Coffee Prices Expected To Increase Monday

PORTLAND — Wholesale coffee prices are expected to increase three cents a pound here next Monday, reflecting higher prices posted by coffee companies in New York. The new price is not expected to affect retail prices here for two or three weeks.

Major tinned brands now are selling at \$1.05 a pound at most stores here. The price is expected to rise to around \$1.08 early next month, retailers said. The new wholesale price will be \$1.04. Some stores continue to sell coffee at near cost to attract customers.

OLD BUILDING WRECKED

PORTLAND — Another of the old-time iron-front buildings began falling before the wrecker Thursday.

The ornate iron work, cast on the East Coast and shipped around the Horn in 1868 to be assembled here as a front for the old Corbett Building on S.W. First Ave., was cut apart by torches.

The building is coming down to make way for an approach to the projected new Morrison St. Bridge.

European Immigrants Arriving in Oregon

WASHINGTON — Eight Europeans planning to make new homes in Oregon will arrive in New York Saturday aboard the Navy transport Gen. Langfitt.

They are among 1,200 refugees being admitted to the United States, the Refugee Relief Division of the State Department reported Thursday.

The eight coming to Oregon are: Hermann Lakner, 42, Lithuania, a butcher, sponsored by Cecil Martin Steen, Albany, and endorsed by the Lutheran Refugee Service.

Eberhard Block, 31, Germany, a gardener, his wife, Anneliese, 28, and their four children, all sponsored by Walter Earl Marx, of Gresham, and endorsed by the Lutheran Refugee Service.

Woldemar Kaltenberg, 62, Poland, a draftsman, sponsored by Carl A. Schwensen, Portland, and endorsed by the Tolstoy Foundation.
