## 4 Cards Top Voting For All-Star Game

NEW YORK (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals lead the field with four Redbirds on top in the balloting for the National League team for the 1956 all-star baseball game at Washington July 10.

Red Schoendienst is the leader at second base with a 5,194-vote margin over Cincinnati's Johnny Temple. Ken Boyer has a 2,532-vote edge over Milwaukee's Eddie Mathews at third; Rip Repinski leads Philadelphia's Del Ennis by 807 for left field and Stan Musial has a 4,692-vote lead over Milwaukee's Hank Aaron for right field.

Schoendienst has polled the most votes in the National League with 6,348 while Mickey Mantle, the New York Yankees' young slugger, is the over-all leader with an 8,655 count and a 7,970-vote edge over Boston's Jim Piersall for the American League center field position.

The voting, conducted by newspapers, radio stations and television stations and tabulated by the office of Commissioner Ford Frick, ends June 26.

The final Senator runs came across the plate in the top of the seventh as Gene Larson walked followed by another single by Krause, with both runners advancing on a passed ball.

## New Ring Board Named In California Cleanup

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Plans were outlined Wednesday for speedy action by California's new athletic commission against the licenses of "unsavory" boxing world figures.

Gov. Goodwin J. Knight named the "new broom" commission Tuesday as the first step in his announced cleanup of California boxing and wrestling. He called for a meeting as soon as possible.

The revamped lineup includes two carryovers from the old commission that resigned over the past two weeks, plus three new members.

The new commissioners are Dean B. Cromwell, Los Angeles, former University of Southern California track coach and 1948 U.S. Olympic track coach; Douglas Hayden, Oakland, a long-time special agent for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co.; and Jamie H. Smith, Los Angeles, soft drink executive.

Re-appointed were Dr. Dan O. Kilroy, Sacramento, and S. Thomas Bucciarrelli of Riverside County. The new commission will elect a chairman.

## Angels Rap Fading Bevo Club By 7-4

Hollywood's Stars might see their nine-game winning streak pay off Wednesday night although it hasn't lifted them much in the Pacific Coast League standings.

The Stars were 14½ games behind first place Los Angeles when they started their streak June 4. They got No. 9 Tuesday night, 8-5, over San Diego but are still in sixth, 10 games behind. San Diego leads them by one percentage point for fifth and Portland, in fourth, is a half game up.

Another Hollywood victory over San Diego Wednesday night and a win by first place Los Angeles over Portland would lift the Stars up to fourth.

Los Angeles uncorked its batting power in the sixth Tuesday to beat Portland 7-4.

San Francisco dropped second-place Seattle to 1½ games behind the Angels and Jerry Casale won his eighth against three losses and got a tie-breaking homer to boot.

The score was 5-3. Sacramento's Joe Stanka struck out nine Vancouver Mounties in an 8-4 win.

Hollywood's six-run third inning beat San Diego. Winner Lino Donoso started the rally with a single. The Stars got four walks, two intentional, and four hits in that inning. Bill Gabler and Joe Duhem singled in two runs each.

Portland starter Bob Darnell had a one-hitter until Casey Wise, Steve Bilko and Bob Speake slammed solo homers in the sixth. The Angels went ahead to stay in the seventh on one of Bilko's two doubles. He brought in three runs for the night. Los Angeles' Dick Drott fanned 11 batters as he got his seventh win with help from two relievers.

It was Portland's fifth licking in a row after a victory string of eight straight. Jim Baxes, generally a good hitter, fanned five times.

Until those three homers in the sixth Portland appeared to be heading for a break in the loss string. Los Angeles was behind 1-2 at the start of the inning.

In both the eighth and ninth Portland threatened but fell short. In the eighth a rally was nipped after one run was in, two on and only one down. The ninth started as though it, too, would get Portland out in front. One run scored and two were on with none out. Then Gene Fodge came in and ended the threat.

Casale's solo homer put San Francisco ahead 4-3 in the eighth after a tight, see-saw battle. The Stars got a spare in the ninth when Sal Tammara.

## 162 Golfers Await Tee-off In National Open Thursday

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — In the fifty-five years of the National Open Golf Championship there never has been a situation where a player came up to the 72nd hole needing to hole the last putt to win.

There have been several occasions when a player had a putt to tie and made it, but never the one where it was win or else on the final shot. And 162 golfers here this week wouldn't complain if they were the first to face that situation.

"I'd like to be in that position," said Ed Furgol, the 1954 winner who breezed in with a 284 at the final hole.

The Open is a prestige tournament. That's why there's so much pressure attached to it. In the others it's just money."

Furgol left the implication that a second Open victory would give him the unquestioned stamp of greatness. Then he went out and showed that he might make it by shooting a practice round of 67—one of the best of the week over the 6,902 yard, par 35-35-70 Oak Hill course.

Cary Middlecoff, the 1949 Open winner, grudgingly agreed with Furgol.

The 56th National Open could easily be the first in which the championship might be decided on the final stroke.

The wide open Oak Hill course does not present any particular problems to the pros who play the weekly tournaments. Predictions are that four par rounds—a 280 total—or a little higher will be enough to win. The field includes a couple of dozen players who may hit that figure if conditions are right.
