WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Chenoweth (R-Colo.) said Wednesday he has worked out a trade under which he agreed to switch his position and vote for the Hells Canyon Dam bill in the House Interior Committee.

'Save Oregon Salmon Day' Set For Saturday

Saturday has been declared "save Oregon salmon day" by the Oregon Wildlife Federation.

Throughout Oregon, a concerted effort will be made Saturday to secure the remaining 10,000 signatures required to have the coastal streams closed to commercial netting.

According to Charles Collins, Roseburg Rod and Gun Club president, members of the club will circulate petitions on shopping center parking lots around Roseburg Saturday. Collins requested Thursday that persons having outstanding petitions—mail them to headquarters no later than Saturday evening.

If the initiative petition to close the streams is successful, voters will have an opportunity to express their opinion in the November election. Collins said if the measure is voted into effect, other coastal streams would be regulated similar to the Umpqua River. It has been closed to netting for several years.

Charge Against Worden Dismissed By Court

A charge against John Henry Worden of 781 Newton Creek Road has been dismissed in Douglas County District Court.

After a preliminary hearing, District Judge Warren Woodruff ruled that not enough evidence existed to constitute a crime. Worden was originally charged with assault with intent to commit great bodily harm. It was alleged he had threatened to hit a man with a board.

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Ike Intervenes In House Debate On Foreign Aid

BULLETIN

WASHINGTON (AP)—Spurning eleven-hour appeals by President Eisenhower and House leaders of both parties, the House Thursday backed a slash of more than a billion dollars in Eisenhower's foreign aid request.

A 192-112 standing vote rejected a leadership move to add 600 million dollars to the \$3,891,000,000 aid bill approved by the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower intervened in House debate on his foreign aid program Thursday with a letter saying America's effort for world peace would be "seriously impaired" by proposed cuts.

Eisenhower's letter was sent to House Republican leader Martin (Mass.), who read it dramatically to the House as a vote approached on the aid bill.

"Dear Joe" letter was dated Thursday.

The President said he wrote the letter in order "to remove any possible doubt" about where he stands on the issue.

Martin and Speaker Rayburn (O-Tex.) at Eisenhower's strong urging, are pushing for addition of 600 million dollars to the bill reported out by the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

"Grave consequences are involved in this legislation," the President's letter said, "and the free world cannot afford to move hesitatingly and uncertainly."

He said "I'm deeply convinced"

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County Receives Rental Fee From Sinclair Oil Co.

Douglas County has received an annual rental fee of \$3,248 from the Sinclair Oil Co. as its payment for 32,480 acres which it has leased from the county.

Robert Kitchel, lands department supervisor, said most of the land the company has leased from the county is located in the northern and eastern part of the county.

Under the lease agreement with the county, the oil company has only one year in which to drill for oil if it wishes to continue the lease. It was stipulated in the lease agreement that it must drill on one of two townships in the Redford area before June 1, 1957. The company must drill to a depth of at least 6,500 feet.

Meanwhile, the county also has lease agreements with Oil Development Inc. for 31,349 acres and Coos Bay Oil and Gas Co. for 2,655 acres.

Mr. and Mrs. Baird's Condition Said 'Good'

The condition of Mr. and Mrs. Blake Baird of Umpqua was reported "good" this morning by personnel at Douglas Community Hospital.

Mr. and Mrs. Baird were transferred Wednesday night to the Roseburg hospital where they were taken Sunday.

Two-Car Accident Sends 3 Persons To Hospital

A two-car accident one half mile south of the Riddle Junction Wednesday at 11 p.m. sent three persons to Forest Glen Hospital in Canyonville for emergency treatment of minor injuries. All were subsequently released, hospital personnel said.

Richard S. Gates Resigns Special Education Position

The resignation of Richard S. (Dick) Gates, head of the department of special education for the Roseburg school district, has been announced by Supt. M. C. Deller.

Gates is resigning to become director of special education services at the Cedar Hills elementary schools near Portland. He will start work there Aug. 15.

Gates said he will remain in Roseburg through most of the summer.

