The Yakima Bears, Northwest League leaders, step front and center Monday night for their second dose of double trouble, the Lewiston Bronces, hottest article in the circuit.

The Bears, who blew three games to Eugene over the weekend, host the Bronces in a four game set at Yakima and then move to the Idaho city for another four-game series with second-place Lewiston.

Eugene drew some excellent pitching Sunday to take the Bears twice, 9-3 and 7-2, after bumping Yakima 2-9 Saturday night.

Lewiston made it three straight over Spokane, whipping the Indians 11-8 Saturday night and smashing the Tribe twice Sunday, 13-11 and 12-6.

To further complicate the standings, Salem scratched Tri-City 2-0 in a regularly scheduled game Sunday after whipping the Braves 9-3 in the completion of a game called Saturday night because of a curfew.

Tri-City won the opener Saturday night, 8-7.

Lewiston's victories moved the Bronces into second, two and a half games off the pace. Eugene climbed into third and Tri-City slid to fourth.

Carey Loy and Berlyn Hodges teamed for a three-hitter in Eugene's opening game win over the Bears, while Leroy Han went the route with an eight-hitter in the nightcap.

Loy gave up two runs in the fourth on five walks. Gene Marinacci belted a solo homer and Bill Girdley got a three-run homer to send the Emeralds into a 4-2 in the fifth and they were never headed.

The Emeralds, backing up Han's eight-hitter, tagged Arnie Downs and Ted Herrera for 12 hits in the nightcap.

The Senators won the holdover game in the fifth when they exploded for five runs.

In the regularly scheduled game, the Senators combined singles by Jack Dunn and Chuck Essegian, a walk, a double steal and an infield out for two runs, all they needed.

Ad Satalich held the Braves to three hits as he fanned six and walked only one.

Benson, Klicker Show Well In NAIA Tourney

SAN DIEGO — Dave Klicker of Whitman grabbed off second in the 400-meter hurdle Saturday night at the Northwest college entries in the NAIA small college track and field meet failed in the final night to make a first place showing.

Klicker's time for the 400-meter hurdles was :54.2. Jack Shropshire of Abilene Christian won the event with :53.7. Gordon Fee of Seattle Pacific was third in :54.6 and John Finkbeiner of Northwest Nazarene was fourth in :55.2.

Another third place finisher was Dean Benson of Willamette, who was timed in :42.2 for the 110 meter high hurdles, an event won by Lee Calhoun of North Carolina College in :41.0.

Occidental took the team title with 88 1/2 points. Seattle Pacific was 11th with 14 points. Lewis and Clark and Pacific Lutheran were tied with two other schools for 13th at 10 points. Whitman and two other schools were bracketed in the 18th position with eight points. Northwest Nazarene had 4 points and Whitworth wound up with two points.

Swaps Sets World Mark Of 1:33.2 In Mile Race

INGLEWOOD, Calif. — Swaps Monday started a two weeks rest, well-earned by his world record performance of 1:33.2 in the Argonaut Mile at Hollywood Park last Saturday.

Owner Rex Ellsworth and trainer Milt Tenney plan to give the colt a breather until the \$50,000 Inglewood Handicap June 23, at a mile and one-sixteenths.

Bobby Brocato, second in the Argonaut by a length and a quarter, is expected to be back for another crack at Swaps. The Ilango Farm may try Mister Gus against Swaps in the Inglewood instead of Porterhouse, who finished third Saturday.

Major Speed Winner In Longacres Feature

SEATTLE — Major Speed, with Paul Frey up, toured the five and a half furlongs in 1:06 and one-fifth Sunday to win the 1955 renewal of the \$5,000 added Bremerton Handicap at Longacres race track.

Major Speed, packing top weight of 125 pounds, took command at the eighth pole and went across a length and a half ahead of Hula Bools. Direct Current was third. The winner paid \$4.40, 3.00 and 2.50.

A crowd of 6,225 pushed \$253,877 through the mutual windows during the day.

Sime Rewrites 220 Standard

SANGER, Calif. — More world records and a great future were predicted Monday for Dave Sime, Duke's sensational "fastest human," as he pointed toward the first of the Olympic qualifying events—the NCAA championships.

