

Grants Pass Legion '9' Edges Local Crew, 5-4

The Grants Pass Junior American Legion baseball team scored an unearned run in the bottom half of the seventh to hand Coach Bill Harper's Roseburg aggregation a 5-4 loss Friday afternoon at the Roseburg team and leaves them with a 1-1 mark in loop action.

The winning run scored as a result of a single, an error, another single and a throwing error by the center fielder.

Grants Pass leads the league with a perfect mark having previously won over the now-defunct Myrtle Creek nine (which will be stricken from the records) along with Friday's victory over the Roseburg crew, giving them a 1-0 league mark.

Roseburg rests in second place with a 1-1 record, having posted a 1-0 win over Medford last week in Roseburg. Medford is in third place with an 0-1 mark.

Harper's lads dented the plate for a single run in the first inning as Danny Kinzie doubled sharply to left center and scored on a line single to left by Roger Bissonette. Grants Pass came back in the bottom of the third, staging a three-run uprising. Dick Smith walked, Scott Tippetts and Larry Cochell. Pete Proctor, the first baseman, sent them both home with a deep triple to left center and scored himself when Larry Bissonette took the relay throw from the outfield and threw wildly into third in an attempt to catch the sliding Proctor.

This made the score 3-1 in favor of the Grants Pass crew.

Roseburg added another run in the top of the third when Al Lindbloom, as leadoff batter, drew a base on balls. He went to second as Ron Beamer was safe on an error by shortstop Gary Honnecutt.

Fly Drives In Run

Lindbloom advanced to third on the error and scored when Wayne Kennaday lofted a sacrifice fly to centerfield.

Roseburg added two more runs in the next frame to go ahead 4-3 with Bissonette's single, a sacrifice by Mike Hatfield and a walk to Kinzie. Bill Rudzik sent the first run across the plate with a line shot to right and Kinzie scored after the catch on a fly to deep center off the bat of Lindbloom.

The winners tied the count in the bottom half of the stanza when leadoff batter Cochell gained life at first on Lindbloom's error and Proctor, the next batter, laid down a sacrifice bunt that pitcher Smith let roll, thinking it would go foul.

When Smith finally realized that the ball was going to stay in fair territory, it was too late to make the play at first. In the meantime, the lead runner had rounded second and was breaking for third and Smith in an attempt to nail him, threw wildly, allowing the run to score. Proctor ended up at third.

Squeeze Play Fails

Grants Pass tried to squeeze the run across, but failed as Smith picked up the ball and tossed it to catcher Rudzik who blocked the runner, tagging out the sliding base runner. Don Jaquette struck out to retire the side.

Neither team offered a scoring threat in the sixth, but the final frame was different. Proctor, who had been a thorn in the side of the Roseburg team all day, collected his third consecutive hit, a single to left. Kennaday fielded the ball cleanly and threw to

second ahead of the runner. Hatfield took the throw at second but failed to hold on to it. The heads-up Proctor went to second base on the error.

Pitcher Jim Smith walked as next batter up put men on second and first. Then diminutive Dick Hayes hit a Texas bloop over second base.

Winning Run Scores Proctor was off and running with the crack of the bat and had taken his turn at third, hesitating as center fielder Bill Oerding made a quick play on the hit and threw the ball toward home. The throw was wide of the plate and Proctor resumed his dash for the plate and scored the winning run on a very close sliding play at home.

Dick Smith on the mound for Roseburg allowed but two earned runs while going the route, setting it down on strikeouts, walking five.

Proctor with 3-4 was the leading hitter for Grants Pass followed by Charlie Lasher with 2-4, both singles.

Locals Collect Hits

Bissonette with 2-4, Rudzik with 2-4 and Dick Smith with 2-3 were top sluggers for the losing nine. Danny Kinzie added the only extra base hit for the locals with his first-inning double.

The score could have been much worse had it not been for some clutch pitching by Smith. Grants Pass loaded the bases in the second inning on a single, double and walk, but the ace hurler from Glendale settled down, striking out one batter and getting the next on a foul fly.

The same two teams will play again Tuesday on Finlay Field.

20 California Athletes Shared Air, Report Says

BERKELEY (AP) — Twenty University of California athletes got a total of \$1,100 in under-the-table financial help last school year, a faculty committee at the Berkeley campus said Friday.

The report denied that this help amounted to wholesale subsidy of athletes.

Most of the \$1,100 was in grants in aid, the report continued. Such payments, usually covering tuition, are proper under Pacific Coast Conference rules if approved by the university.

The faculty statement noted that grants in aid had never been approved from the Berkeley campus. Consequently grants to California athletes are "violations of the conference code and we are sorry," the report said.

