NOTICE OF ANNUAL SCHOOL ELECTION AND SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND ELECTION IN SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 4 OF DOUGLAS COUNTY, OREGON

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the annual school election, together with a school district bond election, will be held within School District No. 4 of Douglas County, Oregon, on Monday, June 10, 1956, between the hours of 2 o'clock p.m. and 9 o'clock p.m. at the polling places for the areas hereinafter set forth.

At said annual school election there will be elected one director to serve for a term of five years, and at the said bond election there will be submitted the following separate and distinct propositions:

"Shall school District No. 4 of Douglas County, Oregon, contract a bonded indebtedness in the sum of \$27,000.00 for the purpose of providing funds to acquire real property and to construct thereon a classroom building in East Roseburg, and to construct a classroom addition to the High Crest school, all within the District?"

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Adventist Vacation Bible School Slated

Children of the Roseburg area ages 4 to 12 have been invited to a two-week vacation Bible school to be held at the Seventh-day Adventist Church school at Military and Umpqua June 11 to 22.

Classes will meet from 9 a.m. until noon weekdays and will include craft and nature study as well as Bible study along the line of "adventuring with Christ in the King's adventure land." There will also be supervised games to assist the children.

Each student will have a workbook to complete, according to Mrs. Mildred Griffin, leader.

Mrs. Griffin holds a life certificate for elementary teaching issued by the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists with headquarters in Washington, D.C. She will be assisted by Mrs. Floto Riston, Mrs. Anise Webb will lead the junior division, Mrs. Dixie Cook, the primary group, and Mrs. Peggy Konzack, the pre-school group. Each of these ladies has had several years' experience as leaders in these divisions of the Sabbath School.

Mrs. Lucille Glassford will be playground supervisor, Mrs. Opal Miller will lead craft work; Mrs. Inez Hiehlman will conduct rhythmic games, the pre-school group, and primary departments, and Bernice Paulson will be trumpet. These leaders with their helpers will total about 30.

about 10 inches of the ileum, the terminal portion of the small intestine, to be seriously inflamed and so swollen as to virtually block the intestinal flow.

To remedy that, Heaton said, the operation simply bypassed that portion of the intestine and provided a new opening in the large intestine at another point.

The inflamed portion was left inside where, Heaton said, it will cause no harm.

Asked whether he believed there was any reason why Eisenhower should not run for re-election, Heaton replied firmly: "I certainly do not."

He added, under further questioning: "I am sure I speak for all the doctors at the table."

Heaton predicted that Eisenhower will be able to see members of his staff on Monday or Tuesday and begin to assume the lighter duties of his office.

He said Eisenhower probably can leave the hospital in about 15 days for a period of convalescence "in the company of his choosing."

The surgeon added: "The President should be able to return to his full duties at the White House in four to six weeks from now."

Heaton told newsmen the operation was a success and that the President's life expectancy, except that "We think it improves it."

Maj. Gen. Howard M. Snyder, the President's personal physician, agreed with Heaton's report in all details, before a crowd of about 75 reporters and others jammed into a conference room at the hospital.

The views also were endorsed by Dr. Isidor Ravidin, University of Pennsylvania surgeon. He and Heaton were among the four surgeons who performed the operation.

Ravidin said: "I see no reason why the President should not make a complete recovery and go ahead with the full duties of the presidency."

He should be better off now than he was previously," Snyder said there would be no need for the President to leave Washington for recuperation. He could go to his Gettysburg, Pa., farm or remain at the White House, Snyder said.

Heaton said Eisenhower will even be able to play golf, probably by mid-August if his present "excellent recovery" continues.

Even if Eisenhower requires the full six weeks for recovery that will still leave him a month before the Republican nominating convention opens at San Francisco Aug. 20.

Heaton said the operation was truly an emergency. He said the abdominal swelling and inflammation, coupled with virtual closure of the small intestine, began increasing in speed Friday night while the President was under observation.

The decision to operate quickly was made unanimously by the 13 army and civilian doctors on the case, he added.

Had this decision been made later, Heaton said, gangrene of the bowel could have occurred.

Dillard District Budget Revote Slated June 18

Dillard school district residents will vote on their proposed school budget and special levy June 18 for the same amounts as proposed by school board and budget committee members. A public hearing on the budget Friday night at Douglas High school drew a small audience, according to board Chairman Virgil Vance.

Main discussion centered around the inclusion of the hot lunch program in the special measure, Vance said. Some residents believed it should be a part of the regular budget.

However, no change was made in the breakdown, Vance said, because board members thought residents should have an opportunity to express opinion on the district's support of the hot lunch program.

June 18, voters will ballot on a revised budget which seeks \$443,113 outside the 6 per cent limitation to balance a total budget of \$632,321.

The special measure for \$21,460 would pay for these items, deleted earlier from the budget: Two instructors to teach physical education and vocal music in the three elementary schools - \$9,960; installation of a
