

Trial Right Of Military Upheld In High Court

U.S. District Judge Edward A. Tamm here ordered release of the majority of the defendants in the case of Air Force Sgt. Robert Toth. The court said that Toth, charged with having participated in the murder of a South Korean civilian while on military duty in Korea, could not be tried by court martial after he became a civilian. The Toth decision cited the constitution's guarantee that civilians accused of crimes are entitled to trial by civilian courts. However, Clark's opinion in the Smith case said the majority found no constitutional defect in the Military Code of Justice providing for civilian trials abroad. He added: "Furthermore, since under the principle of international law each nation has jurisdiction of the offenses committed within its own territory, the essential choice involved here is between an American and a foreign trial." Clark added: "Congress may well have determined that trial before an American court-martial in which the fundamentals of due process are assured was preferable to leaving American servicemen and their dependents throughout the world subject to widely varying standards of justice unfamiliar to our people."

Revolt Of Peronistas Crushed By Argentina

BUENOS AIRES — Argentina's military regime pushed a determined hunt today for leaders of a bloody weekend revolt staged by army and civilian followers of ex-dictator Juan D. Peron. The government announced firing squads executed 38 rebels in speedy and unprecedented retaliation. It indicated many more would face a similar fate as swift court-martial, convened under martial law, sat around the clock. The revolt — crushed in 12 hours by government air and ground forces — flared Saturday in Buenos Aires and three other major cities. Some 100 persons reportedly may have been killed or wounded.

London Press Questions Eisenhower's Physical Fitness For Re-election

LONDON — The Washington correspondents of most London newspapers told their readers today that the American people are increasingly dubious of President Eisenhower's physical fitness for re-election. "Growing U.S. view he should quit fight," headlined the Conservative Daily Mail. "There is deep disquiet in the United States today over President Eisenhower's health despite the optimistic and almost ebullient statements of the doctors," the Mail said. It added: "The American public would be less perturbed if even one of the 13 or more doctors who attended the President had counseled caution or restraint or even said, 'Let us see how the President gets along — let us not rush things.'"

The pro-Labor party Daily Mirror declared bluntly: "Public confidence in the medical opinions have been shaken by Saturday's operation, and it will take much more than publicity about Ike's golfing prowess to convince them that he is fit enough for another term."

The Independent Times said the "political implications of his present illness have possibly assumed a greater insistence than the fears inspired by his heart attack last year."

The middle-of-the-road News Chronicle said, "Neither America nor the world would forget it if the politicians were to urge the President to work beyond his physical endurance. The Laborite Daily Herald said millions of American voters may 'feel a little sickened, perhaps, if they feel, or know, that Ike's expectation of life is being sacrificed on the altar of the Republican party machine.'"

Stalin Revealed As Sex Monster, Harem Owner

PARIS — Communist Party chief Khrushchev has informed other Soviet leaders that Joseph Stalin in his later years kept a harem of young girls, the mass circulation newspaper France-Soir reported Monday. It said in a dispatch from Vienna that Khrushchev recently told his colleagues Stalin was subject to "sexual aberrations... a veritable erotomania (sexual insanity)... sexual obsessions degenerating into sadism directed toward younger and younger girls."

The article said Khrushchev declared Stalin's harem was recruited for him by his police boss, Lavrenty Beria, and that Beria confessed this before he was put to death as a traitor. In New York last April, Alexander Orlov, former Soviet secret police commissar, who has lived in hiding in the United States for nearly 20 years, told a news conference Stalin was a homosexual. The newspaper's Vienna dispatch also said Khrushchev accused Stalin of murdering his second wife, Nadejda Alliluyeva, when she disapproved of his order deporting dispossessed peasants to remote parts of the Soviet Union. It said Stalin, according to Khrushchev, fired a gun at his wife, then strangled her.

Aged Woman Killed Under Her Son's Car

GENOA, Italy — Mrs. Angela Rossi, 90, died under the wheels of her son's car Sunday as Nicola Rossi, 62, Portland, Ore., backed the car out of a garage. Rossi, his wife and two small daughters, had arrived in Italy late last month to visit his mother and other relatives at a small village near here. He decided to take his mother on a ride Sunday. She was waiting in front of the house. Nicola pulled the car out of the garage and backed toward the curb, honking the horn to warn his mother to move. The woman was deaf, police said, and her son backed into her. She died shortly afterwards in his arms.

Viet Nam Freebooter Faces Guillotine Death

CATHO, South Viet Nam — Gen. Ba Cut, the leading freebooter who led the Hoa Hao religious sect army in an abortive revolt against the Saigon government, was sentenced to death Monday by a Vietnamese tribunal. Three wide-capped judges deliberated for three hours before returning a unanimous verdict of guilty on charges that ranged from murder to kidnaping and extortion. The 32-year-old rebel chieftain will lose his head on the guillotine if an appeal fails.

POPE RECEIVES VATICAN CITY — Pope Pius XII Saturday received 250 participants in the eighth International Conference of Popular Credit. The Pontiff urged them to encourage individual savings and to avoid usury.

PORTLAND — The annual Rose Festival closed Sunday with Marine Day events on the Willamette River. Police estimated 10,000 persons lined the river banks to watch speedboat races, pleasure craft judging and water skiing in the rain. A heavy downpour sent the spectators scurrying for umbrellas and other shelter at mid-afternoon, but the rain stopped and the sun came out. The race course on the flooded river was relatively calm for the speeding runabouts and hydroplanes in class B and D.

Navy Jet Plane Crashes Home; 6 Persons Dead

MINNEAPOLIS — A Navy jet plane crashed in flames in a residential area near the airport here Saturday, killing the pilot and five other persons. The exploding plane spread flames which leveled one house and damaged five others. Seven children were burned, five critically.

The coroner said the bodies of two adult men, one of them the pilot, one woman and three children had been recovered from the ruins. Five of the bodies were found in the ruins of the Donald Garries home, which was destroyed. The body of a child was found in the wreckage of a house next door.

The first one of the dead identified was the pilot, Maj. George E. Armstrong of Minneapolis, a marine. "I heard the explosion," said Kenneth Lichty, whose house was singed, "and then there was fire everywhere."

Mrs. W. D. Hoemberg, who lives behind the crash scene, told of hearing a "muffled explosion, not as big as you would think" and then "there were flames all over and black smoke."

Cheap Politicians' Label Put On Supreme Court

AUSTIN, Tex. — Cowboy candidate for governor J. Evetts Haley has called the Supreme Court "a bunch of cheap politicians" who should be impeached by Congress.

Haley, former history professor and author, told a Democratic rally that if the Federal government should seek to enforce an integration injunction against a school board, the state should resist to the point of "throwing the U.S. marshal in the hoosegow."

If the government should send U.S. troops, "that would mean a police state," Haley said. He said he didn't think the conflict would go that far. He added that he would not want to carry resistance to the point of secession, commenting he didn't think it would be necessary.
