

### Three Workers Suffer Injuries On Wednesday

Three local residents were in Douglas Community Hospital Thursday, nursing injuries received in on-the-job accidents Wednesday.

Richard Plant, 474 SE Eastwood St., suffered a broken arm Wednesday night while operating a drill press at St. Dillard's Motor Co. Plant, who was reported in "good condition" today, reportedly got his arm caught between the press and the metal he was working on.

Donald Starbuck, 44, Box 493, Myrtle Creek, was in "satisfactory" condition today after being treated for a severe laceration of his right foot. Starbuck received his cut from an ax while logging near Diamond Lake for Briggs and Son.

Bervis George, 32, Kites Motel, Winchester, also was injured in the woods Wednesday. He was treated for a severe compound fracture of his left arm and was in "satisfactory" condition today, hospital personnel reported. The cause of his accident was not known.

### Truman Ends Vacation In Europe On Thursday

SOUTHAMPTON, England (AP)—Harry S. Truman ended his European vacation Thursday and said the people of Western Europe are definitely friendly to the United States.

The former American president told reporters aboard the liner United States that he had found the people of Western Europe "generally happy, and their countries are prosperous."

A British reporter suggested that the good economic conditions Truman had seen were due to the Marshall Plan which he sponsored. "Let's get this straight," Truman replied. "I didn't do it and I don't take credit for it. That would be nonsense. The people of the United States did it. They are the ones you want to thank."

### Board Backs Dog Control Officer After Hearing

Two of the three members of the Douglas County Dog Control board met at the courthouse today and agreed that the dog control officer, Robert Hall, was doing a "good, humane, and proper" job.

The matter was discussed as the result of complaints recently that unlicensed dogs were being killed inhumanely. The county has no dog pound.

In one letter to The News-Review by Mrs. Paul B. Hult, it was charged that hot fumes from a vehicle's motor were forced into airless boxes to kill the dogs. Dogs are killed with carbon monoxide. The two board members, Darley Ware of Roseburg and Harold Nichols of Brockway, denied methods used to gas the dogs were inhumane. The third member of the board, Chester Rydell of Drain, was not present at the meeting.

Judge Carl C. Hill of the county court said he had received several complaints, but he said the court had no jurisdiction over the board except to appoint its members.

Walter Welker, president of the Douglas County Livestock Assn., also attended the meeting.

### Myrtle Creek To Have Queen For Fall Festival

For the first time in the history of the Myrtle Creek annual fall festival, a queen will be selected this year, reports correspondent Ruth M. Evans.

The queen contest started today. Applications may be turned to Warren's Studio.

Under the rules a girl entering the contest must be single, between the ages of 14 and 18, and sponsored by an organization or merchant. The entry fee by the sponsor will be \$10.

The contest is open to any girl in southern Douglas County. The queen will win a \$200 wardrobe and will reign over both days of the festival. She will be selected by a public vote.

The festival itself is scheduled Aug. 17 and 18. Organizations will set up booths on a blocked area of Myrtle Creek streets. One street will be devoted also to commercial booths. The two-day fete will end in a free street dance the night of Aug. 18.

Broadcasts of events will be made by Roseburg radio station KYES.

The major prizes to be given away in the festival are a 500-pound beef and a television set, Mrs. Evans reported.

### Republicans, Democrats Differ On Hells Canyon

5. The examiner favored non-federal dams in the river on grounds it would be "useless" to recommend a federal project because there was no indication Congress would authorize it.

"What the examiner did was to disqualify the high dam... on the basis of a purely political guess as to what Congress was likely to do," the report said.

6. The commission issued a license in spite of the examiner's finding that the federal dam would be best adapted to a comprehensive development plan for the Columbia River Basin. This decision "clearing infringes on the jurisdiction of Congress" which under the federal power law has power to authorize dams for the benefit of the public.

The federal dam, estimated to cost \$98 million dollars, would add more than a million kilowatts of generating capacity to the federal low-cost power system in the northwest and provide flood control, navigation, recreation and other important benefits.

The minority report was signed by Republican Sens. Watkins of Utah, Millikin of Colorado, Dworshak of Idaho, Barrett of Wyoming and Goldwater of Arizona.

Their report said Idaho Power's three dams, estimated to cost 133 million dollars, were licensed by FPC after "the most extensive proceeding in the commission's entire history."

It also said in part:

1. The FPC found the three-dam plan best adapted to a comprehensive river development plan.

2. One issue before Congress "is whether there is to be any place in the development of our hydroelectric resources for assistance from nonfederal sources when that assistance can be rendered entirely consistent with development in accordance with a coordinated comprehensive plan."

3. The Hells Canyon bill "would deny the nation the benefit of such assistance" and "overturn a national water policy developed over a period of decades and embodied for a quarter of a century in the federal power act."

4. Congress has never held that comprehensive development "requires exclusive federal development of our water resources."

The minority questioned whether state water rights would be fully protected by construction of the proposed 4-million-acre-foot federal reservoir.

They said the governors of Idaho, Oregon and Washington... "speaking for their states, are unalterably opposed" to the Hells Canyon bill.

