Chisox Pitcher Ekes Win Over Orioles As Each Team Hits But Once In 1-0 Tilt

In 1953, Jack Harshman gave his wife a catcher's mitt for Christmas. He wanted to practice all he could before making his bid as a major league pitcher the next spring, and after seven futile years as a first baseman, he both figured he had a lot of catching up to do.

Thursday, he caught up with the record book.

Only twice since 1900 had major league pitchers battled each other with one-hitters in one game. Yesterday, the third such game went into the books — and Harshman

won 1-0 for the Chicago White Sox against Baltimore's Connie Johnson and George Zaverink. The victory left the second place Sox five games behind the American League leading New York Yankees, who open a four-game series in Chicago's Comiskey Park tonight after an open date yesterday.

day. In Thursday's other games Cleveland beat Boston and Tom Brewer's jinx 5-0 behind Early Wynn's four-hitter, and Kansas City slammed Washington back into the cellar 15-8.

Braves Win Another
In the National, Milwaukee's Braves won their sixth straight under new Manager Fred Haney and retained first place with a 7-2 job on Pittsburgh's slumping Pirates. Brooklyn held on to second in the only other game played, beating St. Louis 9-8 as Roy Campanella hit a pair of three-run homers, his second tying it in a winning four-run ninth inning rally with two out.

Rain postponed Chicago at New York in the only other game scheduled.

Harshman, a three-time loser as a first baseman with the New York Giants, has won only four of eight decisions with the White Sox this season. But three have been beauties. He beat Cleveland and Herb Score 1-0 in a double two-hitter in his first start April 19, and he beat Washington 7-0 on four hits June 16. He gave seven hits in the other victory, edging Baltimore 3-2.

Double Only Hit
The only hit the 28-year-old southpaw allowed yesterday was a seventh-inning double by Gus Triandos. But Harshman, who has a string of 20 scoreless innings going, nailed him at third after fielding Hal Smith's attempted sacrifice.

In all, Harshman — who was 14-8 and fanned 16 in one game in his 1954 debut with the White Sox, and 11-7 last season — faced 32 men, walking four and striking out four.

The only White Sox hit off Johnson, who went to Baltimore from

Chicago last month, was a first-inning double by Nellie Fox. But it followed a leadoff walk to Jim Rivera, who then stole second. Johnson, who fanned seven, was lifted for a pinch-hitter in the eighth.

It was the first double one-hitter since Bobby Cain and the St. Louis Browns — Baltimore's predecessors in the AL — beat Bob Feller and Cleveland 1-0 April 23, 1956. The winning run was scored in the first inning of that one, too, with Marty Marion, now White Sox field boss, driving it in as player-manager of the Browns.

Campy Ends Slump
Campanella's second homer, off reliever Murry Dickson, overshadowed Don Zimmer's single that brought the winning run home in the ninth to beat the Cards.

The big Dodger catcher apparently ended his slump with the shot. He had hit only one homer in six weeks and was dropped to eighth in the batting order because of a .207 average.

Stan Musial homered twice for the fourth-place Cards, with a man on each time, and with Al Dark had four hits in five trips. Musial now is batting .321 and Dark .316 since coming to the Cards from the Giants last week.

Zimmer had three hits and two RBIs after replacing shortstop Pee-wee Reese who was knocked dizzy but otherwise apparently uninjured in a first-inning double-play.

Pirates Lose Again
Del Rice and Danny O'Connell combined for seven of Milwaukee's 13 hits, with O'Connell driving four runs as Bob Buhl won his seventh. Ron Kline lost his sixth as the Pirates dropped their sixth straight.

Cleveland handed Brewer his second defeat, breaking his eight-game winning streak and beating the young righthander for the first time since May 1, 1955.

Joe Taylor's three-run, tenth-inning homer gave Seattle a 4-1 triumph over San Diego Thursday night and undisputed leadership in the Pacific Coast League.

The Rainiers moved one game ahead of Los Angeles, which was topped 7-3 by the San Francisco Seals. It was the Angels' first series loss at home this year.

Vancouver's Mounties came through in a cliffhanger finish to beat the Hollywood Stars 6-5 in 10 innings. The Portland Beavers defeated the Sacramento Solons 8-3.

Seattle and San Diego went into the tenth tied 1-1 in a taut pitching duel between the Padre's John Carmichael and the Rainiers' Art Schallack.

Taylor Tags Homer
Bobby Balencia screamed a double to open Seattle's rally and Art Schallack walked. Taylor then tagged a Carmichael pitch into the stands.

That stretched Seattle's win streak to seven games.

San Francisco's Jerry Casale threw solo home run pitches to Angels Steve Bilko, Bob Speake

and Jim Bolger, but registered his tenth win against three losses. Sal Taormina of the Seals drove in four runs with a homer and a double. Taormina just about settled things in the first inning when his double climaxed a five-run rally. Young Dick Drott, Angel starter, walked four men in that frame.

Pitcher Kicked Out
The Seals "rode" umpire Art Passarella after he ruled Casale failed to touch third base before coming home in the fourth on a sacrifice fly. Passarella evicted Eli Grba who grabbed at his throat in the "chokeup" sign.

In Vancouver it seemed all over when Bill Mazeroski, Hollywood second sacker, homered in the top of the tenth to put the Stars ahead 5-4.

But Lefty O'Doul's men produced two runs on old-fashioned baseball in their half to win 6-5. Frank Marsh walked, went to third on a sacrifice and an infield out and scored the tying run on Frank Austin's single. After another single, Manager Clay Hopper ordered a walk to fill the bases.

Austin came in with the winning run as shortstop Dick Smith bobbled Len Neal's grounder.

Jim Baxes hit two home runs and Luis Marquez one as Portland hammered three Sacramento pitchers for 13 hits. Nippy Jones hit a homer for Sacramento.

It was the second consecutive win for Portland, after snapping an 11-game losing streak.

It looked dark for Portland when the game started. Pitcher Darrell Martin gave up a walk and then Jones hit his home run.

But the Beavers drove lefty Gene Reardon from the mound in the first inning, scoring four runs on three walks, two singles, an infield out and an outfield fly. They added three more in the second inning as Marquez hit a two-run homer and Baxes hit the first of his two home runs with the bases empty.

Beverly and Al Fish copped their second consecutive mixed doubles as they combined totals for a high 1,123 score Thursday night.

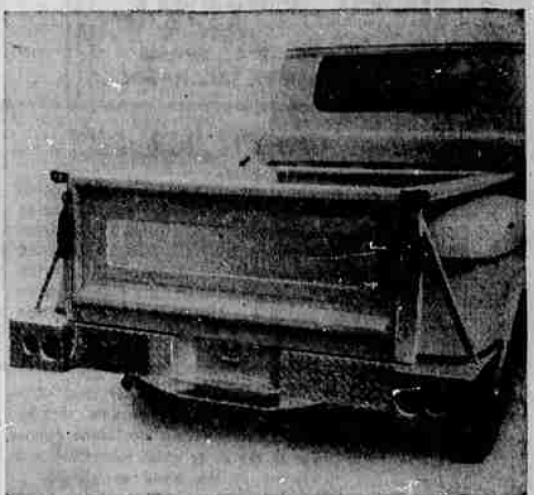

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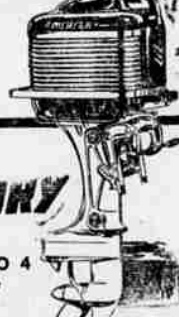
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
