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Importance Of Veterans' Groups Working Together Cited By VFW Commander

The House of Representatives' passage of a pension-boosting bill for World War I veterans "indicates the importance of veterans' groups working together to accomplish common aims," National VFW Commander - in - Chief Timothy J. Murphy said in the main address at the VFW's business session Thursday afternoon.

Murphy confined his talk to an explanation of the bill, which passed the House only Wednesday. He stressed its importance. The bill would allow \$80-a-month payments to World War I veterans of age 65 if their incomes fall within certain limits.

Getting a new pension bill passed this year was one of the main objectives of the VFW platform, and Murphy stated that the House bill was very similar to the one the VFW originally proposed.

Murphy called the bill "solid and sound, and good for all veterans as well as for the government." He said that veterans' groups strengthen themselves by working together for the passage of legislation to aid veterans instead of splitting over minor differences.

The bill applies only to World War I veterans because they are the ones who need it the most, Murphy stated. The average age of the three million World War I veterans is 62.3, and it is an historical precedent for a pension to be granted when veterans of a war reach the retirement age, the commander said.

The Hoover and Bradley reports both came under fire from Murphy for their stands which denounce the treatment of non-servicing veterans in hospitals. "Any fellow who wore a uniform is entitled to medical aid and attention," Murphy held.

The veterans' leader predicted the bill should also pass the Senate if its advocates could keep it from being pigeonholed. He urged his audience to write their senators to support the bill.

Father Blaker was ordained in North Dakota, and appointed to Minot, N.D. From there he was sent to Bradenton, Fla., to Columbus, Neb., and then to Denver. He was rector of St. Peter's parish in Denver for nearly 20 years before coming to Roseburg. He was transferred from Roseburg to St. Helens.
