Rodeo Parade Entry Deadline Now Thursday

Entry deadline in the 1956 Douglas County rodeo parade Saturday has been extended through Thursday, according to Chairman Wayne Oftendahl. Parade theme is "Frontier Times."

With parade time nearing, the list of entries is stacking up impressively. It includes the Grants Pass Cavemen, the queen of the Pendleton Roundup, the Fourth of July festival royal court from Reedsport, the Emerald Empire Roundup court from Eugene, floats sponsored by the Beta Sigma Phi Council, Dixonville Cub Scouts, Douglas County Fair Board and a host of others.

Oftendahl expects to have more than 200 entries. Commercial units must pay a \$10 entry fee. Non-commercial entries pay no fee. Persons desiring more information may contact Oftendahl at rodeo information headquarters in Roseburg. They are located at Howard's Men's Wear, 507 SE Jackson St., telephone OR 3-3337.

The parade starts at 10 a.m. Saturday. It leaves the Jackson Street Triangle, goes south on Jackson to Lane Street, west on Lane to Rose Street and north on Rose to Central Junior High School.

The revised parade route has been approved by law enforcement authorities, Oftendahl said.

Klamath Girl Raped, Stabbed

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. — A man who raped and stabbed a 15-year-old girl is being sought in northern California by an armed posse.

The girl, suffering from four knife wounds in the chest, was in critical condition in a Klamath Falls hospital. She is Dorothy Jackson, of Chiloquin, Ore., who told police that she had met the man early Saturday morning in a Klamath Falls restaurant.

She agreed to take a ride with him and he drove her to a lumber yard in downtown Klamath Falls where the rape and stabbing occurred, police quoted her as saying from her hospital bed.

The man then drove her to the Sand Creek area, 30 miles north of here, and dumped her out of the car. She was found seven hours later by a passing motorist.

Her report of the attack led police to a green sedan owned by a man identified tentatively as Salvador Sorensen, 38, a Mexican railroad section hand.

Democrats Strive To Keep Control Of Congress Vote

WASHINGTON — Democratic leaders aimed today at establishing a seven-point legislative record they believe will help them retain control of Congress in the November election.

The program reportedly calls for social security expansion, increased public housing, high farm price supports, highway construction, school aid, a minimum wage boost and public power projects. There is no mention of a tax cut.

The minimum wage increase to \$1 an hour already in law. This went 10 cents an hour beyond Eisenhower administration recommendations.

A Democratic-backed farm bill to restore high ridge farm price supports was vetoed by President Eisenhower. Congress then passed another bill to set up a soil bank, as sought by the administration.

Although the Democratic legislative plan parallels the Eisenhower administration's recommendations at several points, the Democrats apparently expect to argue they have produced a better program than the Republican-controlled Congress could be expected to enact.

Democratic leaders figure they need about six weeks of intensive work to guide remaining measures on the list to final passage. If they go through with this plan, Congress may not be able to adjourn by the present mid-July target date.

They are not overlooking some pitfalls that may lie ahead. The House, for instance, may pass civil rights legislation which could split Senate Democrats in a filibuster certain to mean trouble at the party's presidential nominating convention in August.

Truman Not Sure About Receiving Degree In Latin

LONDON — Harry S. Truman jokingly said Monday he just might get that honorary degree from Oxford University if he has to accept it in Latin.

"I had only a schoolboy's education," he explained to a news conference on his arrival in Britain today. "The Latin it included I don't remember."

The ancient British university will give him an honorary doctorate of law Wednesday.

Truman and his wife came by steamer from the Netherlands for a 10-day visit during which they also will be received by Queen Elizabeth II and entertained by Prime Minister Eden and Sir Winston Churchill.

Chairman Agost pointed out there was some room available for late entries. He noted that Sutherland had made the only out of town entry to date. The Jaycees there will bring their famed baseball dunk game.

Drain Will Reduce Electric Power Rates To Consumers

A 10 per cent cut in municipal power rates in Drain has been approved by the City Council, according to the Drain Enterprise.

The cut was made possible by the high use of electricity in the city. The council was told that the local consumers use about 10,000 kilowatt-hours per year in each household, compared to a national average of 2,775 kwh.

Cost to consumers will be less than a cent per kwh. The rate decrease goes into effect on Sept. 1.

The council also raised connection charges for water users from the current \$25 to \$55, and will offer water service to out-of-city consumers for 40 per cent over the cost to users inside the city. The city policy of allowing out-of-city users to connect to the city mains is new.

The council okayed a proposal to sell Douglas County 1 1/2 acres from its five-acre sewage disposal plant site in South Drain. The county had asked for the land as the location for a maintenance shop for the road department.

Also approved in the meeting was an ordinance continuing a 22-mill tax levy on property. The money collected is used for city operation. The continuing five-year levy will expire in 1958.

