

Mundt Predicts Passage Of Bill To Plug Loophole

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.) predicted today swift approval by Congress of a bill to plug what he termed "the great hole" in the internal security program.

Mundt and Sens. Eastland (D-Miss) and McCarthy (R-Wis) introduced yesterday similar bills designated to negate the court's 6-3 ruling on Monday that the government may not summarily dismiss on security grounds workers whose jobs do not directly concern national security.

Another Republican, former Sen. Harry P. Cain of Washington, agreed in a separate interview that the Supreme Court "did shoot a hole" in the loyalty-security program, but said it was "right where it should be shot."

Cain, appointed by President Eisenhower to the Subversive Activities Control Board, has become a vigorous critic of the security program.

At the end of two days of testimony before a Senate judiciary subcommittee yesterday, one man Cain cited was reoffered a job he had lost on security grounds. And Sen. Hennings (D-Mo) said the subcommittee he heads will explore other cases which Cain described as injustices or at least questionable.

Cain on Tuesday had termed an example of "fascism" the case of an ex-GI who had lost the American Red Cross job after the Army raised security questions against him.

Last night the Defense Department announced the Red Cross has offered to rehire the man, Irving I. August of Seattle, a World War I and Korean veteran. "I'll be delighted to go back to work," August said in Seattle. He attributed his troubles to what he said was brief membership in the Progressive party in 1948. He said he dropped out because he felt "it was being influenced by Communists."

Classes To Start In Life Saving

Applications are being taken now at the Roseburg office of the American Red Cross for persons wishing to take courses in junior and senior life saving.

Mrs. E. L. Tauscher, certified Red Cross swimming instructor, said today she would be available for a class starting Aug. 13. The course will continue for two hours daily Monday through Friday until Aug. 24.

She said junior lifesaving applicants must be 12 years of age or older, and senior life saving applicants must be 16 or over or in at least the 11th grade in high school.

American Red Cross textbooks on lifesaving and water safety have been received at the local chapter office at 814 SE Lane Ave. and will be used during the training period.

Sutherland Boy Struck By Car Here Wednesday

Traffic accidents in central Douglas County Wednesday sent one boy to the hospital and found one driver cited by state police.

Raymond Awmiller, 9, of Sutherland was reported in good condition at Mercy Hospital Thursday. He was being treated for injuries suffered after his bicycle collided with a car driven by Millian Theodor Bergerson, 48, 548 W. Maple St., Roseburg. State police said the youth reportedly pulled in front of Bergerson's pickup about 5 p.m. as both travelled along Highway 225 near the Highway 99 junction.

They issued no citations. Officers said both vehicles had been waiting for an oncoming car to pass. Bergerson pulled out to pass the cyclist, who also pulled left, police reported. Awmiller was thrown or carried 95 feet to the highway shoulder, police said. He suffered facial abrasions and a bruised hip.

Earlier on Highway 42, two cars collided on a sharp hairpin curve on Camas Mountain, according to Mrs. William Cunningham, News-Review Correspondent. The 2 p.m. accident was investigated by state police. Involved were vehicles driven by Clifford H. Crothers, Coos Bay, and Dale Jackson of Roseburg.

Mrs. Cunningham reported that Mrs. Jackson suffered a bruised hip. The Crothers' vehicle was brought to Roseburg by Billy Mohr towing. Both vehicles were damaged, Mrs. Cunningham said.

Knowland Sees Hope For Aid Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Support from Senate Republican Leader Knowland (Calif.) raised administration hopes today for restoring some of the big cut the House made in President Eisenhower's foreign aid program.

Whether a majority of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee would approve the 600 million dollar minimum increase urged by the White House was uncertain as Chairman George (D-Ga.) called members back into session to start voting.

George has taken the leadership in a drive to restore 500 millions of the House cuts, or half of the amount lopped from military assistance funds.

Including the billion-dollar cut in military aid funds, the House cut a total of \$1,104,000,000 from \$4,900,000,000 Eisenhower asked, despite protests from both Republican and Democratic leaders in that body.

Adenauer Confers With Eisenhower In Hospital Room

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower told German Chancellor Adenauer in a ten minute hospital meeting Thursday he hopes for early action on reunification of Germany "to liberate the 17 million Germans" in the East zone.

Eisenhower, clad in pajamas and sitting up in a chair, received the 80-year-old German leader in a dramatic goody in the President's room at Walter Reed Army Hospital.

With them were Mrs. Eisenhower, Secretary of State Dulles, and an interpreter, Henry Kellerman of the State Department's German affairs section.

Adenauer left immediately afterward to fly to New York City to continue his unofficial U. S. visit. It was Eisenhower's first meeting with anybody outside of his personal and official families and medical personnel since his operation for an abdominal obstruction last Saturday.