He came to Douglas County two years ago from LaGrange, where he had directed special education for the district. He is married. He and his wife, Jewell, and two children, Stanton, 8, and Jeffrey, 2, reside at 344 W. Sherwood Ave.

Gates, 30, received his bachelor of science in psychology from Lewis and Clark College in Portland and his masters in special education from the University of Oregon. He plans to continue work for his doctorate in Portland.

Active in many fields, Gates was chairman of the governing committee for Douglas County during "employ the physically handicapped week." He was treasurer for the Roseburg Assn. for Retarded Children and director-at-large for the Robin-Dale School, Inc. He is a member of the Episcopal church.

New Park Site Purchase Asked

Acquisition of the county's 20th dedicated park is in process of negotiation. It will, if purchased, consist of 10 acres on the Garden Valley side of the Umpqua River, about a quarter of a mile below the junction of the North and South forks, Charles S. Collins, park supervisor reports.

The purchase of the property for \$10,000 has been recommended to the county court and budget committee.

Purchase would include taking over by the county of about a mile of private road which gives access to the property.

The park, Collins reports, would be developed for picnicking, swimming, boat launching and other recreational use.

Roseburg School Allocated Funds

Roseburg School District No. 4 has been allocated \$82,500 from federal funds for school construction purposes, Congressman Harris Ellsworth reported to The News-Review today.

The money is made available from appropriations made to assist schools in areas where federal operations have increased population and school enrollment.

The district, Ellsworth reports, will receive 10 per cent of the appropriation when building plans are approved, 30 per cent when bids are accepted, and the balance as construction proceeds.

Riddle School District Approves Special Levy

The Riddle School District tax levy for \$81,187 outside the 6 per cent limitation, was passed Wednesday by a margin of 49 votes, reports Correspondent Erna Best.

The total budget for District 70 is \$269,235. The levy was needed due to increased enrollment and a need for increased teaching and custodial staffs, Mrs. Best said.

The voting was: Yes, 75, and no, 26.

U.N. Command To Move Out Inspection Teams

PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP)—The U.N. command served notice on the Communists today that they are going ahead with plans to move the neutral truce inspection teams out of South Korea.

Army To Weed Out Reserves In New Move

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army announced today it will discharge 475,000 ready reservists and transfer 500,000 others to the standby reserve list.

It described the action as a wholesale effort to terminate the military service liability of World War II and Korean veterans and to weed out dead wood.

An Army announcement said this screening process will take place in the 12 months starting July 1. When completed, the Army said, it will leave in the ready reserve only those who are fit, who would be called to active duty promptly in time of war or a national emergency declared by Congress or the President.

The standby reserve is liable for active service only in time of war or in an emergency declared by Congress.

The Army's ready reserve now has a nominal strength of 1,885,000, exclusive of the National Guard, which will number 407,000 by the end of this month. The present strength of the standby reserve is only 8,500.

Oakland Planning Summer Program Of Recreation

Oakland may have \$1,000 to use for a summer recreational program if the 1956-57 district school budget is approved.

The announcement was made this week at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce. An item of \$500 was included in the recently approved city budget and the school budget contains a similar amount to be voted on June 18.

Such a recreational program will get under way as soon as money is available, according to corresponding clerk and now housing the Chamber of Commerce sponsored the move for such a program.

Meanwhile it was announced that the annual Chamber picnic is scheduled at Stearns Park west of Oakland July 9. At the picnic, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Sefton will be honored on their 60th wedding anniversary.

Regular meetings of the chamber have been discontinued until Oct. 1.

Bulgianin Sends Letter To Ike

WASHINGTON (AP)—Soviet Premier Bulganin sent a new letter on Russian-American relations to President Eisenhower Thursday.

It was delivered to Secretary of State Dulles by Ambassador Gorbunov.

Zarubin indicated to reporters that the document would be made public "very soon" but declined to confirm their speculation that it concerned disarmament or say whether it carried some new Soviet proposal.

He pointed out that there had been an exchange of letters over many months between Bulganin and Eisenhower.

