The Portland Beavers have eight games to go to catch Los Angeles, running strong atop the Pacific Coast League, but the way the Beavers are winning the Angels better not relax.

Portland took its eighth straight Wednesday night, beating San Diego 3-2 on Bob Darnell's six-hitter. The victory left the Beavers only two percentage points behind third place Sacramento, which got caught in the Los Angeles buzz-saw 17-7 and 5-0.

A week ago Portland was in sixth place, 10½ games out. But the Beavers stand a good chance to take over third Thursday night with the Angels still at Sacramento and eight-game winner Rene Valdes going for the Beavers at San Diego.

The Yakima Bears, with an 8½ game lead over the Wenatchee Chiefs, fattened their Northwest League lead to three and a half games Wednesday night.

The Bears dropped Salem twice, 2-1 and 12-6, while Wenatchee gained a split with the second-place Lewiston Braves, winning the opener 4-2 and losing the nightcap 10-9. Rain washed out the Tri-City-Indians game at Spokane.

Yakima won the opener from the Senators on Don Boenker's four-hitter. Boenker's mound opponent, Ad Satalich, was tagged for only six hits but both teams made three errors.

Herman Lewis slammed out five hits, including two homers and a double, in five trips to the plate for the Bears in the second game. His first rounder, a triple, in the fifth, was good for two runs. The second, in the seventh, was good for three.

A high, inside pitch that narrowly missed Chuck Essegian's head precipitated a free for all in the ninth. Essegian charged Yakima pitcher Charlie Druemond and before the smoke of battle cleared almost all players on both sides had joined in the fist-cuffs. Essegian was booed.

Chuck Lybeck tossed a six-hitter at the Bears in the opener at Lewiston. The Chiefs coupled two singles, a sacrifice and an error for three runs in the first inning and they never were headed.

An error, a walk and singles by Howard Keefe, Bruce McIntosh and Joe Jacobs produced three runs and victory for the Braves in the ninth inning of the afterpiece.
