Aluminum Co., Union Talks Are Recessed

PITTSBURGH — Contract talks between the United Steel workers and the Aluminum Co. of America have been recessed until July 10 after an opening meeting in which the union presented its demands.

The recess was declared Wednesday, after an hour-long meeting, to give Alcoa time to study the proposals, which include a substantial wage increase, a lay-off plan and other improvements.

The current USW contract with Alcoa, which covers 17,000 production workers in 12 plants, expires July 31. If no agreement is reached by then the union is free to strike.
