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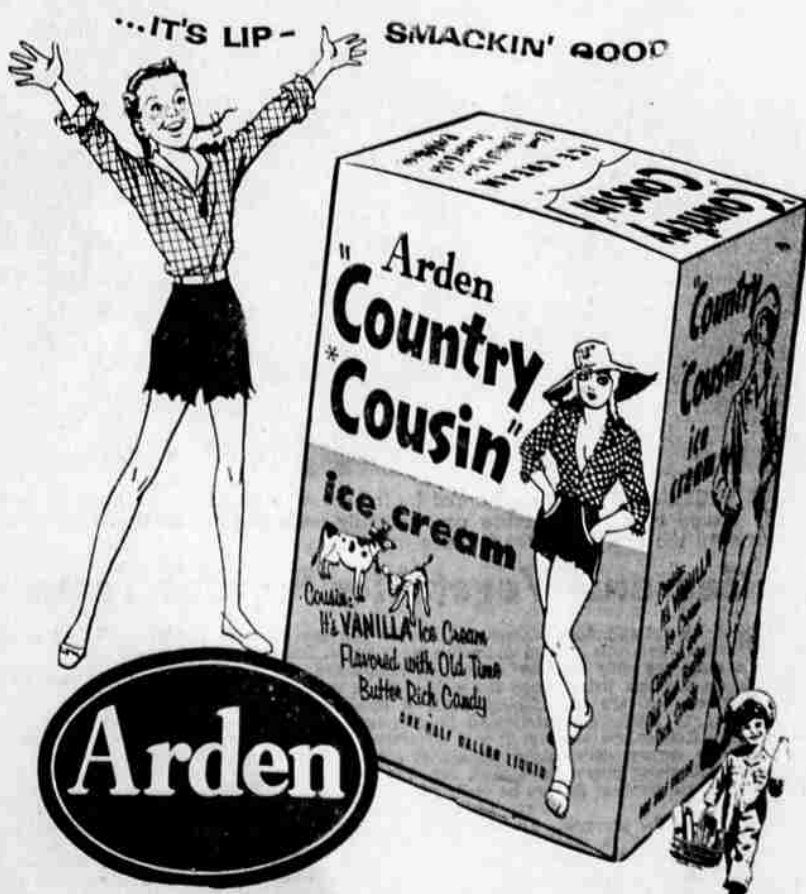
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110 Pupils Enroll In Summer School

Marine Tragedy May Account For Low Signup

WASHINGTON — Marine officers attribute a sharp April drop in enlistments chiefly to raised corps standards but acknowledge that another factor may be the drownings of six recruits on a forced night march.

The Marine Corps was disclosed Tuesday to have signed up in April 1,321 recruits—a figure nearly two-thirds less than the average for the six preceding months. Corps spokesmen said that while the drownings may be responsible "to some degree," other considerations are (A) higher standards for new recruits and (B) a traditional low recruiting rate in April. More than a week before the tragedy at Parris Island, S. C., the corps had announced plans to reduce from 26 to 18 per cent the number it would accept from among recruit candidates who fall in the lowest mental and physical category.

Small Atom Generator New Project Of AEC

WASHINGTON — The Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) said Wednesday it soon will embark on a new project aimed at developing small atomic-powered electric generator plants for military or civilian use.

The AEC said it soon will invite qualified firms to help design a gas-cooled reactor experiment at the national reactor testing station in Idaho. It estimated the project will cost four million dollars over a period of several years.

The gas-cooled reactor project, the eighth type chosen for development work, "is intended to develop engineering data and experience for design and construction of military package power reactors and small civilian central station power plants," the AEC said.

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Neuberger Asks Probe Of Profits On Production

WASHINGTON — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Tuesday President Eisenhower should appoint a commission to investigate industrial profits from defense production.

He mentioned a recent report by a presidential study commission which he said stated that "military service in time of war or peace is an obligation of citizenship."

Neuberger referred to a group, headed by retired Gen. Omar Bradley, which proposed a gradual reduction of non-service-connected veterans pensions as social security and other retirement benefits increase.

"If a presidential study commission can apply the standard of 'obligation of citizenship' to those called upon to risk their lives for our country during a military emergency," Neuberger said, "what about the obligation of citizenship of those who manufacture the armaments which those soldiers and sailors must take into battle?"

"Is the administration going to have one of its commissions say that, under modern conditions, special veterans' benefits have outlived their justification and should be diminished, and do nothing to cut down on the immense profits which modern defense budgets pour into the coffers of the corporations which are the chief suppliers of defense materials?"

Neuberger contended the administration has shown more concern for economy in connection with benefits for former servicemen than it has where corporate profits on defense orders are involved.

"I now call upon him (Eisenhower) to appoint a presidential commission to study the role of defense contracts and defense profits in our economy," the senator said.

Autoists Sideswipe Car, Buy Owner Another One

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Chief Joseph Dedication Scheduled Next Week

BRIDGEPORT, Wash. — A party of congressmen and officials from Washington, headed by presidential assistant Harold E. Stassen, arrives here next week for dedication of Chief Joseph Dam, the 158-million-dollar power project on the Columbia River.

Stassen will be the principal speaker at the dedication, set for 2 p.m. Tuesday.

Others expected here include George H. Roderick, assistant Army secretary; Reps. Horan and Tolleson of Washington State; Sen. Dworshak, Idaho; Len Jordan, chairman of the joint committee on U.S.-Canada water resources, and Maj. Gen. E. C. Ischner, assistant chief of Army Engineers.

Four generators now are in operation at Chief Joseph, where construction started in 1951 and first power was produced last August. Present contracts call for installation of a total of 16 power units by the end of 1958.