Congress should not "override" the wishes of the three states, the minority said.

### British-American Society Beauty Weds Lord Brooke

LONDON (AP)—Sarah Chester Beatty, 22-year-old British-American society beauty, was married Thursday to Lord Brooke, a friend of Princess Margaret.

The bride, a former fashion model, is the daughter of Alfred Chester Beatty, New York-born copper magnate who now lives in Ireland.

Lord Brooke is the 22-year-old heir of the seventh Earl of Warwick. He was a Hollywood actor before World War II under the name of Michael Brooke.

### Steve Ferche Gets Contract To Build Courthouse Garage

Steve Ferche of Roseburg Wednesday was awarded a contract for construction of garages and a parking lot in the rear of the Douglas County Courthouse.

The winning bid was \$42,935, with \$12 a yard for any extra rock excavation and \$45 per yard for any extra concrete above that called for in the specifications. Ferche will have 90 days to complete the job.

Other bidders were William Pemberton, \$44,900 and Todd Building Co. \$48,596.

More bids will be received Friday for landscaping of the front lawn of the courthouse.

The work to be done will give a completely new face to the landscape of the courthouse.

The contract awarded to Ferche will change the appearance of the entire rear landscape. Work will include construction of a garage facility to house two bookmobiles for the county library and seven cars. The garage will open onto Southeast Court Avenue.

The top of the garage and the entire area to the driveway paralleling the rear of the courthouse will become a parking lot which should go far toward alleviating the parking problem in the courthouse area. Room for 31 parking stalls on this upper parking level are scheduled. In addition several more stalls will be arranged against the rear of the courthouse.

In front, the city has been allowed to widen the street to allow diagonal parking which will allow still more parking. When that job is finished, landscaping will be completed on the front lawn.

Several of the trees have been topped in the facilitating operation, but some of the trees in the rear and all but six in the front are being retained.

### Threatened WCA Strike Awaits Mediation Meet

SEATTLE (AP)—A mediation conference will open here Friday in a move toward averting the threatened strike of West Coast Airlines pilots.

Originally the strike had been set for last midnight. The strike call was deferred Wednesday afternoon by the Airline Pilots' Assn. with a statement that it was being done "on assurance by the National Board that mediation will begin promptly Friday in Seattle."

The ALPA said it expected "prompt mediation of all issues in dispute" and it would be free to "re-set a strike date at any time, should circumstances dictate."

The pilots say the company's wage scales are \$40 a month below similar airlines. They also are asking for a retirement plan. The airline has withheld comment during the dispute.

Base pay for a flight captain with eight years' experience is \$1,031 a month. The ALPA, which has headquarters in Chicago, is asking \$1,075 for an 85-hour month.

### Good Fishing Prospect For Salmon Harbor

The fishing "ought to be terrific" this weekend, according to Gard Safley, manager of Salmon Harbor at Winchester Bay.

In his weekly fishing report to The News-Review, he said fishermen were catching fish like "mad" today. He said one boat this morning with nine fishermen aboard brought back 18 fish. He said 17 of them were large chinook and one was a silverside.

He said, of course, that it was impossible to outguess the weather, but today the weather was sunny and clear and was good for fishing except for some wind. He said the fishing has continued "exceptionally good" for the last week.

Bearing him out were six Roseburg residents who went fishing at the harbor Tuesday. The six caught 12 chinook averaging from 20 to 25 pounds. It took them four hours from departure to arrival back at the dock. The six were: Cliff Aten and son, Jimmy, Ken Ellison and his wife, Velda; "Mac" McAlexander and Grant Phillips. Phillips said the water was calm and the fishing was "very good." The six went out on Luther Ellison's trailer "Rose," operated by Capt. Jim Britton of Roseburg.

Safley urged that all fishermen check weather conditions with their local weather bureaus before coming to the harbor. They may also receive first-hand reports of conditions by calling him at Salmon Harbor, 17-R-15.

### Forest Ranger Dies In Flames

ALBUQUERQUE (AP)—Lightning scattered hundreds of fires over Arizona and New Mexico forests Thursday, and one forest ranger died fighting the flames.

The Forest Service said more than 150 fires and uncounted small blazes were scattered over national forests in the two states by lightning storms.

Killed in the Coconino National Forest of Arizona was Allen S. Wilson Jr., 28 of Flagstaff, Ariz. He was crushed by a burning snag.

### Congress Votes \$48½ Million For Cancer Research

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress has appropriated a whopping \$48½ million dollars for cancer research during the coming year in a money bill sent to the White House.

The compromise bill provides \$2,366,380,781 to finance the Labor Department and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare in the fiscal year starting Sunday.

The House and Senate each approved the measure by voice vote. The total compares with \$2,363,885,400 asked by President Eisenhower for the agencies.

The House originally cut the Eisenhower estimate while the Senate raised them.

Biggest increase voted by the Senate was in funds for the National Cancer Institute. For it, the final version of the bill carried \$48,432,000 or 14 million more than the House had voted.

The show was co-sponsored by the Arabian Horse Breeders Assn. of Oregon and Salem Shrine Club of Al Kader Temple. Proceeds went to Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children at Portland.
