Weekend Meat Sales Varied

Meats on special weekend sale vary widely across the nation this week but chickens will be found on almost all food store bargain lists. Faced with rising costs for housewives shopping for specials, beef on wholesale markets and relatively high costs for lamb and pork, retailers have looked hard for other featured items.

Picnic hams and chuck roasts will be found fairly often by housewives shopping for specials. Beef, which had a substantial rise on the wholesale market a week ago, is generally selling at slightly higher retail prices this week.

In most areas there are good supplies of lettuce or other salad greens, radishes, rutabaga, spinach and green onions from nearby farms.

A little higher at the good buy level are asparagus, iceberg lettuce, yellow and green squash and carrots.

Potato prices are relatively high on many family menus. Onions are also getting more expensive, owing to the late spring crop in Texas and California being smaller than expected.

Some areas enjoy an abundant crop of local strawberries.

Douglas McKay Resumes Campaign For Senate

PORTLAND — Douglas McKay, who won the GOP nomination for senator 2½ weeks ago, right back at campaigning Wednesday.

His recent opponent, Phil Hitchcock, will accompany him on other campaign trips planned in the coming two weeks.

McKay spoke at a meeting of professional engineers in Portland. He is scheduled to speak at a Young Republicans meeting at Clatskanie Wednesday night.

Hitchcock is to accompany McKay on campaign organization trips to Corvallis Thursday and Eugene Friday. The two will fly to Klamath Falls June 18 to organize a campaign committee for McKay. They also will go together to a fund-raising dinner in Hood River County June 22.

McKay also is scheduled for several other appearances in the next two weeks, including the Portland Rose Festival parade Saturday. He will be grand marshal of the Mid-Columbia Saddle Club's parade at The Dalles Saturday evening.

Ellender Says Adlai Certain Of Nomination

WASHINGTON — Sen. Ellender (D-La.) said Wednesday Sen. Estes Kefauver's defeat in the California primary "definitely kills him off" and makes Adlai Stevenson "undisputed top contender" for the Democratic presidential nomination.

But Sen. Chavez (D-NM) said "I think the nomination is still open."

Neither senator has publicly endorsed a candidate, and Chavez said, "I won't. I like all of them."

Ellender said Kefauver had "overshot himself" by what he termed "mud-slinging tactics."

Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.), who supports Stevenson, said the win in California "should assure him of the nomination."

"Gov. Stevenson certainly has demonstrated, under the most difficult circumstances, that he has the capacity to win votes at the polls in face-to-face campaigning among the people in all parts of the country," he added.

Labor Leader Hurls Charges

PENDLETON — Secretary of Agriculture Benson has unjustly accused labor of being a major contributor to the farm problem, James T. Marr, executive secretary of the State Federation of Labor, said Thursday.

Falling agricultural prices are the "basic cause" of the farm distress, and "all other factors are secondary," Marr told the annual state Grange meeting here.

He said Benson had tried to put part of the blame on labor by saying high industrial wages are increasing farmers' costs.

Marr asserted increased industrial prices have not been warranted by higher wages and added that "even if the increase in industrial wage had been the cause of the rise in the price of industrial items," it would account for only one-fourteenth of the decline in the farm index of the last three years.

He said the AFL-CIO "eagerly desires and will vigorously support corrective measures to restore and to raise agricultural income," and added, "The solution can't be found by leveling downward the living standards of any American. The problem to be met is to raise farm family incomes up."

Delegates Wednesday approved a resolution urging defeat of a proposed constitutional amendment to permit the Legislature to attach an emergency clause to any tax measure. This would allow a tax to take effect without being subject to a referendum petition.

Speakers said the people should retain control over tax laws and asserted the proposal was an attempt to enact a sales tax without giving the voters a chance to rule on it. The resolution against the proposed amendment supported a stand taken earlier by Grange Master Elmer McClure.

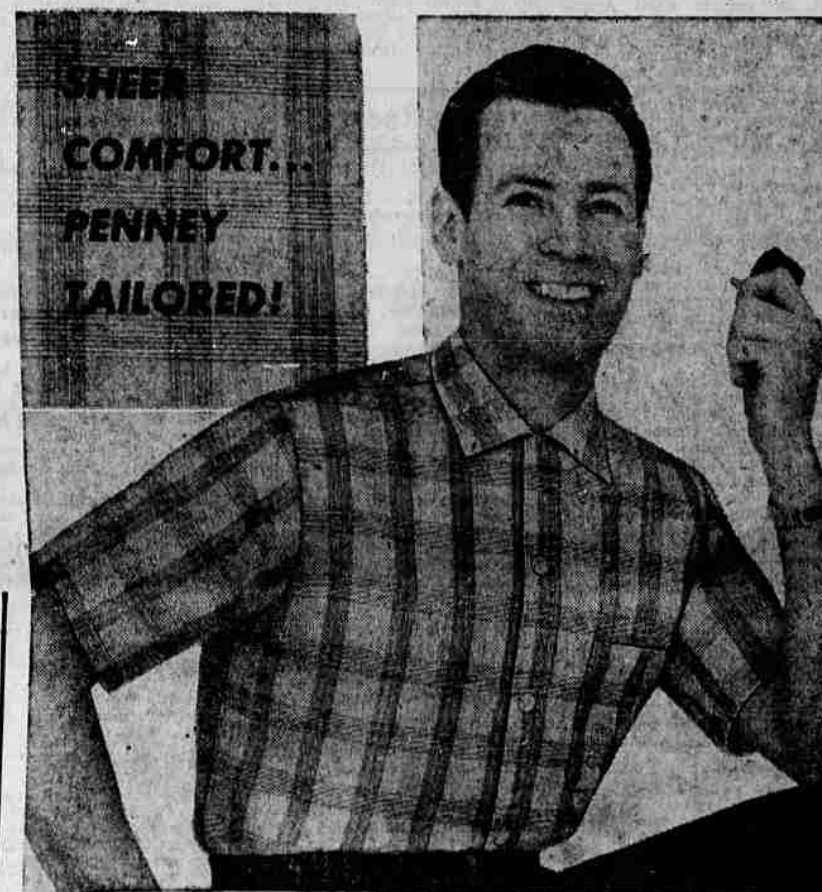
