Army Asks Millions For Northwest Plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army has asked the House Appropriations Committee for \$11,526,000 to finance military construction projects in Washington, Oregon and Alaska, figures released by the committee showed Sunday.
Of the amount, \$7,222,000 would be spent at Ft. Richardson, Whittier and Ladd Air Force Base in Alaska. The Army ticketed \$4,148,000 for Washington projects and \$258,000 for liquid propellant storage facilities at the Umatilla, Ore., Ordnance Depot.
