German Claims Finding Oldest Traces Of Man

HAMBURG, Germany (AP) — A German archeologist claimed Wednesday that he has discovered the oldest traces of man.

Dr. Alfred Rust said he has uncovered 50 handmade, sandstone tools which he estimates are one million years old in a gravel pit in Communist East Germany.

The archeologist said that there has been no previous evidence that man lived much more than 500,000 years ago.

Rust, who is connected with the Schleswig-Holstein State Museum at Schleswig, told reporters the tools were unearthed near Meiningen, 10 miles from the West German border.

Rust said the discovery indicates that man inhabited Northern Europe between two and five million years ago.
