Golf Champ Licks Jittery Nerves In Classic Victory

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Maturity has made Cary Middlecoff the world's greatest golfer.

But, like his predecessor Ben Hogan, physical condition may keep him from establishing that fact.

When he won his second National Open championship Saturday, posting a 281 total for 72 holes and then sweating it out in the locker room while Hogan, Julius Boros, Ted Kroll and a few others charged at him and dropped back, Middlecoff proved that he is the one golfer to beat in any tournament at this time.

The tall, now-slightly-paunchy retired dentist from Memphis, Tenn., and Dallas, Tex., is 35. He has been rated among the leading golf professionals ever since he won his first Open as a sophomore pro in 1949.

Until the last year or so, temperament and jittery nerves have kept him from establishing his greatness. He was the kind of player who was on top of the world — affable, friendly and humorous — when he was winning and ready to bite your ears off if a few important putts didn't drop.

Golf is a \$50,000-a-year business for Middlecoff, but at a time when he should be collecting, he has a parttime player.

"I'm going to play at Philadelphia next week because I prom-

ised George Fazio a year ago that I would," he said. "My doctor says I shouldn't play in the PGA Championship (he was runner-up to Doug Ford last year) so I'll rest until Tam O'Shanter in August."

"You know I have tendonitis in my left hip. The doctor says it's something like tennis elbow and if I play too much it might become chronic. My right leg is a little shorter than my left, that's what causes it."

In the open, Hogan and Boros tied for second with 282. Kroll had a 285 total.

Charlie Grimm's last official was to announce Joe Adcock would play both games at Brooklyn yesterday. It was one of the

best moves he ever made — for the new manager, Fred Haney.

Before Grimm knew he was going to resign, he told the players Saturday he was taking Adcock off the bench and starting him at first base as a reward for his pinch homer in Saturday's game. Before the night was over, Grimm was out and Haney was in.

Adcock hit three home runs for Milwaukee yesterday, one of them the first ever hit over the left field stands at Ebbets Field, as the Braves swept a double-header for Haney 5-4 and 3-1.

Despite a double defeat by St. Louis, the Pittsburgh Pirates still held the National League lead by a half game. The Cards dumped the Pirates 3-1 on Stan Musial's two-run homer and 8-3 on homers by Hank Sauer and Bob Del Greco. The Cincinnati Redlegs or

Brooklyn Dodgers could have sneaked into the lead by winning a pair. The Dodgers dropped two and the Redlegs had to settle for a split with New York. After successive homers by Willie Mays and Bill White gave the Giants the opener 7-6, Joe Nuxhall shut out New York with two singles for a 1-0 verdict.

Robin Roberts ended his personal losing streak by pitching the Phillies to his first victory since May 24 with a seven-hitter (7-1) but the Chicago Cubs bounced back to win the second 7-4 on Sam Jones' six-hitter.

Brookie Norm Siebern and Yogi Berra ripped Early Wynn for a pair of two-run homers in the first inning as the New York Yankees drubbed Cleveland 9-4. The defeat dropped the Indians into fourth place.

Chicago pounded Washington for 20 hits, and a 20-2 romp in the opener and then settled back to absorb a 10-4 beating in the second game. The results left the White Sox 5 1/2 games back of the Yanks.

Frank Sullivan beat Detroit for the 10th straight time with the help of a 19-hit Boston attack in a 13-2 romp. Baltimore's Bob Nieman, a .435 hitting terror when he sees Kansas City pitching, hit a three-run homer with the score tied in the eighth inning as the Orioles whipped the A's 7-2.

The largest Ebbets Field crowd since June 3, 1951, a total of 34,394, saw Adcock crash his homer with the score tied 4-4 in the ninth inning of the first game. Big Joe already had hit a two-run homer and a single in the opener. He started the Braves on the way in the second game with his ninth homer of the year in the second inning.

Spokane Golfers Earn National Publix Berths

SPOKANE (AP) — Billy Lauer, Shino McKenna and Brick Duran will represent Spokane in the National Public Links Golf Tournament.

Lauer won the top qualifying spot Sunday by touring the Downriver course in 144. McKenna took second with 147 and Duran won the third spot in a sudden death playoff with Al Gustafson after they wound up regular play with 148.

Gustafson and Ron Sanders, 150, were named alternates.

CUBS BEING MADE OVER

CHICAGO (AP) — The Chicago Cubs used five new players in their opening day lineup. They were Don Hoak at third, Walt Moryn in right, Monte Irvin in left, Gale Wade in center and Hobie Landrith behind the plate. All have been up in the majors with other teams.

Cahill Resting Before Starting Term In Prison

PORTLAND (AP) — Otto Cahill, retired Army officer convicted of taking \$750 in public funds from a water district at Delake, rested in the Portland Air Base hospital Saturday instead of starting his sentence in the state prison.

Sheriff's deputies went to Cahill's home at Nelscott Friday to take Cahill to the prison, but said Cahill pleaded illness. An Air Force ambulance arrived soon, picked him up and brought him to the hospital here.

Col. George Ceuleers, commander of the air base, said the base surgeon, Capt. R. O. Amdall, had obtained clearance from the Lincoln County district attorney to bring Cahill in for a checkup. Cahill, a retired officer, has used facilities of the base hospital in the past. He was released 1 1/2 months ago from the hospital after spending 50 days there with a heart ailment.