New York Gunmen Get Huge Haul In Gems

NEW YORK (AP)—Three identically costumed gunmen snatched two gem brokerage firm employees off a Greenwich Village street yesterday and fled with \$211,000 worth of cut and uncut diamonds.

Albert C. Schmitt, 32, and Eugene Epsky, 27, said each gunman wore dark goggles, white gloves, peaked hats and denim work clothes similar to those of subway motormen.

Evaluators Hope To Name Chairman Friday Evening

Members of the evaluation steering committee for the Roseburg school district hope to name a chairman Friday evening.

Meanwhile, meeting for the first time Wednesday night, the group outlined some of the duties of chairman, set up their own organization within the committee and mulled the matter of procedure in evaluation.

By group consent, the permanent chairman will not be named until Friday evening.

Members of the steering committee named three permanent officers: James Richmond, vice chairman; Patricia Mayo, secretary; and Mrs. Jack Chapman, treasurer. Richmond will assume the chair in the absence of the chairman.

A score of persons were present to watch nine of the 10 committee members swing into action. Missing was committee member Maurice Hallmark.

In response to questions from the committee, temporary Chairman Crook explained school board ideas concerning the committee. He noted it had been set up because the board thought the public wanted it, that the committee would name its own chairman and 11th member and that the group would have to determine what the public wants. He added that the board wanted the committee to bring back a framework of work operation to the board for examination. "This committee can be a wonderful thing," he said.

Following election of committee officers, the group went into an executive session to discuss selection of a chairman. By common consent members of the press were present.

New Ford Agency Will Be Opened Soon In Sutherlin

Articles of incorporation were filed today in Salem for the Harry Ford Inc., of Sutherlin. Incorporators listed were Fred B. Lockwood, S. Gordon Smith and Harry Held. It was incorporated for \$50,000, according to an Associated Press release.

Lockwood said today that the business will open in the near future in the building owned by George West and now housing the Umpqua Valley Appliance store in Sutherlin. He said that the building will be remodeled to make it adequate for the selling and servicing of new Ford Motor Co. products.

The company has been set up to serve the Sutherlin, Oakland and Yoncalla areas, Lockwood said.

Held has been the manager of the Floyd Githens Motor Co. in Cottage Grove for several years, and will be the manager of the Sutherlin incorporation, Lockwood said.

Senate Asked To Hold Hearing On ICC Ruling

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Commerce Committee Tuesday asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to hold public hearings on disputed proposed regulations to govern handling of boxcars in the Pacific Northwest.

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) told the Senate Wednesday the committee, which he heads, "will make or is in the process of making" a request for the hearings.

The restrictions, which have not yet become effective, would ban a Pacific Northwest marketing custom in which cars are loaded with lumber and started eastward before the lumber is actually bought. The cars get specific directions from the ICC.

The ICC Monday notified the Ellsworth (R-Ore.) it would not hold hearings in the Pacific Northwest before putting the order into effect.

Communist, Nationalist Gun Battle Is Reported

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—The Defense Ministry claimed today that Nationalist warships operating near the offshore island of Matsu had silenced Communist guns on the China mainland in two duels.

The ministry said the Red guns fired a total of 91 rounds during the exchange early yesterday. The Nationalists were on patrol off the mainland.

The Nationalists also denied Peiping radio reports that Red shore guns had sunk two Nationalist warships off the mouth of the Min River, near Matsu, on June 4, and that Red aircraft carriers had downed a Nationalist jet off Swatow June 5.

DILLARD HEARING SET

A public hearing on the proposed Dillard school budget which will be resubmitted to voters June 18, is scheduled for Friday at 8 p.m. in the Douglas High School cafeteria. The proposal seeks \$317,485 outside the 5 per cent limitation. Before budget committee members had reworked the budget, it had been \$348,751.

Tito Denies Visit To Alter US Friendship

MOSCOW (AP)—President Tito says his visit to Russia will not affect Yugoslavia's friendly relations with the United States.

Talking with reporters at a Kremlin reception last night, the Yugoslav chief brushed aside as "not important" Sen. McCarthy's move in the Senate to cut off U.S. aid to Yugoslavia because of Tito's trip to Moscow.