The brief session followed what the doctors reported as Eisenhower's best night since he underwent surgery.

Both Adenauer and Dulles spoke in glowing terms of the apparent speed of Eisenhower's recovery. Shortly afterward the President's doctors reported he suffered no ill effects from the meeting with Adenauer. They announced also that he had begun taking liquid foods by mouth more frequently.

Rodeo Tickets Placed On Sale

General admission, reserve and box seat tickets have gone on sale for the 1956 Douglas County Rodeo to be held June 23 and 24 at the county fairgrounds.

They may be purchased at the bright red ticket booth which is located in front of Howard's Men's Wear, 507 SE Jackson St., Roseburg. Ticket sales are being handled by the Lady Lions, the Jay-Cettes and the Douglas County Mounted Sheriff's Posse Auxiliary. Box seats are a brand new feature this year, according to Del Martin who is handling arrangements for their sale. Most boxes have 10 seats, Martin said, and he recommends group purchase of a box.

The boxes are located behind the first five reserve seat sections, about 10 to 12 feet above the arena. They extend from section A through D.

Martin said persons buying box seats this year will be permitted first opportunity to purchase the same boxes in future years.

Seating in the 49 boxes will accommodate more than 500 persons, Martin said. Information concerning the tickets may be obtained by calling rodeo information headquarters at OR 3-3537.

Law Forbidding 'Slow Routing' To Be Enforced

WASHINGTON (AP) — The order forbidding "slow routing" of freight cars will be enforced immediately, the Interstate Commerce Commission said Wednesday.

Violations of the order, first published in April, call for fines of from \$100 to \$500 for each offense.

The order was held off temporarily when challenged in federal court by Oregon lumber interests. However a three-judge panel ruled at Portland June 1 the ICC had the authority to issue such an order in a period of emergency.

The order was issued in connection with a continuing car shortage. It was aimed primarily at the practice of many Pacific Northwest lumber mills in cutting lumber and loading it immediately on freight cars which were started east while sales contracts were being perfected at eastern destinations.

Such routing avoids storage both at origin and destination points.

Money Believed Part Of Bank Loot Is Found

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Police pushed a search for a 32-year-old former parolee Thursday after arresting his wife and recovering \$17,368 believed to be part of the Southport State Bank loot.

Roy Rudolph Drake of Franklin was being sought on a bank robbery charge, and blonde Pauline Drake, 23, was in jail on a preliminary charge of bank robbery. Drake's bond was set at \$100,000.

State Police Capt. Robert F. Dillon said \$17,368, believed to be part of the \$65,546 taken from the Southport Bank Tuesday, was found in Mrs. Drake's car when she was arrested Wednesday night.

Police also recovered \$4,000 believed to be part of the loot, from the home of a relative of Drake, Mrs. Maria McGaha. They cleared her of any connection with the robbery.

Drake was paroled four years ago from Folsom Prison in California after serving 12 years for robbery.

The Southport robber kidnaped bank president John A. Whalen and his wife from their home and held them captive at the bank seven hours until the vault's time lock was released.

Hollanders Deny Reports Queen May Abdicate

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — Dutch newspapers today denied speculation abroad that a faith healer's reported influence over Queen Juliana might force her abdication.

The local editors, who had held off several days on the story after it broke in a German news magazine, branded reports of the faith healer's sway over Juliana an invasion of the royal privacy.

Three Witnesses Sought In Seattle For Portland Probe

SEATTLE (AP) — Authorities were searching Thursday for three Seattle men wanted as material witnesses by the Multnomah County grand jury which is investigating vice conditions in Portland.

The men are Joseph P. McLaughlin, cigar store operator; Thomas E. Maloney, described by The Seattle Times as a race track figure, and Morris Altschuler.

The search was started Wednesday after Presiding Judge Henry W. Cramer of the King County Superior court signed an order directing that McLaughlin, Maloney and Altschuler be taken into custody.

The order was drawn by Charles O. Carroll, King County prosecutor, at the request of Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton of Oregon, who is directing the grand jury investigation.

In requesting the appearance of the three men, Thornton said they knew the times said detectives could not find either of the three wanted as witnesses.

In Portland, the grand jury called as witnesses Thursday the superintendent of the Oregon State James B. Elkins.

Elkins has been named by The Oregonian as the man who provided it with recordings on which much of the investigation is based. The Oregonian identified Elkins as a former associate of the three men wanted in Seattle.

Democrats Delay Hells Canyon Measure Vote

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate Interior Committee vote on Hells Canyon Dam legislation has been postponed—reportedly to give Democrats credit for action to be taken.

