Governor Calls For Holding Down Costs For State

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Elmo Smith Thursday asked all state departments to make every effort to reduce operating costs in preparing budgets for the next two years, pointing out that the people of Oregon "clearly desire and deserve relief from the present burden of taxes."

Gov. Smith outlined his administration's basic budget policies in an executive memorandum sent to all departments, boards, commissions and institutions whose budgets are controlled by the executive office.

He urged a positive approach to reducing governmental operating costs without impairing essential services to the people of the state.

Gov. Smith said only there would be no new programs, except those whose need can be clearly established. He said the state cannot assume a continued revenue increase in 1957-58, although he indicated there appears to be a favorable prospect of a general fund surplus "which has accrued primarily because of a level of general prosperity higher than that originally anticipated."

"Salary schedules must be developed to relieve the present serious problem of recruiting and holding technically trained personnel," the governor said.

Gov. Smith said he is in full accord with the desire of conscientious state officers and employees to improve public services along with the growth of the state, but added that such programs must be limited by the ability of the state to pay.

The governor did not hold out much hope for an extensive building program during the next two years.

"The state already has a heavy burden of previously committed projects to finance," he explained. "It is likely that few new projects can be added this biennium."

Aged Wheelchair Invalid Fails To Survive Fire

PORTLAND (AP) — An 85-year-old wheelchair invalid suffered fatal burns Saturday despite efforts of two 15-year-old boys to save him.

They saw Alexander Watts wrapped in flames in his back yard, and rushed over to smother the flames with a blanket. Watts was taken to a hospital, where he died several hours later.

The boys, Thomas C. Pitka and Mike C. Barnett, were in an adjoining yard when the flames burst up and enveloped Watts.

Police said Watts, clad in pajamas, had propelled himself into the back yard, apparently after the pajamas had become soaked with kerosene inside the house. Police are investigating to determine just how the kerosene caught fire once he was outside.

Rotting Onions Stir School Dist.

PORTLAND (AP) — The Oregon State Air Pollution Authority Friday took action on a protest from the Brooks, Oregon, school district about the strong odor of rotting onions.

Lula Mikkelsen, clerk of the Marion County school district, said in a letter that the odor from a pile of discarded onions near the school was too much for the students. "Not only is the odor strong, but it causes a fly hazard in the lunchrooms," she said.

She said the pile of onions, located on the Labish Cold Storage Co. property near the school, was 10 feet high in the center and 100 feet in circumference.

Chairman Carl E. Green said that Ronald E. Jones, an official of the firm had been notified of the protest, but that he had not replied.
