American Home Builders Delegates in Russia

MOSCOW — An 18-member delegation from the American Home Builders Assn. has arrived here for a one-month tour of the Soviet Union.

The group, headed by the association president, Earl Smith of El Cerrito, Calif., is repaying a visit to the United States last fall by Soviet housing officials and expects to visit construction sites from Leningrad to the Caucasus.

Visits will be made to Leningrad, Minsk, Kiev, Voroshilovgrad, Sochi and Suchumi on the Black Sea, Tiflis, the capital of the Georgian republic, Erevan, capital of the Armenian republic, Baku, the oil center, Stalingrad and the steel center of Magnitogorsk.

The Americans leave for Leningrad Monday night after a sight-seeing tour by bus of Moscow, and visits to highway, apartment and school construction projects in the capital. They also expected to view the sprawling agricultural fair at Moscow and attend the Bolshoi theater.

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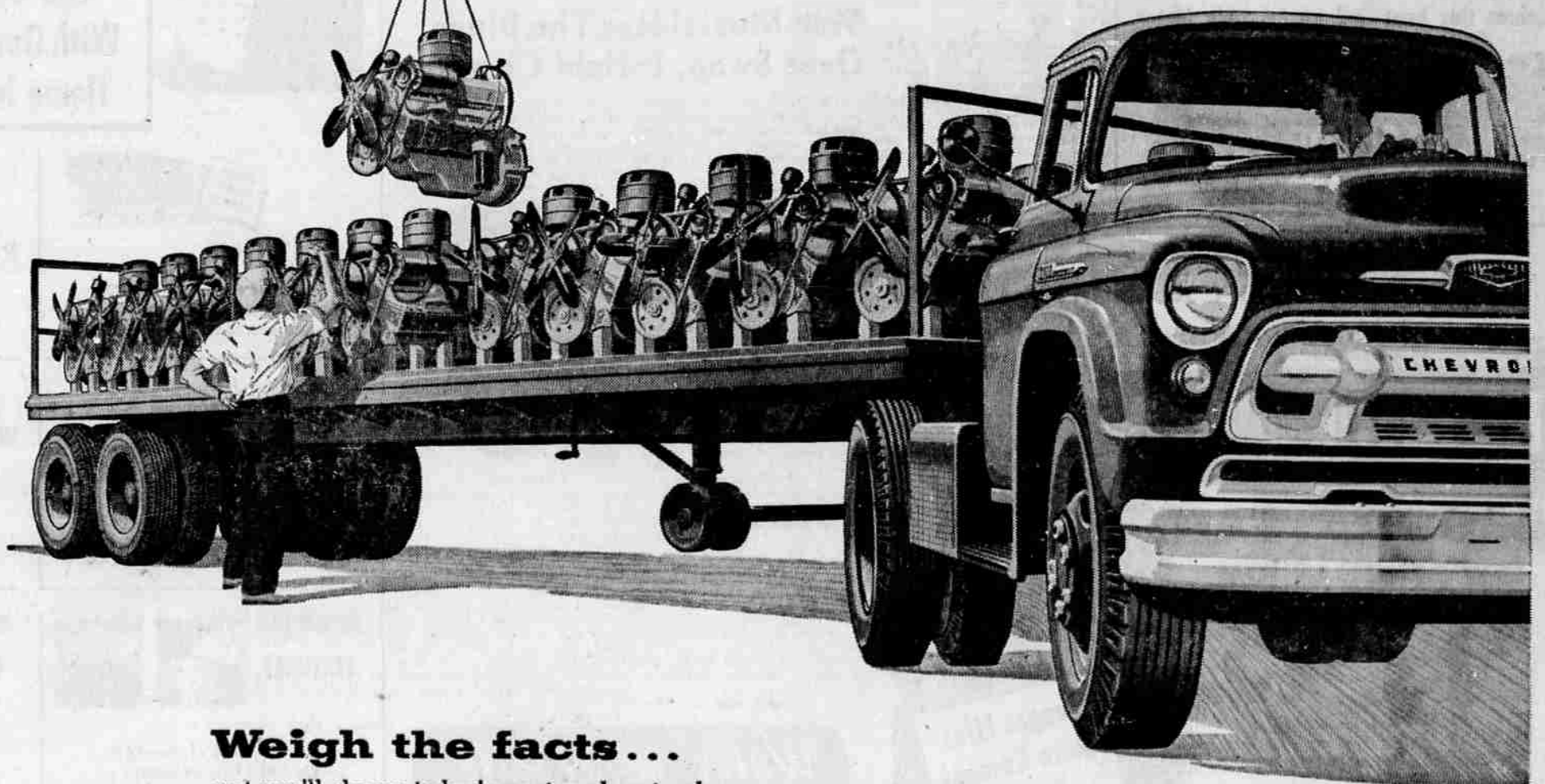
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
