 9,736,000 board feet of green timber, of which 8,678,000 was Douglas fir, priced at \$30.25.

Other unopposed sales were these:

Twelve mile Creek near Camas Valley, 861,000 feet of green timber sold at the \$27,389.70 appraisal to Curtis Trent, Roseburg. Douglas fir \$32.

Red Butte Road on Little River, 405,000 feet of salvage timber sold at the \$10,956.40 appraisal to U.S. Plywood Corp. Douglas fir \$31.60.

Russell Creek south of Riddle, 3,074,000 feet of green timber appraised at \$86,080.35 sold at appraisal to Umpqua Plywood Corp. Douglas fir \$28.20.

Douglas Vener successfully outbid two competitors, Western Battery and Separator Co. and Douglas County Lumber Co., for 3,508,000 feet of green timber located on Jim Creek in the Little River watershed. The company paid \$103,755.90 for the timber, appraised at \$111,081.90. Douglas was bid up from \$30.75 to \$33 in 14 bids.

In the next-hottest competitive sale, Roseburg Lumber Co. outbid Round Prairie Lumber Co. for 2,467,000 feet of timber located on Wildcat Creek in the Olalla drainage. The timber had been appraised at \$70,192.50 and sold for \$76,998.25. Douglas fir was bid up from \$29.30 to \$32.25.

Roseburg Lumber bought a second tract in the Wildcat Creek vicinity, outbidding Douglas County Lumber Co. for the purchase. The parcel contained 2,033,000 feet of timber and was appraised at \$54,340. It sold for \$60,689.35. The winning bidder entered the appraisal price as the first bid, was raised once by Douglas County Lumber Co. and Round Prairie Lumber Co.

The 10th sale involved 2,346,000 feet of salvage timber near Camas Valley. It was purchased by Douglas County Lumber Co. for \$75,113.70. It had been appraised at \$70,758.35. Douglas fir was pushed up from \$31.05 to \$33. Other bidders were Roseburg Lumber Co. and Green Valley Lumber Co.

A large sale on Schultz Creek about 10 miles east of Tiller attracted three bidders, with Umpqua Plywood Corp. eventually buying the trees. It contained 4,274,000 feet of timber, appraised at \$115,220.25. Umpqua Plywood paid \$124,372.20 for the block. Douglas fir went up from \$28.45 to \$31. Other bidders were Roseburg Lumber Co. and Round Prairie Lumber Co.

Police Break Up Rioting In Japan

TOKYO (AP) — Four days of fighting and chaos in Japan's Parliament ended at least temporarily Saturday with final passage of bills strengthening government control of schools.

The upper house voted 143-69 for final approval of the measures. This opens the way for action on ratifying the Japan-Philippines reparations pact and debating 31 other major bills before the session ends Sunday.

The vote came after police were summoned to the floor to break up fighting and mob tactics used by outnumbered Socialists to stall a vote on the school program after it was given No. 1 priority by Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama's Conservative backers.

More than 30 members, employees and guards of the Parliament have been injured in the fighting. The battling Socialists and Conservatives have thrown punches, hurled books, mobbed parliamentary officials and shouted curses.

One of the approved measures gives the government tighter control over public schools and will weaken the hold of the leftist-led Japan Teachers' Union.

Others would establish a national defense council, redistrict the nation for the upper house elections in July, give local governments more authority in levying and collecting taxes, and set up a research council to draft revision of the occupation-imposed constitution.

As Parliament prepared for another all-night session, it seemed the only step that could save the major bills would be withdrawal of administration priority on the education bill.

Body Of Doctor Sighted In Yosemite Cravasse

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK, Calif. (AP) — The body of Dr. Robert Franklin Johnson of San Francisco was located Saturday by a helicopter pilot who reported the man apparently had fallen 300 feet off a sheer cliff.

Dr. Johnson, an intern at San Francisco Hospital, was the son of Prof. Franklin P. Johnson of Chicago.

Chief ranger Oscar A. Sederger said the body was seen in a deep cravasse about 700 or 800 feet below the rim of Yosemite Valley canyon.

Sederger said it appeared Dr. Johnson, 28, who disappeared Sunday while on a short hike, had fallen from a sheer cliff.

Sederger said a ground party would attempt to recover the body.
