Who else but Robin Roberts would be the pitcher to bring Milwaukee out of the clouds?
The big right-hander, practically carrying the Philadelphia Phillies all by himself for six years, may no longer be the best in the National League, but "he's among 'em."

Robinson proved it again last night, winning his third straight after a disturbing four-game losing streak. He hung the Braves 4-2 on a five-hitter and snipped their winning streak at 11 games.

Roberts was the first pitcher to go the distance against Milwaukee in 14 games.
Milwaukee lost only half a game from its lead (now 1 1/2 games) since rain idled runner-up Cincinnati at Pittsburgh. But third-place Brooklyn closed to within 2 1/2 games by thumping the Chicago Cubs 10-5 as Al (Rube) Walker drove in six runs with a homer, triple and double. Pittsburgh took fourth by a percentage point from the St. Louis Cardinals, who were whipped 3-0 by the New York Giants and Ruben Gomez's three-hitter.

Yankees Score Win
In the American League, first-place New York scored 8-4 decision over Kansas City. Runners Chicago made it nine in a row with Jack Harshman's three-hitter beating Boston 4-1. Third-place Cleveland ran its streak to seven games—the Tribe's best winning string since 1954—in a comeback 4-3 victory over Baltimore. Rain halted Washington at Detroit at a 2-2 tie in the fifth inning.

Roberts, squaring his record at 8-8, gave up a first-inning hit, then retired 17 in a row before the Braves rallied to tie it 2-2 in the seventh. The Phil came right back with two in the eighth off lower Ray Crone. A throwing error by left fielder Bobby Thomson brought the tie-breaker across. Elmer Valo singled home the clincher.

Roberts, who hasn't walked a man in 18 innings, struck out seven in his 10th complete game and third straight.

Centerfielder Gus Bell, who slipped ahead of Brooklyn's Snider, padded his lead to a solid margin of about 20,000 votes.

ROY McMillan now leads at shortstop, topping Chicago's Banks by about 10,000 ballots in the Cincinnati surge while rookie Frank Robinson replaced the St. Louis Cardinals' Rip Repulski as the favorite left field choice and Ed Bailey scrambled into a near 10,000-vote lead over Campanella, Brooklyn's stand out catcher and three-time Most Valuable Player in the NL.

Five Redlegs Lead In All-Star Voting

NEW YORK (AP)—The free-swinging Cincinnati Redlegs moved in to take over the lead at five positions Wednesday in the voting to pick the National League team for the July 10 All-Star Game, replacing such solid favorites of past classics as Red Schoendienst, Roy Campanella, Ernie Banks and Duke Snider.

The latest vote count of fan ballots by the office of Commissioner Ford Frick also put Redlegs in the runnerup spot at the other three positions to be decided by the grandstand managers.

Cincinnati's Johnny Temple took over at second base, edging ahead of Schoendienst, now with the New York Giants, by some 6,500 votes as the commissioner's office force hurried to complete the over-all count by week's end.

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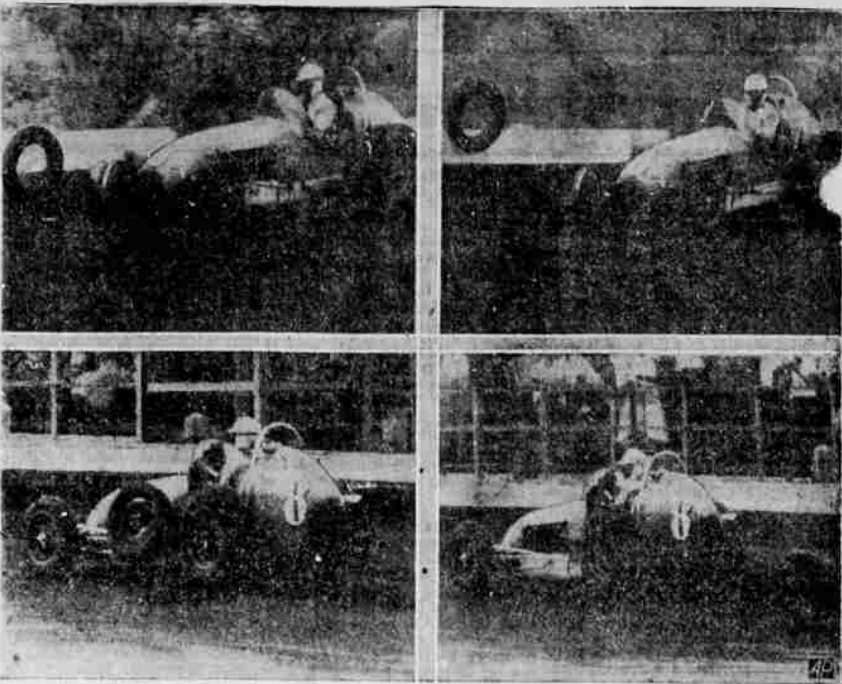

Californian Calls For Boxing Officer

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — A California official Wednesday urged boxing interests to take the initiative and install a national commissioner to police their sport.
The call came from H. Jack Hanna, who headed Gov. Knight's special investigation of boxing irregularities. He is director of the department of professional and vocational standards under which the State Athletic Commission operates.
Hanna expressed hope that Knight's announced cleanup of California boxing will inspire other major states to join in mutual agreements in enforcing boxing regulations. He said in an interview:
"The checkerboard grouping of laws among the big boxing states now encourages lawlessness and underworld participation."
"They encourage crooked fights and betting because if the law of one state is prohibitive, the shady operators simply move to another state."

Water Safety Rules Given To Combat Angling Deaths

A rash of water accidents since the general fishing season opened have placed tragic emphasis on the importance of water safety precautions, the Oregon Game Commission said today.
Newspaper clippings — show that 12 persons have already lost their lives through drowning in the past two months while fishing on Oregon's lakes and streams.
Six of these tragedies occurred on streams when persons either slipped from moss covered rocks or ventured too far and were swept into deep holes by strong river currents. The other six drownings were from boating accidents, two of which occurred on swift moving rivers, and the remaining four from capsized boats on high mountain lakes.

The Game Commission reminds sportsmen that at this time of year streams are high, running with tremendous speed and force. In addition, rocks on the stream bottom are slick with moss or other algal growth which makes wading extremely hazardous. Under such conditions, wading is next to impossible, or at best, a precarious undertaking.
Boatman on lakes and reservoirs are also cautioned to watch the weather constantly. Sudden spring storms and squalls can arise almost without warning. Navigation in bad weather is difficult, and swamping of the boat often occurs.
The commission recommends the following code for water safety:
1. Avoid wading in swift current if the water is more than knee deep, particularly if you are wearing boots or waders. If you must cross a fast stream, carry a long stiff pole as a safety aid.
2. Avoid overloading any boat. Rowboats 14 feet long or less should never carry more than three people.
3. Never stand up in a boat.
4. When boating on a large stream, avoid swift riffles and whirlpools.
5. When fishing from a small craft on a lake, head for the nearest shore line immediately if the wind starts to blow. Check the skyline and wind behavior often and systematically and head for the nearest shore before a squall hits.
6. Never go out in a boat unless it is capable of floating when capsize, and don't leave without a life preserver for every person aboard. Put them on immediately at the first sign of danger.
7. If a boat capsizes, always try to catch hold of the boat and stay with it until help arrives.
8. Never wear boots or waders when riding in a boat.
9. Avoid showing off with motor boats. Don't make sharp turns at high speed or pass other boats without proper clearance.
10. If caught in a storm on open water, run the motor at slow speed and angle across the waves. Sit in the bottom of the boat for maximum stability.
