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Phone Rate Hike Request Slated For Quiz In July

SALEM OR — Hearing on a plan by West Coast Telephone Company to increase its exchange and toll rates will be held here July 17, Charles H. Heltzel, state public utilities commissioner, announced Monday.

The company had proposed increases which would return about \$300,000 annually from its operations in La Grande, Lakeview, Coos Bay and Beaverton districts.

This was offered April 12, but the PUC suspended the increase for a period of six months beyond May 12 pending investigation and hearing.

West Coast will present its arguments at the July 17 hearing here after which PUC will call a recess for investigation before a final public hearing.

The firm says it needs the increase to complete a proposed program of conversion to dial systems and service extensions.

Admiral Ernest King Dies Of Heart Ailment

PORTSMOUTH, N.H. (AP) — Fleet Adm. Ernest Joseph King, U.S.N., who directed the mightiest sea force the world has ever known in vanquishing the navies of Germany and Japan in World War II, died Monday in Portsmouth Naval Hospital after many years of failing health. He was 77.

Death was attributed to a heart failure, induced by high blood pressure, suffered Sunday morning.

Adm. King was the first officer to serve simultaneously as commander-in-chief of the U.S. fleet and chief of naval operations—posts entrusted to him after Japan's surprise attack devastated Pearl Harbor.
