PHILADELPHIA — Four young men, representing major organizations for young people, told the 44th annual convention of Rotary International Wednesday that "the feeling of belonging is a basic factor in the making of every teenager," no matter where he lives.

"If the feeling of belonging does not come from a youth's family or society, then he will create it himself," said Thomas J. Corrigan, of Philadelphia, representing the Boys Clubs of America. Corrigan added, in his prepared talk, that is the beginning of teenage gangs whose members end up stigmatized as juvenile delinquents.

Others addressing the convention were Humayun Akhtar, international farm youth exchange from Pakistan; Citor W. Harko, of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., representing the Wheel Clubs; and Dan Dunham, of Lakeview, Ore., president of the Future Farmers of America.

WCTU Leader Raps Radio, TV Effects On Youth

EVANSTON, Ill. — The head of the Women's Christian Temperance Union said today that "radio and television commercials influence hundreds of thousands of teen-agers to start drinking."

Mrs. Glenn G. Hayes, president of the WCTU, predicted that local prohibition elections in the 24 states permitting them will jump from an average of some 500 to 1,000 of more this coming November.

In a statement issued from WCTU headquarters, Mrs. Hayes said, "There is a gradual but steady awakening to the fact that radio and television commercials influence hundreds of thousands of teen-agers to start drinking, the first step away from their school and church and toward juvenile delinquency."

"Alcoholic beverage advertising will continue to be dishonest until it shows what it creates — the drunk on skid row, drink-associated crime, the automobiles wrecked by drunken drivers, and the deserted families and impoverished children of drunks."

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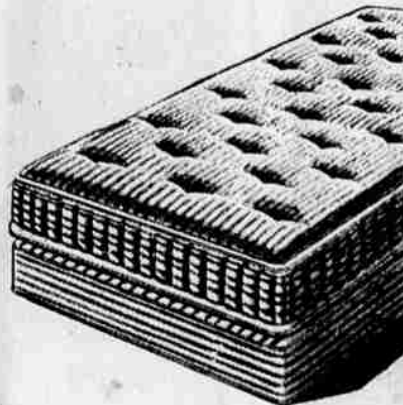
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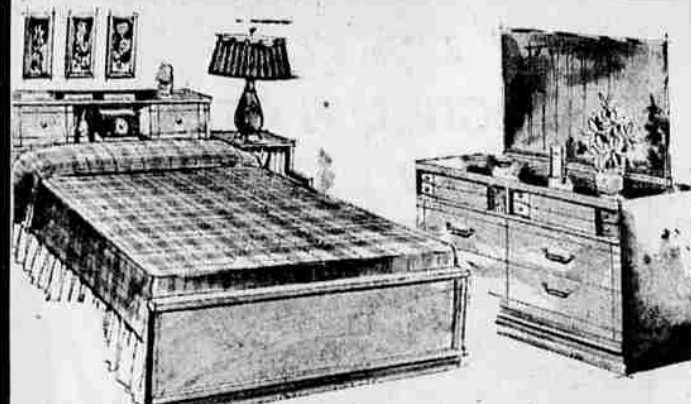


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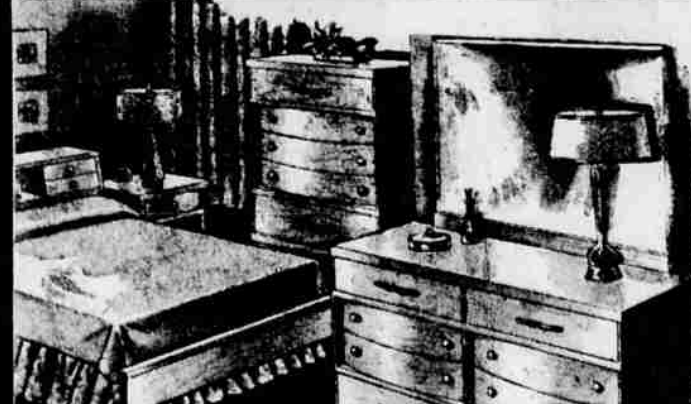


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
