Hogan, Snead Take Canadian Golf Cup

VIRGINIA WATER, England (AP)—Almost 40,000 British golf fans at the Canada Cup tournament saw Ben Hogan turn his hand to nursing—and the man he nursed was the illustrious Sam Snead.

Hogan and Snead won the international 3-day 72-hole team competition Tuesday from a field of 29 nations.

Hogan took the individual trophy. "I'm delighted," the fabulous little Texan told the crowd at the presentation ceremony. "Not only because I've won this trophy but because I was able to get Snead back on his game again."

That's just what Hogan did over three days—helped Snead back into the groove.

Snead, worried by a hand injury, shot 78 the first day, 73 the second, another 73 on the morning round of the final day and a brilliant 68 as the climax.

All the time Hogan shot immaculate golf—68-69-72-68—277.

Archie Moore Top-Listed In Two Boxing Divisions

NEW YORK (AP)—Archie Moore, claimant to the world's heavyweight title vacated by Rocky Marciano, received top listing in both the heavyweight and light heavyweight classes in the latest monthly rankings of Ring Magazine Wednesday.

The rankings listed Floyd Patterson, conqueror of Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson, the No. 2 man along the heavyweights and Gerhard Hecht of Germany as the No. 1 challenger for Moore's light-heavyweight crown.

The boxing magazine named Gene Fullmer of West Jordan, Utah, as the leading challenger for Ray Robinson's middleweight title and rated former champions Carmen Basilio of Syracuse and Tony DeMarco of Boston 1, 2 behind welterweight champion Johnny Saxton.

Steve Bilko Continues To Pace Coast Hitters

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Steve Bilko of Los Angeles, the terror of Pacific Coast League pitchers, still tops PCL batters as he has for weeks past.

The giant right-handed first baseman is at the head of the list percentage-wise, with a batting average of .402; he leads in home runs with 31, in runs batted in, at 74, and he is tied with his team mate, Gene Mauch, second baseman, with 111 hits.

New Standard Seen In Olympic Tryout

LOS ANGELES (AP)—There are predictions that the 14:6.8 minute record for the 5,000-meter run will be broken this weekend in the final U. S. Olympic team tryouts.

A strong field including the University of Oregon's Bill Dellinger and Dick Hart of Pennsylvania will threaten the mark, set by Fred Wilt in 1950.

Hart has the best time of the season—14:28.4. Dellinger recently ran the distance at Portland in 14:40.2 but had no one to press him.

Also in the race will be such standout runners as Max Truex of Southern California, Gordon McKenzie of New York, Jim Beatty of North Carolina and Mal Robertson of Los Angeles.

SEATTLE (AP)—Seattle's Jo Anne Gunderson held a one-stroke lead Wednesday entering the final 18-hole round of the Pacific Northwest Golf Assn.'s first girls' tournament.

Miss Gunderson, Western Junior Girls champion, came in with an 83, eight over women's par, to shade Elaine Porritt of Eugene, Ore., in the initial round Tuesday.

Metal Trades Workers, Shipbuilders Negotiate

PORTLAND (AP)—The Pacific Metal Trades Council and the Shipbuilders Assn. of the Pacific are getting closer to "an area of agreement," a spokesman for the union reported Tuesday.

William Way, president of the Portland labor council, said progress in negotiations had been made since Monday night when he reported that the talks had reached a stalemate.

The present contract, which provides hourly pay of \$2.29 per hour expires at midnight Saturday. The union is asking a 21-cent hourly increase.

A strike would affect some 10,000 West Coast shipyard workers.
