Loan For Resettlement Of Jews To Be Sought

NEW YORK—The United Jewish Appeal has decided to borrow 40 million dollars for use in resettling North African Jews in Israel.

Delegates to the UJA National Conference voted Sunday to borrow the money in communities throughout the United States. The appeal has already set a national fund-raising goal of an additional 105 million dollars for other work. Forty million of that has been collected.

The decision to borrow money to help North African Jews came after Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, told the delegates that Jewish shops are being looted and prominent Jews kidnapped for ransom in North Africa.

The Joint Distribution Committee is one of the relief agencies supported by UJA funds.

Soldier Killed When Pursued Auto Crashes

RICHLAND, Wash.—An automobile being pursued for speeding crashed into an irrigation ditch Monday, killing one Camp Hanford soldier and injuring another.

Pvt. Mariano Sierra, 19, of Santa Ana, Calif., was killed. Pvt. Arthur Garcia, 20, San Francisco suffered undetermined injuries. Sgt. Ernesta Matias of Puerto Rico, asleep in the back seat of the car, was unhurt.

Police Detective H. B. Meigs said he pursued the soldiers' car after it passed an intersection at high speed. Meigs said the car swerved from the road, hit a pole and rolled over Sierra, who was thrown from the machine.

Soldiers are stationed at Camp Hanford to guard the Hanford atomic plant and operate anti-aircraft installations.

U. N. Spends Millions For Technical Help

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y.—The United Nations says that it spent a record \$25,800,000 in 1953 on its technical assistance program.

Seventy-three governments have promised \$28,941,030 to finance the aid program this year. The largest contributor is the United States, which has pledged up to 15½ millions to match the grants of other countries, dollar for dollar.

The program was started in mid-1950. Its previous biggest year was 1952, when 23 million dollars was spent.

The U.N. last year sent 2,004 foreign experts to 101 countries or territories to help improve their farming, mining, industry, health, education or other activities. The program financed study abroad for 1,203 persons.

Demos Plan Special Attack On 'Give Away'

WASHINGTON—The Democratic National Committee announced Monday it has set up a special group to press Democratic charges that the Eisenhower administration is "giving away" the nation's natural resources.

National Chairman Paul Butler said a special advisory committee headed by Oscar Chapman, former secretary of the interior, will draft the party's election year strategy on the resources issue.

The clown went to an ambulance nearby, and attendants whisked him to a hospital. Physicians said his condition was not serious.
