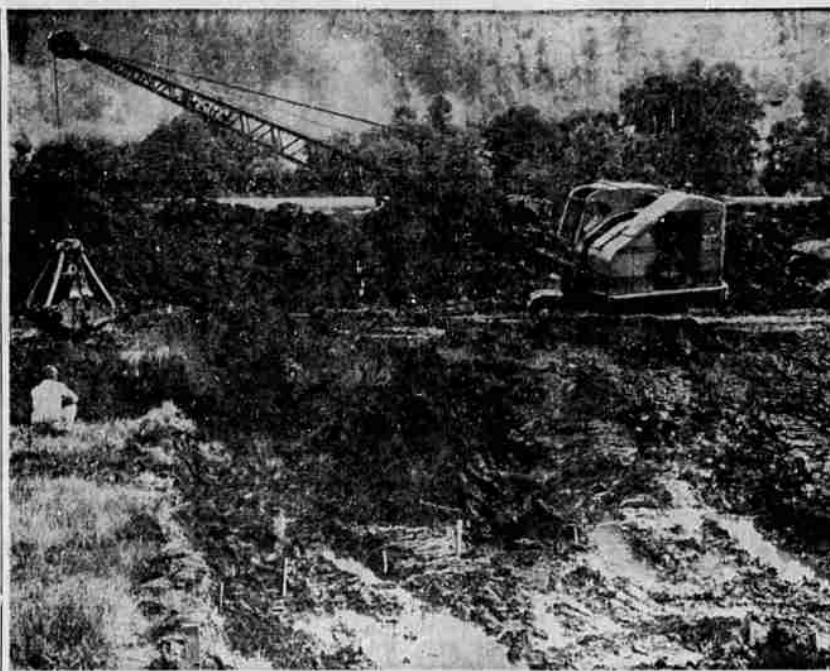
Group singing was led by Loreaine Veenstra at the piano and relay game was presented. Mrs. Herman Aydelott served refreshments.

'Splash' Dams Opposed For Umpqua Basin

The Umpqua Basin Water Resources Advisory Committee this week went on record against any "splash" dams in the Umpqua basin.

The committee members approved a resolution in which the committee said it was opposed to the use of "splash" dams and requested that the Oregon Water Resources Board make the committee's stand known to the state engineer.

The county at present has no such operative dams, but the committee contends they are detrimental to aquatic life.

The next meeting of the committee is scheduled July 12.

Grazing To Be Allowed In Soil Bank Program

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture Department will permit farmers in drought-designated counties to graze land retired from production under the new soil bank program and still get payments authorized by the plan.

While the program is designated to bar grazing on land taken out of production, the new farm law does permit grazing in drought areas upon appeal of the governor of the state.

Under the emergency feed program operating in the designated drought counties, farmers and stockmen may obtain certain feed grains at a reduction in price of \$1 a 100 pounds to help them maintain basic livestock herds.

Timber Cut And Sold In Northwest Hits High

PORTLAND — Forest Service timber cut and sold in the Pacific Northwest region is headed toward new highs in volume and value, Regional Forester J. Herbert Stone reported Friday.

"Value of timber cut for the first three quarters of the current fiscal year is already within less than a million dollars of equalling the total for the entire fiscal year 1955, which broke all previous records," the forester said.

Volume of timber reported cut in the 18 national forests in Oregon and Washington in the first three-quarters of the fiscal year was 2.1 billion board feet—an increase of 20 million board feet, and a value increase of \$8,051,733 over the corresponding period of last year.

Fifty More Boys Can Be Enrolled In Swim School

Room for 50 more boys is available in the YMCA summer swimming program, according to Roseburg YMCA Secretary Don Naden.

Boys in both the Roseburg and Winston-Dillard areas may enroll now or any time later in the program and receive instruction in either beginners' or advanced swimming and lifesaving.

For Roseburg, the swimming classes are conducted for boys 9 to 14 years old at the city pool three days a week at 4:30 p. m. Qualified instructors are on hand at the pool and parents are invited to observe classes, Naden stated.

Those interested can enroll at the YMCA office or at 520 S.E. Spruce St. during the day.

The program is carried on at the Dillard School for boys and girls 9 to 12 years old. Instruction for boys is held on Monday and Wednesday from 9:30 to noon and at the same time on Tuesday and Thursday for girls. Enrollment is also at the Dillard School.

In emphasizing the importance of the program, Naden stated that "Swimming is about the best all-around body conditioner there is." He urges people to swim now this summer and also to learn to swim better since "most water accidents involve poor swimmers rather than non-swimmers."

NEW YORK — A 40-year-old restaurant worker in a frenzy of anger early Saturday stabbed a 26-year-old woman friend and then hurled her two young daughters out a fourth-floor window.

The injured children's pitiful cries of, "Mommy, Mommy," soon attracted attention and led to discovery of their wounded mother. All were rushed to a hospital, the mother with knife injuries of the chest and neck, and the children with undetermined injuries.

The man fled and was not immediately apprehended.

Police identified those involved as Eleanor Small, her daughters Lois, 8, and Alzora, 4, and James Taylor. Police said the man and woman are employed at the same restaurant.
