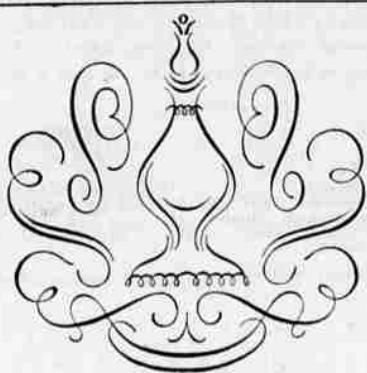

Two Young Ex-Servicemen Return From Germany

Two young ex-servicemen, with more world travel behind them than most people experience in a lifetime, returned to Douglas County recently.

They are William H. (Bill) Johnson of Roseburg and Ervin Havron of Riddle. Last month they were discharged from the U. S. Army after having completed 28 months in Germany.

Their story is more than usual. Bill and Erv enlisted in the Army June 9, 1953. After physicals in Portland, they were inducted in Fort Lewis, Wash. Havron was sent to Ft. Ord, Calif., Johnson to Camp Roberts in the same state. Both took leadership training at Ft. Ord.

In January of 1954 they were shipped overseas. Johnson went to Bournemouth in the French zone, Havron to Munich in the American zone.

During their stay in Europe, both became specialists in third class. Havron was assigned to the 11th Airborne Division and Johnson to the Second Armored Division. They worked with armored tanks.