The colonel said Cahill would be released to civil authorities whenever they ask for his custody. He added that hospital doctors were completing laboratory work Saturday to determine whether another move would have any effect on Cahill's health.

The Yakima Bears, their Northwest League lead trimmed to two games, move back into the friendly confines of their home field Monday night after getting a rude sendoff from Lewiston.

The Lewiston Broncos sent the Bears packing off home in custody of two defeats in a twin bill Sunday, 8-7 and 5-1.

The Eugene Emeralds moved to within two games of the Bears by splitting with Spokane, losing the opener 5-3 and winning the nightcap, 4-3.

Wenatchee's Chiefs divided a bargain bill with the Salem Senators in the other league action, taking the second game 2-2 after dropping the first game 1-0.

Pitching was the story at Salem. Jerry Cade held the Chiefs to three scattered hits in the opener and Gene Shortlidge and Chuck Lybeck combined to limit the Senators to six hits in the nightcap. The Senators won the opener

with one run on singles by Jack Dunn, Gene Laursen and Mel Krause in the last of the ninth inning. Merb Anderson, who solo homered for the Chiefs in the first inning of the second game, doubled and moved around on an infield out and a sacrifice fly to score the winning run in the fifth.

The Spokane Indians hopped on reliever Bill Griffin for two runs in the seventh inning of the opener at Eugene to hand the Emeralds their first loss in seven decisions this season.

The two runs came on a pair of walks, an error, an infield out, a sacrifice, a stolen base and Jim Sampson's single.

The Emeralds pushed one run across in the first inning of the nightcap and then salted the game away with three runs in the second on Bill Girdley's bases-loaded single.

Recruit Hangs Self At Base

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — The Marine Corps said Saturday an 18-year-old recruit hanged himself Friday, leaving a note clearing his drill instructors of any blame.

"This is to certify," the note said, "that nothing any of my drill instructors in the Marine Corps have done to me has affected my dismissal from life."

His identity was withheld pending notice to relatives. The note said he loved the Marine Corps and "I would like for my girl to know I died with a great love for her in my heart."

The recruit, at the training depot since June 4, was described by drill instructors as quiet, conscientious and of unusual promise in leadership ability. He had been made a squad leader.

His note said: "I have known for a long time that I was no good to the world and the last couple of years have just been leading up to this. I have never had the guts before, and I guess now I don't have the guts the Marines need. I love the Marines."

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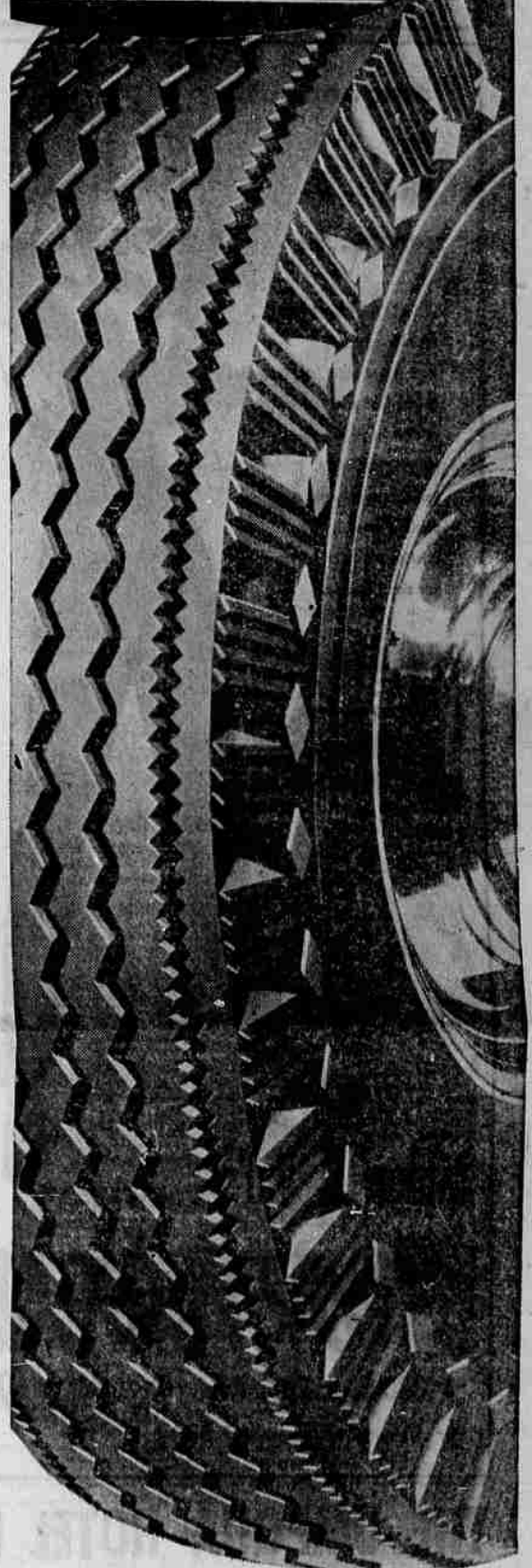
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
