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Cerebral Palsy Victim Gets Degree In Science

PORTLAND — A cerebral palsy victim who cannot walk and speaks only with extreme difficulty Sunday will receive a bachelor of science degree at Portland State College, topping the honors list at the school's first commencement.

David Ingerson, 26, typed all his college papers on a typewriter—slowly pecked out at four or five words a minute—because his stricken fingers cannot guide a pencil. He never went to high school but was privately tutored, and then wanted to enter Portland State.

His mother, Mrs. Ernest Ingerson, said "we were naturally concerned that the hustle and bustle of a public institution would get him down."

But it didn't, and David finished his four-year course with a grade point average of 3.81 in a system with 4.0 as straight A.

Foreign Office Reveals Story Of Spy Conviction

LONDON — The Foreign Office revealed Thursday a British court in the World War II period sentenced Capt. John Herbert King to 10 years in prison for giving secrets to the Soviet Union in September, 1939. He was freed after the war.

A Foreign Office spokesman said King had been convicted on evidence relayed from the United States.

King was a retired army officer working in the communications sections of the Foreign Office.

The Foreign Office statement followed testimony given to a U.S. Senate investigating committee that Britain executed a Soviet spy in the Tower of London in 1950.

Questions about King's present whereabouts, the spokesman said: "As far as I know he is still alive."

Asked if King is living in Britain, the spokesman said: "I believe so."

The spokesman said King had been working in a department that dealt with secret codes and highly confidential information and that he had passed these on to the Russians.

He refused to go into details about the evidence sent to London from the United States. Asked if a former Soviet intelligence officer, Gen. Walter Krivitsky, was involved in the evidence, he replied: "Yes, the assumption is correct that Gen. Krivitsky's evidence helped convict King."

Asked if the diplomat he referred to was Donald Maclean or Guy Burgess, turned-out Britons now in Moscow, he said: "You may assume that it was one of them."

Isaac Don Levine, a Waldorf, Md., author, testified at a Senate Internal Security subcommittee hearing that he got the story of the execution from Gen. Krivitsky, former chief of the Soviet secret police in Western Europe, before he was found shot to death in a Washington hotel in 1940.

Bookmobile Service Feature Of Douglas County Library

While some bookmobiles herald their arrival by loud speakers or a distinctive horn, others find that the small fry see the bookmobile coming and dash into the house shouting the good news, "Mother, the bookmobile is here!" We have been wanting to shout — "Hurrah! The Douglas County Library bookmobile is here!" It recently was delivered by the manufacturer.

Miss Charlotte Hyre, bookmobile librarian for Douglas County, has been planning the schedules carefully, but those of you who want bookmobile service available in your area are urged to get in touch with her.

Do you wonder how a bookmobile route is planned?

First of all, the bookmobile tries to serve people who live some distance away from an established library. Sometimes a stop is made at the request of several people. Sometimes the librarian goes out and knocks at doors to see if people are interested in using the library.

The bookmobile is a travelling branch — truly a library on wheels. The Douglas County bookmobile will carry approximately 2,200 books, carefully chosen to meet the needs and interests of the people it serves. There will be books of interest to people of all ages, from the pre-school child to the grandparents. There will be books on a variety of subjects as well as the ever-popular novel, mystery or western story. Is there a book you wanted that is not there, ask for it! Every effort will be made to have it there for you the next time the bookmobile comes around.

There is a friendly informal air to the bookmobile. No one minds appearing in his working clothes. The bookmobile comes only once in two weeks and the stop is planned to be just long enough to let you choose your books and have them checked out to you. One of the advantages of such a service is that it does not take too much of your time in a busy day.

The bookmobile will not serve the Reedsport-Gardiner area. As great as its service is, we feel we can meet the library needs of the people on the coast with better service, more economically given, by strengthening the local library. Whereas we hope to send 500 books in our initial shipments to most of the libraries, we plan to send 1,000 to Reedsport.

One bookmobile cannot reach all areas of a county as large as ours. There are areas where it can serve many people efficiently and economically. There are areas which cannot have community libraries,

so there are areas where we cannot give bookmobile service. We feel the obligation is to provide the best possible library service in an efficient and economical manner, whether it be through community libraries, bookmobile service, mail service, or the headquarters library.
