Enliven Dull Rooms In Your Home With Fresh, New Colors

The biggest single change you can make does not lie in replacing your furniture or your fabrics, but in changing the room's background color. This, you yourself can do... easily, quickly and inexpensively—with the aid of the countless beautiful hues of paint that are now available.

You can repaint the ceiling, walls and woodwork of an average room for less than \$10. And as for the time it takes, you'll be surprised how rapidly you can apply the color... in a very few hours, at most.

Before repainting a ceiling—or any other surface, for that matter—make sure that all cracks are carefully filled, then smoothed level with the surface. Small hair-line cracks can be filled with spackling material. Larger ones often need patching plaster. Your dealer will be glad to tell you exactly how to use it.

Another important thing to do before you begin to paint is to remove the hardware from your doors and windows and to loosen your lighting fixtures. This will make your painting job easier.

Plan to paint your ceiling first, then your walls and, finally, the woodwork.

For the large surfaces, use a paint roller or a 4-inch brush. For the woodwork—and for areas a roller can't reach—a 2-inch brush is your best aid.

Atomic Energy's Control For Peace Seen By Dr. Libby

PORTLAND — Dr. Willard F. Libby, Atomic Energy Commission member who addressed Reed College graduates Sunday, said in an interview that atomic energy eventually will be controlled peacefully and turned into one of mankind's greatest blessings.

Dr. Libby, renominated last week by President Eisenhower for a second five-year term as scientist member of the AEC, said industrial uses of the atom will have wide application and that "isotopes alone will eventually pay for everything."

He sidestepped a reporter's question on whether stockpiled atomic bombs would deteriorate and lose their effectiveness in time. He thought a moment and then replied, "No comment."

In his commencement address at Reed, Dr. Libby urged the graduates to devote their energies to the scientific field. He said a major problem is finding qualified men to work with peacetime atomic energy development and that this development "especially needs the imagination, talent and energy of the scientist and engineer."

Won't Displace Other Power

He said nuclear tests should continue, but emphasized the need for new research in peacetime uses of the atom. Atomic power, he predicted, will not displace coal and hydroelectric power, but will become an auxiliary source of power.

He said it is possible the U.S. Navy might convert in large part to atomic powered vessels, but he doubted that atomic powered automobiles would be developed soon.

Dr. Libby praised Reed College as "a symbol of the highest type of undergraduate instruction."

Announcement of awards at the commencement disclosed that the 1956 class is one of the top classes ever to graduate there. Nearly a third of the class received fellowships or scholarships for graduate study.

Heat Wave Hits Central States

A pre-summer heat wave baked a vast portion of the nation's interior Tuesday from the central states northward to Canada.

Bright sunshine was expected to keep the mercury hovering in the 90s and offset the cooling effect of Pacific air moving eastward.

The thermometer soared to 98 at International Falls, Minn., Monday, the highest ever recorded there. The 101 degree reading at Rapid City, S.D., though not a record, was almost 30 above normal.

A rising trend was forecast for the Pacific Northwest and New England.

Another round of 90-degree heat appeared likely for the southern Rockies, the Southeast and portions of the Ohio and Tennessee valleys. Temperatures in desert areas of the Southwest climbed as high as 115 Monday. Phoenix, Ariz., sweltered under 109-degree heat.

The cool Pacific air began a long trek eastward and reached into western Montana, maintaining temperatures of 60 and 70 degrees.

Trees form an important part of your home landscaping. Large trees in excellent condition often have a value of \$800 to \$1,000, or more, so don't cut them down if it can possibly be avoided, says the National Arborist Association.

It is not advisable to start a permanent lawn in the spring. A temporary one may be planted now, a permanent one should be sown in the fall.

However, soil preparation and selection of the proper lawn-seed mixture are important at this time.

What to Do Now

Reseed this areas (as weather conditions permit.) Fertilize with 10 to 20 pounds per 1,000 square feet. After the area is seeded, it should be lightly raked and rolled.

Water well to provide for quicker germination and until it reaches several inches in height. Then set the blades of your mower so that only the top 1/2 inch of the lawn will be cut off. For specific help for spring lawn care, consult your nurseryman.

Terms For Ending Teamsters' Row Get NLRB O.K.

WASHINGTON — Settlement provisions aimed at ending Teamster Union labor disputes at four Pacific Northwest ports were approved Monday by the National Labor Relations Board.

The tentative settlement proposals were reached about a month ago while an NLRB examiner was conducting hearings on the case.

The agreements—affecting the port towns of Vancouver, Wash., Portland, Toledo and Coos Bay, Ore.—provide that Teamsters and their affiliates will not picket terminals operated by port agencies and firms in an attempt to force non-union drivers to join the Teamsters.

A number of lumber and docking concerns had filed unfair labor charges against the union. The hearings were recessed while negotiators worked out the settlement provisions. Companies involved were at A. F. Lower Co., Molalla; Yaquina Bay Dock & Dredge Co. and Cascadia Lumber Co., Newport; Central Dock Co. and Pacific Lumber Transport Co., Coos Bay.