"Our relations with the United States will not suffer," Tito said, when asked about the McCarthy resolution. "Our friendship with the United States will continue as before our trip here."

When an American remarked that he should journey to Washington to make sure there was no misunderstanding of his intentions, Tito replied: "If I am invited, why not? But first I must be invited."

Some 1,000 diplomats and Soviet leaders, including Communist party chief Nikita Khrushchev and Premier Bulganin, attended the gala reception in the Kremlin's gold and marble St. George's Hall.

During the exchange of toasts, Tito stressed Yugoslavia's independent foreign policy.

Reserve Tickets For Big Rodeo To Go On Sale

Reserve tickets for the Douglas County Rodeo go on sale next Wednesday in downtown Roseburg. The rodeo will be held June 23 and 24.

The ticket booth will be located on Jackson Street, according to Chairman Jean Petrequin. He said the bright red booth will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. June 13 to 22 and a half day on June 23.

Ticket sales will be handled during the hours by members of the Jay-Cettes, Lady Lions and the Douglas County Mounted Sheriff's posse.

Petrequin said reserve and general admission tickets would be on sale at the fairgrounds during the days of the rodeo. He said more information concerning sale of general admission tickets would be announced soon.

2,000 Demonstrators Riot In French Station

LE HAVRE, France (AP)—Two thousand demonstrators rioted in the railway station here Thursday, protesting the departure of 15 Le Havre army reservists for duty in rearmament of Algeria.

Police hurling tear gas charged into the massed demonstrators swarming over station platforms and tracks in front of the halted train carrying the reservists.

The rioters knocked down and trampled the police commissioner during efforts to control the mob. Several other policemen were injured and some of the demonstrators arrested.

Police finally were able to clear the railway station and the train carrying the reservists left for Paris after several cars unoccupied by the rioters were reconnected.

The demonstration was similar to others which have erupted all over the country in recent weeks in protest against the recall of reservists for duty in Algeria.

Singer Frank Parker To Quit Godfrey Show

NEW YORK (AP)—Singer Frank Parker, one of the last veterans of the Arthur Godfrey show, Thursday was reported planning to quit the fold when his contract expires next month.

Parker, it was said, could have remained without a contract but would have been subject to call for appearances on the radio-TV programs on a nonexclusive basis.

"With no promise of work for the future, Frank feels he will be better off severing all future ties," the New York Journal-American quoted an unnamed CBS source.

Parker, 35, has been with Godfrey six and a half years, earning between \$60,000 and \$85,000 a year.

Adm. Joy Dies From Leukemia

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Retired Adm. Charles Turner Joy, who headed the United Nations truce team for 11 months of tedious armistice negotiations with the Communists in Korea, died yesterday. He was 61.

Joy died in the naval hospital here. His widow Martha Ann said he had leukemia the past four years.

The admiral was commander of U.N. naval forces in the Korean War and in 1951 was named senior delegate of the U.N. Command delegation to the Korean armistice conference.

He asked to be relieved as chief negotiator on May 22, 1952, expressing distrust of the Chinese Communists but agreeing the talks were the desired course for the United Nations.

"How Joy declared in his book, 'Let Communists Negotiate,' that the U.N. should not have accepted the Korean armistice. Instead, he said, the U.N. should have pursued victory in Korea."

In the information filed against Baldwin today, it is charged that Baldwin "illegally and fraudulently embezzled and fraudulently converted to his own use" the \$5,000 in question.

It says that the money belonged to Margaret Stiller as executrix of the estate and that the money came into Baldwin's possession "by virtue of his employment" by her.

Conviction of such a crime carries a maximum penalty of 10 years in prison.

Watchmaker Concludes North Atlantic Flight

PRESTWICK, Scotland (AP)—Peter Glueckmann, 30-year-old San Francisco watchmaker, flew in here today in his single-engine plane after a two-stop solo flight from New York.

It is Glueckmann's third solo Atlantic flight.

Climbing out of his small yellow and brown plane, Glueckmann said the trip was uneventful except for bad weather on the 1,800-mile stretch between New York and Greenland. He left New York Monday and stopped at Greenland and Iceland.