Clouds Limit Air Search For Missing Fliers

LEBANON — Clouds again limited visibility, but ground parties searched in the Cascade Range Monday for two persons missing on a flight over the mountains on Thursday night.

Because of the clouds, no planes took off from search headquarters set up here by the state Board of Aeronautics.

The ground parties were investigating isolated reports from mountaineers that a Cessna 441 was heard flying overhead late Thursday after the time Dr. Ralph Johnston, 33, a Lebanon dentist, and Hartwig Hansen, about 33, of Salem, left the Lebanon airport in a plane piloted by Johnston.

Services Set Tuesday For Sarah Blayney, 94

Funeral services are scheduled Tuesday at 2 p.m. in the Chapel of the Roses for Sarah Mae Blayney, who died June 15 at her home at the age of 94.

She was born May 21, 1862, at Ft. Wayne, Ind., and has been a resident of this community for 42 years. She was a member of the Disabled American Veterans Auxiliary and the Methodist Church.

Surviving are two sons, Phillip of Roseburg and C. M. of Grants Pass and a daughter, Mrs. R. M. (Josephine) Walters of Bakersfield, Calif.

The Rev. Levi White will officiate at the funeral services. Interment will follow the services at Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

ing such an ordinance necessary. However, the intent of the city all along has been to use the land for a city park. The ordinance will make the intent binding.

Farrell said a crew from the city's department of public works probably will start stringing a fence around the property in the next few days.

Then a loop road through the property will be built so the public will have a chance to take a first-hand glimpse of it.

Later in the summer, it's proposed, a number of picnic areas and some playgrounds will be prepared by the city, which tentatively has \$12,000 budgeted for improvement of the grounds.

More Ford Foundation Checks To Be Mailed

NEW YORK — The Ford Foundation says checks totaling \$25,000,000 are being mailed this week to 559 hospitals in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

The payments are part of 200 million dollars in hospital grants approved by the foundation's trustees last December. Payments totaling 69 million dollars were made to 2,000 hospitals in April and May.

The foundation said yesterday it hopes all eligible hospitals will have received half their grants by July 31. The remaining half will be paid in March 1957.

Western Clothing Order Of Week For Big Rodeo

Western clothing is the order of the week in Douglas County. Rodeo association members have called on all residents to don western garb in honor of the 12th annual Douglas County Rodeo slated this weekend at the fairgrounds near Roseburg.

Residents who decline the invitation won't be jailed in a stockade this year, according to coordinator Dr. Verner Anderson. He said rodeo planners decided to dispense with the stockade in 1956.

School Census Not Authorized In Douglas Co.

No special school census anywhere in Douglas County has been authorized by school Supt. Kenneth F. Barneburg.

This week the superintendent emphasized "No one from this office has been authorized to take any such census. Anyone who is approached for school census information should call the sheriff's office or this department."

Barneburg's comments came on the heels of information from a Tenmile resident, who told of a visitation from a woman claiming she was taking a special school census for The Children's Institute. She reportedly added the information was to go to public schools.

Barneburg was told she asked names, ages, school grades of children and types of educational helps in the home (radio, magazines, television). The county superintendent said a check with Dilard Supt. William Bromley verified that she had not authorized such a census or procedure.

The county officials summed it up with "apparently there is some misrepresentation. It sounds like a possible sales approach... not authorized by the public schools."

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17 Bucking Horses Ready For Douglas Co. Rodeo

Seventeen bucking horses have been secured for the Douglas County Rodeo. They are furnished by Christiansen Bros. of Eugene.

The bucking broncos have impressive names: Warpaint, Blue Dog, Red River, Battley B and Happy Landing, Sky Ball, Try Me, Bill Bailey, Adam, Rocky Hill, Snafu, Short Stop, Black Boss, Satan's Sister, Mighty Mouse, Red Devil and Redmond.

All of the horses will buck at the Pendleton Roundup slated later this year.

Slip Of Tongue Forces Review Of TV Decision

NEW YORK — An apparent slip-of-the-tongue hint from an excited master of ceremonies forced a television quiz show to review a decision today on who won its \$44,000 jackpot.

Actor Vincent Price and jockey Bill Pearson tied again last night in answering art questions on CBS-TV's "The \$64,000 Challenge." The two were awarded \$32,000 each.

But after the show went off the air, CBS said master of ceremonies Sonny Fox "apparently" dropped a hint to Pearson. Listeners also reported hearing a voice give the answer before Pearson answered.

Pearson previously won \$64,000 with his knowledge of art. Price challenged him for the championship in the Great Art and Artists category.

Cowboy Breakfast Will Be Served At Fairgrounds

Hungry rodeo spectators will be well cared for Sunday.

The special cowboy breakfast will be served at the Douglas County Fairgrounds Sunday from 7 to 11 a.m. It will be prepared by the members of the Douglas County Mounted Sheriff's Posse Auxiliary.

