

Reports Claim Mindszenty Is Jailed Again

ROME (AP) — The official organ of Italian Catholic Action reported Wednesday that Josef Cardinal Mindszenty, Roman Catholic primate of Hungary, again has been jailed by Hungarian Communist authorities.

The newspaper, Il Quotidiano, said its information on the cardinal came from a reliable source. The Catholic publication said Cardinal Mindszenty was taken to Felsopelény, a hamlet near Nogiad, in Northern Hungary, and "now is again in jail."

It expressed belief he was taken there because he had refused to sign a statement "recognizing progress made in recent years between the Hungarian state and the Roman Catholic Church."

Reports circulated last week in Vienna that the 64-year-old cardinal again was under arrest. They were denied by the Hungarian legation there. A communique issued by the legation said the cardinal still is "subject to measures decreed by Hungarian authorities last summer."

A Hungarian court convicted Cardinal Mindszenty of treason in 1949 and sentenced him to life imprisonment. Last July 16 the Hungarian government announced he had been released, but he was reported confined to a home for aging priests in Southern Hungary.

House Tax Writers See Little Chance For Cut

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barring a marked business downturn, House tax writers today foresaw little prospect of voting a cut in the remaining days of this session.

Next year, they indicated, a general review of individual and business taxes may be in order. Key members of the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee gave a cool reception to qualified recommendations made yesterday by the Committee for Economic Development for a tax cut of two billion dollars or more effective next Jan. 1.

Willamette River Banks Will Be Strengthened

PORTLAND (AP) — Willamette Basin bank protection works will be strengthened and extended at 33 locations under a program for which bids will be called in June or July.

Col. Jackson Graham, Portland district engineer, said Wednesday the program will cost about a million dollars, with some of it hinging on local cooperation.

Normal bank protection work will be augmented by emergency funds for repair or reconstruction of revetments damaged by floods. Rivers on which the work will be done are the Willamette, McKenzie, middle fork of the Willamette, Molalla, South Santiam, Santiam, Calapooya, Clackamas, coast fork of the Willamette and the Long Tom.

Siuslaw Sand Dune Area Taken From Public Lands

PORTLAND (AP) — A 1,281-acre sand dune area at the mouth of the Siuslaw River has been withdrawn from public land laws by the Department of Interior to protect it against erosion.

The action was taken principally to prevent prospectors from starting strip mining in search for zirconium oxide and other minerals. The dunes have been planted with vegetation to help control the blowing sands and keep silt from washing into the river.

Edward Woolzley, regional director of the Bureau of Land Management, said there are no strategic minerals in the area, but "the valuable work that has been done to protect the Siuslaw River channel could be completely ruined before indiscriminate mining claimants or prospectors find this out."

ADENAUER ACCUSED

BERLIN (AP) — The Soviet news agency Tass accused Chancellor Adenauer Thursday of launching a new anti-Soviet campaign aimed at increasing world tension.

The West German leader last Tuesday called Communist Party chief Khrushchev "brutal and arrogant." Adenauer's remark was prompted by a report from French Premier Guy Mollet that Khrushchev had said Russia will not accept German reunification at this time.

'Penicillin'-Like Remedy For Most Forms Of Cancer Sought By Medical Science

DETROIT (AP) — Scientists may yet find a kind of "penicillin" to control most or all forms of cancer, a British scientist said today.

It would depend upon discovering a common denominator difference between cancerous and healthy cells. The drug would take advantage of the difference. It "is not impossible" that such a penicillin-like drug might be found, because of research developments in the last five years, said Dr. Alexander Haddow, famous cancer researcher from the Chester Beatty Research Institute, London, Eng.

Dr. Haddow explained the prospect and problems in a news conference at the opening of the third National Cancer Conference sponsored by the American Cancer Society and National Cancer Institute of the U.S. Public Health Service.

The conferences is being staged to inform physicians of the latest findings helpful in diagnosing and treating cancer.

Cancer strikes many different body organs, and some experts consider it a variety of different diseases in its various forms. Others think it might have a common cause, from a virus or something else.

Single Drug Inadequate

One view is there is little hope that any single drug could affect

all forms of cancer, or even a number, like penicillin hits numerous bacterial diseases.

Scientists have discovered differences in the microscopic appearance of various cancerous cells compared with healthy ones. And they have detected some differences in the chemical makeup or chemical appetites of cancerous compared with healthy cells. Speaking on this, Dr. Haddow said these clues might yet show some difference common to all cancerous cells. He said, "We cannot exclude the possibility of a penicillin-like drug."

Some animal tumors have been cured by drugs, he said. And many different chemicals, and radiations, can produce cancer.

Army Issues August Draft Call For 13,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army Wednesday issued a draft call for 13,000 men in August. This is the same number asked for July. The new call brings to 2,078,430 the total number drafted or earmarked for induction since the resumption of Selective Service in February, 1950.

The Army explained that the higher draft calls for July and August were based upon the large number of men who are completing their enlistments this summer. Quotas for the first four months of the year were 6,000 each. Other branches of the military rely on volunteers.