The committee had scheduled a vote Thursday on a controversial bill to authorize a federal dam in the Hells Canyon stretch of the Snake River, where the Idaho Power Co. is building the first of three smaller power projects licensed by the Federal Power Commission.

Sen. Murray (D-Mont), committee chairman, announced late Wednesday the special meeting had been postponed "because a number of committee members had notified me they could not attend." He said he would try to set another date convenient to the members "as soon as possible."

However, a source close to the committee said the vote probably will be deferred until an existing vacancy on the committee is filled.

The vacancy was created by transfer to another committee of Sen. Long (D-La), lone Interior Democrat opposing the Hells Canyon bill.

The source said the bill is assured of committee approval because "several" Republicans will vote for it, but some Democrats want to put off final action until they get a solid Democratic majority.

National Guard Unit To Entrain For Fort Lewis

Roseburg's Oregon National Guard unit — part of the Northwest's 41st Division — will be off to training early Saturday morning.

After Friday afternoon preparations, the unit will entrain for Fort Lewis, Wash., on a special passenger to be sent here to pick up both Roseburg and Coos Bay guardsmen.

Capt. Horace Pendergrass, commanding officer of Co. D, 1st Batt., 186th Inf. Reg., said the 123 men and 4 officers in the company are to report for full-dress formation at 1 p.m. at the Armory Friday.

The unit will disband later in the afternoon in order that the men can eat dinner at home. Then at 3:30 Saturday morning, the men are to board the train.

The lateness of the hour came about because the men can't go on summer training duty until 12:01 a.m. Saturday. That applies to Coos Bay, too, and that unit will leave in the early morning in order to meet the train.

The training will last for two weeks, and the guardsmen will be home on June 30.

GSA Land Auction Sale Scheduled Friday At 2

It was part of the Veterans Administration Hospital grounds before being declared surplus.

The tract, according to a brochure published by the Day firm, is suitable for subdivision. It already includes a 6-room house.

The frontage on Garden Valley Road is about 1,640 feet. The tract averages about 356 feet in depth. A cash deposit of \$1,000 is required in order to qualify for bidding, and full payment for the property must be in cash.

Another tract is near Medford about a half-mile from the airport. Containing about 2.2 acres, it has a 1,300-foot frontage on a paved county road and 75-foot frontage on a state secondary highway.

The other nine tracts are in the vicinity of Cottage Grove, a Dorena flood control reservoir in southern Lane County. Most are timbered, and all front county roads.

Near the Dorena reservoir are parcels of 7 acres, .56 of an acre, 1 acre and 10 acres. Those at the Cottage Grove dam are of 35.5 acres, 33.5 acres, 18.4 acres, 21 acres and 11.3 acres.

Bids are subject to rejection unless they equal or exceed GSA appraisals.

Missing Student Walks Out Safely After Four Days

ALBANY, Ore. (AP) — Larry Bassinger, 19, an Oregon State College sophomore, is safe after wandering, lost, for four days in the Snow Creek area some 60 miles east of here.

He walked out to his car, apparently in good condition and unharmed, as a party of some 20 persons was about to give up the hunt for him Wednesday afternoon.

Saturday he left his car and went up Highway 20 on a fishing trip. He did not return to his home here as scheduled Sunday night, and a search was started along the highway.

The automobile was found, and bloodhounds led by Norman Wilson of Dallas, Ore., led searchers to a deep pool. Grappling hooks were ordered from Lebanon. Then Bassinger showed up.

Bassinger said he realized on Saturday that he was lost and spent that day and the following three days just wandering around. On Wednesday he climbed the highest peak in the area and from there was able to see a highway and get his bearings.

He then made his way directly to the highway.

Bassinger said he had nothing to eat for the four days.

Air Force Goal 600 Bombers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Increasing its goal by 100, the Air Force now hopes to have 600 long-range B52 jet bombers by 1959.

Lt. Gen. C. S. Irvine, deputy chief of staff in charge of Air Force production, gave the figures in secret testimony released in heavily censored form yesterday by a special armed services subcommittee.

In his testimony, Irvine also expressed the "personal feeling" that this country still holds an overall lead over Russian air power.

On the House side, the Armed Services Committee disclosed it will look next month into rocket development by the Army and perhaps also by the other services.

The study will include specifically the Army's "Jupiter" intermediate range ballistic missile.

GUNFIRE BREAKS QUIET

JERUSALEM, Israel (AP) — A three-hour exchange of gunfire Wednesday broke several days of quiet on the Israel-Jordan border.

An Israeli army spokesman said Thursday.

He said Jordan's positions in the southern Judean hills machine-gunned an Israeli guard on Israeli territory close to the Beer-sheva-Hebron road and the Israelis returned the fire. There were no Israeli casualties, he said.