5 College Records Broken In Berkeley Competition

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — The struggle for national collegiate honors in track and field reached the showdown stage Saturday, with survivors of the preliminaries competing for a chance to make the United States Olympic team. Behind lay five National Collegiate Athletic Assn. records broken, the most impressive being a surprising shotput of 60 feet 1/2 inch by Manhattan College's giant Ken Bantam, the third man in history to beat 60 feet.

In prospect Saturday afternoon on the University of California's Edwards Stadium were torrid duels in the 100 meter dash, the 200, the 1,500 and other events.

At stake was the chance for the first six finishers in the various events to qualify for the all-important Olympic tryouts in Los Angeles June 29-30.

Bantam, no nantam at what must be about 6-foot-6, broke the NCAA record on his second put with a mark of 59-5 1/2, and then smashed it further with his 62 1/2. In 1933 world record holder Parry O'Brien set the NCAA standard at 58-7 1/2.

Only O'Brien and Bill Nieder of Kansas, with 60-3 1/2, have passed 60 feet, and Saturday Nieder, the defending college champ, had to settle for 57-3 1/2. He and the other six qualifiers get three more tries.

The preliminaries didn't develop much in the 100, 200 or 400 meter dashes rivalries. Most of the boys loafed, running just fast enough to qualify.

In the 100, Dave Sime of Duke won his heat in 10.6, Bobby Morrow

of Abilene Christian 10.9 and Mike Agostini, Fresno State, 10.5.

In the scramble for team honors, Kansas led the way into the finals with nine men qualified. Next with eight was UCLA and the defending Trojans of Southern California were third with seven.

Six collegians from the state of Oregon were in the finals Saturday. The University of Oregon's Jim Bailey in the 1,500-meter race and Bill Dellinger in 5,000 meters did not have to qualify. Neither did Oregon State's Wayne Moss in the high jumps.

Two other University of Oregon athletes qualified, both in the hop step and jump. Martin Fedigo was sixth in the qualifying with 47 feet even. Don McClure placed seventh, the last qualifying place with 46 feet, 7 1/2 inches.

Dean Benson of Willamette qualified for the 110-meter hurdle finals. He placed fourth in his qualifying heat in 14.4 seconds. The heat was won by Joe Savoldi of Michigan State in 14.3.

Failing to qualify were Sam Wesley, Oregon State, in the 100 and 200 meter sprints; Ed Bingham of Oregon in the javelin, and Don Spinas, Oregon, in the 400-meter hurdles.

Wesley ran the 100 in 10.9 and the 200 in 21.7, each time placing sixth in his heat. Spinas also placed sixth with a time of 54 seconds in the long hurdle race. Bingham threw the javelin 210 feet; 3 feet, 8 inches under what became the qualifying mark.

Art Schult and Joe Taylor led all the way. Joe Taylor contributed a two-run homer, his 14th of the season. In all, he batted in four runs in leading the Seattle attack.

Long-Distance Swimmer Fails In Juan de Fuca
VICTORIA (AP) — Ted Simmons of Toronto was pulled out of the water early Saturday after completing five miles of an attempt to cross Juan de Fuca Strait and collect \$25,000 from his sponsors.

Simmons, apparently made ill by the salt water, was taken out shortly after 7 a.m.

Until he gave up, his speed was described as "spectacular" by observers in boats accompanying him.

Attempting a shortcut route across the Strait, he set out at 5:04 a.m. PDT from Sooke Inlet, 10 miles southwest of Victoria. The route is about five miles shorter than the usual 18-mile course.

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Aussie Ahead In Open Golf Trial

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP)—Smiling and relaxed, Australia's Peter Thomson said he didn't even know Ben Hogan was in with 140 — the score he had to beat — when he set out to play the second round of the U.S. Open Golf Championship.

Nobody in the thicket of listeners in Oak Hill's superheated press tent quite believed, him, but who would question the word of a player who went out when the pressure was greatest and casually snatched

ed the lead from the man who has been America's best golfer over a ten-year span.

Thomson, 28, is a casual sort of player, husky, pleasant-faced with bright blue eyes and curly black hair. American golf has been very good to him in everything but championships and today could make it almost perfect.

Going into the final 36 holes of the 56th open, Thomson was the leader with scores of 70-69-139. Hovering a stroke behind him was Hogan the hawk, the intense little man who throws fear into most golfers when he's close to them.

Hogan is seeking to become the first player ever to win the U.S. Open five times. Hogan shot 68 yesterday.

Well within striking range were three other former U.S. Open champions. Cary Middlecoff, the lanky 1948 champion, and a m-e-a-r, Ben Hogan, the
