Martin, Lewis Split Ends Long Partnership

HOLLYWOOD — Dean Martin, who wants to live like Bing Crosby, and Jerry Lewis, who wants to be a Charlie Chaplin, next month will formally end a multi-million-dollar partnership.

Ironically, the final split will come after completion of an Eastern night club tour originally planned to commemorate their 10th anniversary and their new picture "Partners."

Final barrier to the split was removed when producer Hal Wallis, who first brought them into the movies, agreed to let each make a separate movie. As a team, they have been among the biggest box office attractions in movie industry.

Wallis' decision marked the greatest reversal of field since Red Grange's heyday. At noon, he emphatically told a reporter that he intended to hold the boys to their contract, a clause of which prevented them from ever making movies for any producer unless they were teamed.

However, six hours later Y. Frank Freeman, Paramount studio boss, "convinced" Wallis to change his mind.

One source close to the meeting said that Paramount holds a 51 per cent interest in Wallis Productions and that made the "convincing" easier.

Paramount earlier had agreed to allow the warring duo to go their separate ways.

Record Speed Achieved By Recoverable Rocket

SAN DIEGO — A world record of 1,560 miles per hour for a recoverable rocket sled was claimed here by Convair Division of General Dynamics Corp.

The company reported the speed—about twice that of sound—was reached by a sled on a 10,000-foot rail track at Edwards Air Force Base on the Mojave Desert in southern California.

Convair said the previous record of 1,280 miles an hour was on a 21,000-foot track at Edwards.

Greater speeds have been reached by nonrecoverable rocket sleds. The new sled, much lighter than earlier models, was developed to test the action of rain on high-speed aircraft or missiles.