Breakfast will be served in the spanking new Community Building, which has been newly completed for the rodeo. A moderate price will be charged, according to Douglas County Rodeo Assn. President Robert Tripodi.

Chrysler Corp. Workers To Decide On Strike Call

DETROIT — Members of United Auto Workers Local 212 will decide Thursday whether to call a strike which would idle more than 15,000 Chrysler Corp. workers.

A walkout by the local could force a later shutdown of 10 Chrysler plants.

A strike vote to be conducted Thursday was authorized unanimously Sunday by some 3,000 members of Local 212. The action was taken at a meeting during which union officials urged members to end a wildcat strike which has shut down Chrysler's Detroit Mack Avenue plant six times in the last seven working days.

Pat Caruso, local president, said some sentiment among union members Sunday indicated they would ballot overwhelmingly to strike.

Fire Equipment Company Burglary Told To Police

An estimated \$6.50 in currency and change was taken from Fire Equipment Co., 1445 SE Stephens St., sometime Friday night or Saturday morning, according to Roseburg police.

Officers said a roll-top desk was pried open and the money taken from it. Entry to the building was made through a second-floor window facing the alley behind the building.

Two Men Shoot Each Other Over Wife Of One

NORWICH, Conn. — Two men shot each other to death, a witness said, in a gun battle yesterday over a woman — the estranged wife of one of them. She was wounded.

Killed were Ralph Schnatter, 30, a shipping clerk, and Robert Miller, 42, a lineman from Willimantic. Police said Miller was planning to marry Schnatter's wife after she obtained a divorce.

Mrs. Jennie Barry, Mrs. Schnatter's mother, told police Schnatter fired a shotgun blast at Miller after Miller swore at him. She said that although Miller was hit he fired about five shots from a .32-caliber revolver at Schnatter. Miller then dropped and Schnatter staggered to his body and fired a shot from a .32-caliber revolver he also was carrying.

Mrs. Barry said that before he fired the shot, he muttered: "I'll make sure."

Then, she said, he turned toward his wife and chased her toward the house. He fired a shot that hit her in the arm.

Schnatter then doubled over on the front porch and died.

Two Men Killed In Auto Wrecks

Two men were killed in automobile wrecks and another drowned in Oregon Sunday.

Paul Bartholdy, 40 of The Dalles, became Hood River's fourth drowning victim in the past five Sundays when he slipped and was carried away by the current while fishing in Hood River. The body was recovered a few hours after the accident.

Edwin R. Shelley, 25, Eugene, was killed when the car in which he was riding ran off Highway 36, west of Eugene. He was en route home from a fishing trip to the Coast in a car driven by his father, Lester Shelley.

Norman E. Doty, 27, of Corvallis, was injured fatally when his speeding car plunged off Highway 20, west of Corvallis. He was being chased by police at the time for a traffic violation. A passenger, Jay R. Bevans, 25, Corvallis, was unhurt. Doty was the father of two young children.

Washington state reported eight highway deaths and one drowning over the weekend.

LA PAZ, Bolivia — Energetic Vice President Hernan Siles Zuazo has been elected president of Bolivia, to the surprise of no one and with less than 20 per cent of the nationwide election vote counted.

His victory in yesterday's voting promised a reorganization in the country's rich government-operated tin mines and distribution of more farmlands to landless, impoverished peasants.

Siles Zuazo, leader of the 1952 revolution which put his National Revolutionary Movement (MNR) and exiled President Victor Paz Estenssoro in power, termed the election "the first real democratic experience in Bolivia."

Mamie Eisenhower Goes Back To White House

WASHINGTON — Mamie Eisenhower got back to the White House briefly Monday for the first time since the President was hospitalized June 8.

The first lady left President Eisenhower's suite at Walter Reed Army hospital about 9:30 a.m. She planned to return in the early afternoon.

Mrs. Eisenhower went to the White House to be on hand for the arrival of her mother, Mrs. John S. Doud of Denver, who has been visiting at the Eisenhower's farm home at Gettysburg, Pa.

Egypt Hoists Its Flag Over Suez Canal Zone

PORT SAID, Egypt — Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser raised Egypt's flag over the Suez Canal zone Monday with a prayer that no foreign flag will ever fly here again.

While nine Russian-built MIGs streaked overhead and a 21-gun salute boomed from an Egyptian frigate in the harbor, Nasser hoisted the colors over Navy House, last building occupied by British troops.

Days Creek To Receive Federal School Funds

Sen. Richard L. Neuberger of Oregon has advised that the Days Creek school district that it has been awarded a tentative entitlement of \$1,094.80 under Public Law 874.

The award was made by the office of education of the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare. The funds are distributed to school districts under a program to provide financial assistance for schools in federally affected areas.

The district was certified for an immediate payment of \$985. A treasury check for that amount has been sent to the district.