The 19-year-old sophomore set a new world mark in the 220-yard dash and tied the 100 standard for the second time Saturday night in far and away the best individual performance of this record-breaking year.

Sime will face the finest collegiate talent in the nation this weekend at Berkeley, Calif., but no one seems the least bit concerned about his chances.

"Dave has beaten everyone he's faced so far and there's no reason he can't maintain that pace," said Red Lewis, the red-haired runner's coach and adviser.

"I don't think Dave is anywhere near his peak," Lewis said jubilantly after Sime had run the 220 in 20 seconds flat—two tenths better than the existing record—and the century in :59.3. "I think he has unlimited possibilities and I honestly can't say how fast he might run."

Sime's big showing was the feature of the Central California Assn. AAU track and field meet. He had to give up part of the spotlight to Jack Davis, the former University of Southern California athlete who equalled the world record for the 120-yard high hurdles in :13.5. The mark was set six years ago by Dick Attlesley, another Southern Cal ace.

Breezes were negligible in all three races. The times will be submitted for approval by the International Amateur Athletic Assn.

Elaine Foster High In Archery Tourney

ROSEBURG — Elaine Foster salvaged honors for local archers competing over the weekend at the Tri-County Archery Shoot at Cottage Grove.

Mrs. Foster was high woman for the tournament, shooting 553. Her team, the Roseburg Archers, came in second in the women's division with a total of 1,454. Eugene won in the division with 1,778. Springfield with 1,297 and Cottage Grove with 1,190 trailed.

In the men's division, the Umpqua Bowmen took third with 2,078 behind Eugene's 2,377, and Cottage Grove 2,165. The Roseburg Archers, staffed with inexperienced marksmen, finished last with 925. Ahead of them were Springfield with 1,774, and Corvallis with 1,740.

High man was Ike Epperly of Eugene with 686. Epperly and his wife were high husband-and-wife team with 1,216.

Next year's meet will be at Corvallis. All the teams entered were preparing for the state tournament June 23-24 at Sherwood.

Ohio State Cage Star Loses Fingers To Ax

CINCINNATI — Robin Freeman, phenomenal Ohio State basketball guard, lost parts of the middle and index fingers on his left hand in a woodchopping accident Sunday.

The slender guard, whose "miracle hands" helped him break a flock of scoring records, underwent surgery at Good Samaritan Hospital here after the incident. Hospital aides said he was in "good" condition.

His father, Robin Freeman Sr., said that the two fingers were lost down "about to the second joint" but that his son "will have partial mobility" in the remaining finger section.

Freeman, 21 and only 5-foot-11-inches tall, cut a wide swath through OSU school and Big Ten scoring marks playing a game where most of his rivals towered over him.

He pumped in an average of 32.5 points per game last season and put in more than 11 field goals per game in the Big Ten.

Freeman was an all Big Ten selection for three straight years.

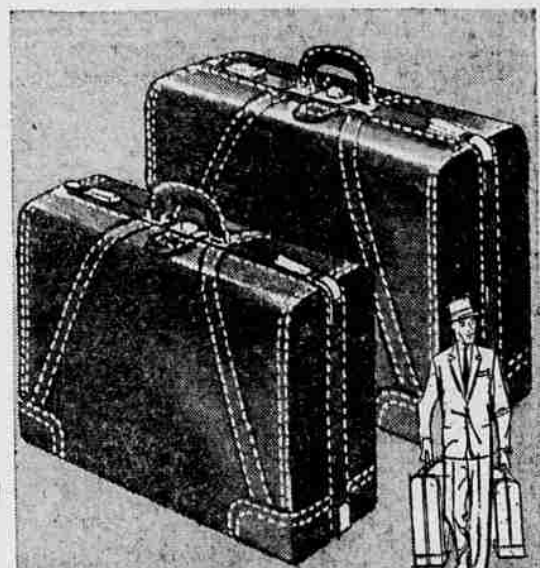
DOCKS AT GREEK PORT
