It's been a long haul, but Detroit's not-so-lucky Tigers have the American League by the tail at the moment. They're sprinting along on a seven-game winning streak.

Three weeks ago Manager Bucky Harris had a last-place club. He's still 5 1/2 games out of the lead, but up in the first division and only a skip and a jump out of third.

Every one of the Tigers has put his bat to work in the seven-game success story—longest in the majors this season. Harvey Kuenn, batting .441 in that span, and Ray Boone, at .407, are the big guns. Kuenn was 3-for-8 and Boone hammered home five runs with a homer, double and two singles in five trips last night on the Tigers' outpowered Boston's Red Sox 14-11. Frank House, batting .371 on a part-time basis in Harris' platooning plans in the streak, muscled in with a three-run homer.

New York's first-place lead dwindled to 3 1/2 games, mean-

while, as Kansas City handed the Yankees—who made five errors—their fourth straight defeat 7-4 despite homers to Yogi Berra, Joe Collins and Mickey Mantle, who hit his 21st. Cleveland, with Bob Lemon winning his seventh, took over second by belting Baltimore 8-3. Chicago's White Sox slipped to third with a 3-1 loss at Washington.

Things are much cozier in the National Pittsburgh, despite a 7-3 defeat at Chicago, has a four-percentage-point hold on the lead over Cincinnati, which trounced Philadelphia 9-4. It's a virtual three-way tie for first, with St. Louis three points back of the Redlegs after beating New York, 2-1 while the Brooklyn Dodgers tripped Milwaukee to fourth 6-1 on Roger Craig's two-hitter.

For all their thumping, the Tigers had a ninth-inning scare as the Red Sox scored six times. Don Buddin socked a three-run homer in the rally off reliever Walt Masterson. Billy Klaus and Jackie Jensen also homered for the Sox, off starter Virgil Trucks, who won his second. Bob Porterfield was the loser.

Cougars, Webfoots Dominate All-Stars

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Washington State, the long-shot winner of the Pacific Coast Conference baseball pennant, and Oregon placed four men apiece on the 1956 Northern Division all-star team.

WSC players named to the mythical nine selected by the Northern Division coaches and athletic publicity directors were catcher Bill Rich, second baseman Gordon Hersey, third baseman Bill Mashburn and pitcher Jerry Barlow. First baseman Dick Schlossstein, shortstop John Keller, outfielder Terry Maddox and pitcher Don Lane were selected to represent Oregon, runnerup to WSC in the Northern Division flag chase, on the all-star team.

Washington State's State bred through the Northern Division schedule and then took all the PCC marbles by shellacking the University of Southern California in two straight games.

The Cougars play Bradley University in the opening round of the "college world series" sponsored by the NCAA at Omaha Saturday night.

Outfielders Jerry Exley of Oregon State and Ron Braden of Idaho completed the 10-man all-star team.

Maddox and Schlossstein were unanimous choices. Exley and Maddox were repeaters from the 1955 all-star squad.

Farm Fish Ponds Growing In Popularity In Oregon

Want to go trout fishing every day of the week?

Well, perhaps that's carrying a good thing a little too far. But a lot of farmers and outdoorsmen in Oregon are going trout fishing just about as often as they want in farm and other private ponds around the state.

They're catching good fish, too. For instance, Orville Cutsforth has a trout pond on his ranch in Morrow County. In May of 1954, he planted about 200 five-inch trout in his two-thirds acre pond. That fall, he was pulling out rainbow trout 11 1/2 to 12 1/2 inches long.

Fish Grow Rapidly

The next spring, when the pond was seined to see how trout had done over the winter, rainbows were 14 inches long and weighed up to 17 ounces. These fish were fat, thick, and deep-bodied. Their small heads indicated rapid growth.

And Andy Landforce, Oregon State College wildlife management specialist, says good ponds anywhere in Oregon can grow fish like this if the pond is properly managed.

Only trouble with Cutsforth's pond was that he didn't plant enough fish. While he was catching large trout, the nibbles on his hook were few and far between and he wasn't having as much fishing fun as he wanted. Checking on the problem, Landforce found there was so much natural food available that the trout usually weren't interested in striking at an artificial lure. So it was suggested that Cutsforth plant twice as many rainbow trout the next time he stocks his pond.

Hungry Trout Bite

Each pond has the room and food in support just so many fish, Landforce pointed out. And planting enough fish to fill the pond keeps the fish hungry enough to bite at a line.

Of course, trout in a fully-stocked pond won't grow as fast as the ones in Cutsforth's pond. But there should be a lot more fun for the man on the other end of the line, and the fishing will last much longer.

For details on a trout pond of your own, stop in and visit your local county agent or Oregon Game Commission representative. They can help you design and maintain a successful trout pond you'll be proud of, Landforce says.

CASCADE, Idaho (AP) — A sudden storm on an Idaho mountain lake overturned a boat Monday and dumped a father-and-son fishing foursome into the chilly waters.

Both fathers and the son of one drowned. The other son was missing and also presumed drowned.

The four were fishing at Cascade reservoir, about 75 miles north of Boise in southwestern Idaho, on the first day of the state's 1956 fishing season.

Searchers found the bodies of George G. Thomas, 27, Middleton, Idaho, and his 6-year-old son, George Thomas Jr., and Floyd Case, 37, Caldwell, Idaho. Still missing was Case's 11-year-old son, Clifford.

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PCC Grid Tests Slated For TV

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The National Broadcasting Co. says it has been given exclusive rights to telecast Pacific Coast Conference football games next fall.

John K. West, vice president, NBC Pacific Division, and Al Masters, chairman of the PCC's TV-Radio Committee, announced jointly Monday that these five PCC games have been added to the schedule.

Sept. 19, UCLA-Michigan at Ann Arbor; Oct. 13, Oregon State-California at Corvallis; Oct. 20, USC-Washington at Los Angeles; Nov. 3, California-Oregon at Berkeley; Nov. 17, Stanford-Washington at Palo Alto. These telecasts will be restricted to the NCAA District 8, including Washington, Oregon, California, Idaho and Nevada.

Eight previously announced telecasts of NCAA games included: Sept. 22, Kentucky-Georgia Tech at Lexington, Ky.; Oct. 6, Texas Christian-Arkansas at Fort Worth; Oct. 27, Notre Dame-Idaho at South Bend; Nov. 10, a Big Ten game to be selected; Nov. 22, Oregon-Oregon State at Corvallis; Nov. 24, UCLA-USC at Los Angeles; Dec. 1, Army-Navy at Philadelphia; Dec. 8, Miami-Pittsburgh at Miami.

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
