\$55,000 Deficit Found In Lebanon City Funds

LEBANON, Ore. — Slipshod bookkeeping and handling of finances have resulted in a \$55,000 deficit for the city of Lebanon, a state audit of city books disclosed here.

City officials said the audit disclosed faulty practices began a number of years ago. City officials said the blame could not be laid to any individual. The city had requested the audit.

Most of the deficit came from the practice of putting into the general fund money paid by residents for street improvements. The money should have been applied toward retirement of bonds, auditors reported.

As a result the city now proposes a bond issue to pay off the \$55,000 deficit, complete the sewerage disposal plant and pay for additional street equipment.

Most Borrowers Covered By Mortgage Insurance

SALEM, Ore. — Ninety-one percent of the borrowers under the state's veterans farm and home loan program are covered by mortgage cancellation life insurance, the state Veterans Department said Wednesday.

The insurance, which took effect March 1, will pay off mortgages if the borrower dies.

There are 8,360 veterans covered, and only 825 failed to take out the insurance.
