Patterson's Sore Fist Believed To Be On Mend

NEW YORK (AP) — Heavyweight contender Floyd Patterson, who is hoping his injured right hand will heal fast enough so that he can fight Archie Moore for the heavyweight title in September, heard some encouraging news Tuesday.

The reassuring words came from Charley Goldman, the veteran trainer of retired heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano.

Goldman told Patterson and manager Gus d'Amato that Rocky had suffered an almost identical injury to his right hand early in his career and fought three months and one week later.

If the 21-year old Patterson has the same good luck, he will be able to go through with the title fight with Moore in Yankee Stadium in late September.

Patterson broke the metacarpal bone of his fourth finger—the one next to the pinkie—in outpointing Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson at the Garden June 8. The metacarpal is the bone behind the knuckle.

Portland-Bevo Pitcher Gets Outright Release

PORTLAND (AP) — Charles (Red) Adams was handed an outright release Monday after seven years of pitching with Portland in the Pacific Coast League.

Joe Ziegler, Portland general manager, said the veteran right-hander was given his release to make room for outfielder Frank Carswell, recently acquired from Tulsa in the Texas League.

Adams underwent a toe operation in the opening week of the 1956 season and has been on the inactive list since.

Ziegler also announced the optioning of Jerry Eixley to Eugene of the Northwest League. Eixley, was signed by the Beavers two weeks ago.
