Army Men To Visit Roseburg Reserves

The purpose of their visit will be to discuss Army Reserve recruiting and public information activities in Roseburg, Army sources said today.

Williams, a native Oregonian and former 41st Division National Guardsman, came to Oregon from Korea.

Oregon Crop Prices Show Another Increase

PORTLAND (AP) — Oregon crop prices increased again in the mid-April to mid-May period to register the seventh consecutive monthly rise.

The federal Crop Reporting Service said crop prices went up two per cent in the period. The price index still was four per cent under that of a year ago.

Cattle, lambs, hogs, broilers and wool led the livestock increase, while higher prices for winter pears and potatoes led the field crop boost.

Soil Bank Payments Given To Farmers For What They Do

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farmers will get payments under the government's new \$1,200,000,000 year-long soil bank program only for what they themselves do to reduce production of crops now in surplus.

They will get no payments on reductions caused by nature through drought, floods, hailstorms, insects and the like.

Agriculture Department officials said today this will be the rule in fixing payments under the soil bank plan for 1956 crops.

The soil bank is designed to reduce production of wheat, cotton, corn, peanuts, rice and tobacco by the offer of government subsidies to farmers for planting fewer acres than are allotted them.

The farmer may plow under a poor immature crop and get a soil

bank payment — but only on the amount of the estimated production thus eliminated.

These rulings greatly narrow the 1956 program from that indicated by Secretary of Agriculture Benson at a news conference May 31. At that time, his comments and a press release distributed by his department were interpreted as indicating that any immature crop — whether it had good or poor prospects — would be eligible for full payment if plowed up. Benson put a different light on the program in a speech at Beaver Dam, Wis.

"To the end that I am able I intend to see that the nation gets a dollar's worth of surplus reduction or a dollar's worth of conservation for every dollar paid out," he said. "We should not also load upon the program responsibility for drought relief, flood relief and credit needs."
