

Small Business Aid Office Due In Portland

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Small Business Administration will establish a procurement assistance office in Portland, Ore., and will grant additional lending authority to the office, Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) reported Monday.

He said the office will have authority to approve loans up to \$15,000 and thereby relieve Oregon businessmen of the indirect method of channeling requests through the regional office at Seattle.

Morse said the plan was to be commended, but "it is considerably less than I should like and I intend to continue to urge the Small Business Administration to make Portland a full-fledged regional office."

Bounced Check For Fine Ups Drunk Driving Rap

PASADENA, Calif. — James T. Jones pleaded guilty to drunk driving June 7, Municipal Judge Joseph A. Sprankel Jr. suspended a 180-day sentence but fined him \$210.

Jones gave the court a check for \$110 and got an okay to pay the balance over a period of time.

Yesterday Jones was back in court. Judge Sprankel not only reinstated the original 180 days but added 180 more because Jones' check bounced.

Miller Will Wed Marilyn Despite Pro-Red Inquiry

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman Walter (D-Pa.) says his House Committee on Un-American Activities will discuss contempt action against playwright Arthur Miller — but it shouldn't interfere in Miller's honeymoon with Marilyn Monroe.

Walter said that Miller was "very obviously in contempt" when he appeared before the committee Thursday. He did not say when the committee might consider further action.

The chairman said he was speaking for himself "but I just don't see how we can consistently not cite him."

The contempt question arose when Miller refused to tell the committee the names of those who were at a meeting of what he understood to be Communist writers in 1939 or 1940.

Denies Subjection By Reds. Miller testified that in the past he had supported Communist fronts, something he wouldn't do now. He said he was never under "Communist discipline."

Miller is seeking a passport to go to England to "join the woman who will be my wife," Walter said he didn't think a contempt action would have any bearing on the passport.

Walter was asked if he thought it possible that Miller might have to honeymoon in this country.

"Well," Walter said, "I don't suppose there are too many places in this country where he wouldn't enjoy a honeymoon with Marilyn Monroe."

Miller said during a hearing recess that he plans to wed Miss Monroe before July 13, when she is due to leave for London to make a movie.

Jaycee Convention Names Winners Of Sweepstakes

KANSAS CITY (AP) — The United States Junior Chamber of Commerce Tuesday named Meridian, Miss., as winner of its sweepstakes award in public improvement.

Meridian, in the under-50,000 population group, won out over Detroit, Mich., first in the over-100,000 population class; Salisbury, N.C., in the under-25,000 group; and Ritzville, Wash., in the under-10,000 classification.

Other sweepstakes winners named at the annual Jaycee convention were St. Paul, Minn., for fire prevention; Odessa, Tex., for Americanism; Hopkins, Minn., membership and personnel; Baton Rouge, La., extension; and Miami, Fla., international relations.

Sweepstakes winners were designated outstanding in six categories regardless of population size.

The incumbent Board of Directors tentatively accepted a record \$596,790 operating budget for the 1956-57 fiscal year, subject to final approval by the incoming board.

The new board was chosen at state conventions and will not be installed until Friday.

The Jaycees named first, second and third place winners in 28 categories, grouping them in four population classes, under 10,000, under 25,000, under 50,000 and over 100,000.

Minnesota placed first for state-wide projects, followed by Arkansas and Connecticut. Colorado was winner the printed state publications award and New Hampshire for mimeographed state publications.

Integration Spur Convention Aim Of Negroes' Assn.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Seeking a speedup of racial integration in all phases of U.S. activities, more than 800 delegates will convene here tonight for the 47th annual convention of the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People.

The six-day convention will open formally in Civic Auditorium with a keynote speech by Thurgood Marshall, chief NAACP attorney. He led the legal battle which won favorable recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions on desegregation in Southern states schools.

Special guests will include Autherine Lucy Foster of Tyler, Tex., first Negro student at the University of Alabama, who was stoned on the campus and later expelled.

Also billed as speakers with grievances to relate are L. A. Blackman of Ellmore, S.C., who NAACP officials say was forced out of his building construction business there by the Ku Klux Klan when he obtained signatures on a school desegregation petition, and Gus Courts of Belzoni, Miss. Courts headed the Belzoni NAACP branch and fled to Texas after reporting he was nearly killed by a shotgun blast when he registered to vote.

W.C.T.U.'s National Leader In Youth Service Dated In Douglas County

The national secretary of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union children's department of the Loyal Temperance Legion will arrive in Roseburg Friday.

She is Miss Jean Hansen of Evanston, Ill. Miss Hansen will conduct classes in temperance work at the LTL camp Saturday and Sunday. The camp will be held at the Wolf Creek Boy Scout Camp on Little River, reports correspondent Mrs. Hazel S. Marsh.

Miss Hansen has held the secretarial post since July 1, 1954. Prior to that date she was a South Dakota grade school teacher for 10 years. She has announced she will work to carry out the theme of "junior citizens on parade," which is the national slogan for children's work.

Stressing her conviction that "youth must be thoroughly and properly educated on the nature and effects of narcotics," Miss Hansen emphasizes a strong training program supplemented with visual aids.

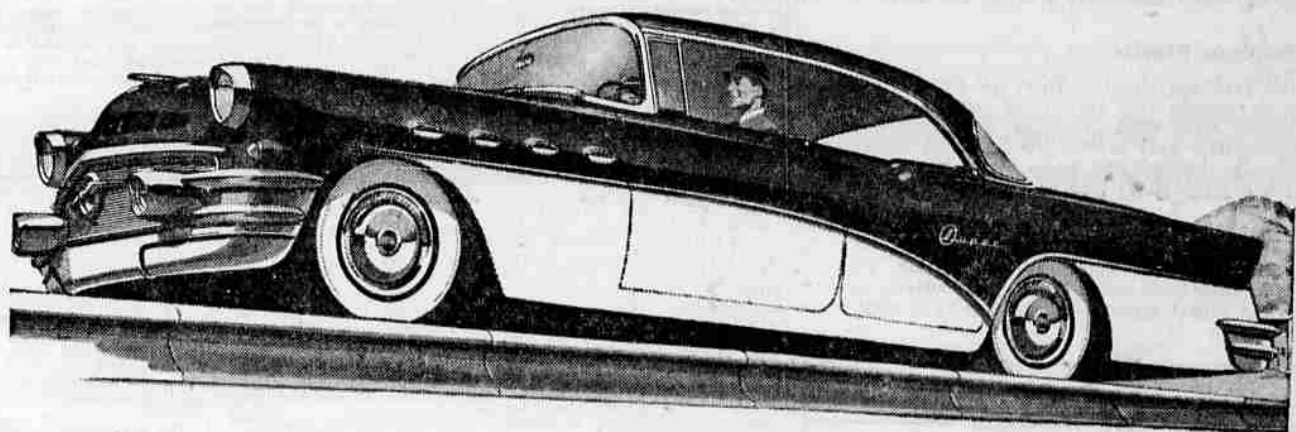
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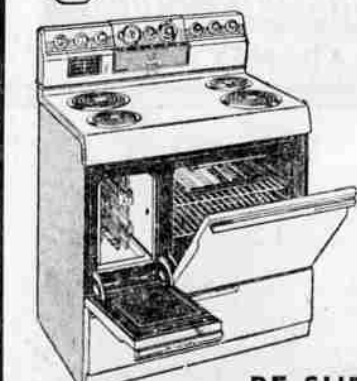
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
