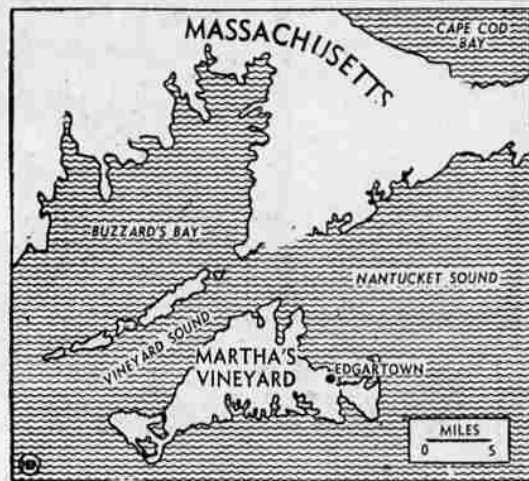

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PRICES OF SLICES—Most housewives, when they hear the price of wheat is 'way down, look for a corresponding drop in the price of bread. But it just doesn't work out that way. Fact is, the value of farm products in a loaf is so small that farm prices would have to fluctuate to a tremendous degree before loaf prices would be affected. Chart above shows why. Average price of a pound loaf of bread in 1955 was 17.7 cents. Out of this the farmer got only 3.1 cents. The rest of your 17.7 cents went for processing and marketing charges, including transportation, as shown by other groups of slices in chart. Oregon's Income Tax Shows Heavy Increase

SALEM — Personal income tax collections for the first 11 months of the biennium are \$20,000,000 higher than during the same period a year ago, Ray Smith, chairman of the state Tax Commission said Tuesday.

"Full impact of the increased surtax was not felt until April and May," Smith said. "The large increase in the May collections was due to the fact that many of the returns made in April could not be processed immediately and were not included in the May report."

Totals for the period ending May 31 were \$62,110,056 compared with \$41,707,734 a year ago. The figure reflected results of the 45 per cent surtax applied to income taxes by the 1955 Legislature and tended to confirm reports that tax collections would result in a sizable cushion for the biennium budget.
